## CITIZENS' SUPPLEMENTAL COMMENTS

Come now the Citizens of the State of Florida by and through JACK SHREVE,

Public Counsel, to supplement their comments filed in the above referenced proceeding,

and say as follows:

That there is confusion in the state regarding whether local phone service stands as security for 900/976 billing cannot be denied. The Palm Beach Post is a daily newspaper of general circulation in the state of Florida; it enjoys a good reputation for accurate reporting of matters of interest to residents of Florida. Yet even this excellent newspaper apparently labors under a common misapprehension. A July 21, 1991 article in the Post<sup>1</sup> which refers to the Florida Public Service Commission provides

Proposed regulations would forbid cutting off local phone service because of a disputed 900 charge.... (italics added)

Column two, fourth full paragraph. A reproduction of part of the article is attached as Exhibit A.

To state that such regulations are proposed is to give rise to the false inference that the prohibition against terminating local service is not the current state of the law.

Although public confusion is a matter upon which all parties to this docket agree, the Citizens submit that the confusion is pervasive and requires extreme remedial measures

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Scam artists may force limits on 900-number industry

# Duped 900-number callers demand tougher rules

Charles Benfer thought he was claiming a credit card reserved especially for him when he dialed a 900 number at the urging of a West Palm Beach telemarketer.

But instead of a card, the Rochester, N.Y., resident ended up with a \$100 phone bill and a sinking

feeling in his gut.

"There was no card at all,"
Benfer said. "They sent me some
pamphlets with general information about applying for a credit
card, including a list of banks."

The company, Shur-Loc Systems Inc., denies deception. But Benfer's claim that he was duped is typical of growing consumer dissatisfaction that has put regulators and phone companies on the alert and the \$1 billion-a-year 900 industry on the defensive.

The 900 numbers are used to sell information services over the phone. And industry officials maintain most businesses that use the technique are legitimate.

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"Problem" services are confined to a 10 percent to 15 percent segment of the market, says Albert Angel, chairman of the National Association of Information Ser-

vices, an industry group.

But the problem services are drawing a lot of attention to the

industry:

Earlier this month, long-distance provider US Sprint announced that; because of public uproar, it would stop providing new 900 lines for credit card, romance and job services. The U.S. Office of Consumer Affairs praised the move as a way to "help consumers avoid deceptive fees and services."

The Federal Communications Commission and the Florida Public Service Commission are considering new rules to protect

consumers.

Proposed regulations would forbid cutting off local phone service because of a disputed 900 charge; further restrict children's access to 900 lines; require a preamble message disclosing costs; and allow a caller to hang up without charge in the first 12 to 18 seconds.

Last week, an appeals court

upheld a federal law that seeks to keep children from using "dialaporn" services, clearing the way for its enforcement nationwide. The law, sponsored by Sen. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., requires telephone companies to provide "dial-a-porn" number access only to adults who request it in writing. Services with sexually explicit talk are treated separately from "romance" or "Chat" lines frequently advertised on TV.

Angel said he's all for shutting down scam artists, but he doesn't want to see the entire industry

shackled.

These scams are not limited to the 900 industry," said Angel, who also is vice chairman of ICN Corp., a 15-employee company in Delray Beach that provides nationwide 7900 services, including horse-racing results and a sports line for USA Today. "I think sometimes the press is unfairly casting a lot of good providers in with the bad."

In addition to those who use 900 numbers to sell sex and scams, doctors and druggists use them to give advice on the telephone for a

per-minute fee.

Other toll lines offer news, weather and sports. In a six-month experiment that began this month, the Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan New York is using 900 lines for certain inquiries.

Angel, a former Washington lawyer who describes himself as an information services entrepreneur, said the industry is ready to accept

"reasonable" regulation.

In Florida, the industry has lobbied successfully against a "kill" message — a preamble that tells callers to hang up before the beep if they don't want to be charged. The PSC staff recommended instead a "soft kill" — no beep, just 18 seconds of preamble message before charges begin.
