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| 7 | Q. | Please tate your name, business name, address and title. |
| 8 | A. | I am Elizabeth Ann Toney. I am City Manager of the City of Haines City. Ou |
| 9 | | business address is 501 Hinson Avenue. |
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| 11 | Q. | Please describe your educational background and your business |
| 12 | | experience. |
| 13 | A. | My educational background consists of an Associates of Art Degree from |
| 14 | | Polk Community College, a Bachelors of Art Degree in Political Science from |
| 15 | | the University of Florida, and a Masters of Art Degree in Political |
| 16 | | Science/Public Administration from the University of Florida. My business |
| 17 | | experience includes a management internship with the City of West Palm |
| 18 | | Beach, and serving the City of Boynton Beach as Assistant to the City |
| 19 | | Manager and then as Assistant City Manager and as Interim City Manager for |
| 20 | | a period of time. I served as Deputy City Manager for the City of North Miami |
| 21 | | Beach. I am currently the City Manager with the City of Haines City, a |
| 22 | | position which I have held for epproximately five yeers. |
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| 24 | Q. | Please describe your role as a community leader in Haines City. |
| 25 | A. | As City Manager I am in charge of the City's 160-plus employees. We are a |

1 full service city providing services for recreation, library, public works, water, wastewater, police, fire, parks, etc. Also in our community, I am active on 2 various committees in the Chamber of Commerce and have served as 3 Chairman of the Governmental Affairs Committee on three separate 4 5 occasions. I am also a member of the Central Florida Economic Development Council and am Chairman of the Polk County City and County 6 Management Association. I am active in the American Legion Auxiliary at 7 8 both, the local and the state level. I also serve my church as a member of the Pastor-Parish Committee; and for two years prior to this, I have served as 9 10 Stewardship Chairman. 11 12 Q. Why is it appropriate that the Florida Public Service Commission be 13 concerned with the provision of countywide extended area service for 14 Haines City? 15 Countywide extended area service or extended calling service is very 16 important for the City of Haines City for a variety of reasons. Haines City 17 clearly has numerous "communities of interest" with other parts of the county 18 and we have a significant barrier due to our inability to make local telephone 19 calls to other parts of the county. I would like to first note that Haines City is 20 the fourth largest city, based on population, out of the seventeen 21 municipalities in Polk County. Haines City is also statistically the fastest 22 growing area of Polk County. Therefore, the communities of interest not only 23 exist but will continue to intensify in their importance over the coming years. 24 The first item I would like to note is that Bartow is the county seat of Polk 25

County, Located within Bartow is the County Administration Building, the

Polk County Courthouse, the Polk County School Board Offices, the Polk County Sheriff's Main Office, and the main office of all Polk County Constitutional officers. In order for the citizens of this City to call Bartow, they must use long distance service. This circumstance is somewhat unfair and isolates this very large part of Polk County from what is the governmental nucleus of Polk County. Also because Bartow is the county seat and nouses the County Administration Building, the Polk County Courthouse, the Polk County School Board, the Polk County Sheriff's Main Office, and the main office of all Polk County Constitutional officers, many residents from Haines City commute to Bartow to work. In this scenario, in order to place a call to or from one's office to or from Haines City would also require a long distance telephone call.

The City of Lakeland which is the largest city, based on population, in Polk County has many doctors offices, a regional hospital, and a major medical clinic. Due to the dynamics of Haines City and the greater Haines City area population, many medical related activities transpire. One item I would like to specifically note is that Haines City does not have a dialysis center and residents of Haines City requiring this treatment have driven to Lakeland to the Watson Clinic in order to receive kidney diletion in order to extend their quality of life. In order to call to make an appointment, to change an appointment or for an inquiry relative to treatment would require said residents to make a long distance telephone call.

From an economic standpoint Lakeland is a major employment and

Farms, etc. In the Lakeland area are many employment opportunities for Haines City area residents, and access to Lakeland is very easy due to Haines City's location on 17-92 and its easy access to Interstate 4, both of which are direct routes to the City of Lakeland. Also from an economic standpoint, our City's businesses order stock and supplies from major companies located in Lakeland. Therefore, from both an employment and a business prospective, long distance calls are required of the business community in Haines City.

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Lakeland is also the home of Florida Southern College, which provides our residents with higher education opportunities. Florida Southern College is the largest college in Polk County; and in order to call to gain information relative to registration or activities related to Florida Southern College athletics or performing erts series, residents from this area must place a long distance call.

The Lakeland Canter located within the corporate limits of the City of Lakeland is the most culturally significant facility for cultural and entertainment opportunities in Polk County. In order to make inquiries or reservations would require residents of the Haines City area to make a long distance telephone call. The Lekeland Center continues to be a major focus of the Polk County Tourist Development Council as a major asset to our County and its dynamics. The Lakeland Center is a recipient of a high percentage of the Tourist Development tax dollars. Ironically the area of the

county generating the largest percentage of the Tourist Development tax dollars is the northeast part of the county, a/k/a the greater Haines City area. It is truly a statement by the Tourist Development Council to the residents of Polk County that the Lakeland Center is the focal cultural and entertainment point in Polk County based on its decision to allocate a large share of funds for that facility.

It should also be noted that the Polk County Museum of Art is located in Lakeland. The museum is sponsored by private and governmental donations from throughout Polk County. A Haines City resident would have to make a long distance call to make an inquiry relative to hours of operation, exhibits, etc.

One of Haines City's two oldest and significant industries is citrus and trucking. Haines City is home to the Haines City Citrus Growers Associations (HCCGA), the largest citrus co-op in the state of Florida. Because of the number of citrus owner's serviced and represented by HCCGA there are constant countywide telephone requirements.

Secondly, Haines City is known nationwide as a trucking center. Products from throughout the county, state, and nation are brokered out of offices located in Haines City. You will note that when traveling throughout Floriua, signs refer to the number of inities to Haines City. The reason for this is the significance of the trucking industry in Haines City. Unfortunately, trucking brokers and drivers in Haines City and Polk County in general are put to en

economic disadvantage within their own county due to the fact that they are 1 unable to make local calls throughout Polk County. 2 3 The trucking industry is a communications driven industry and the inability for 4 a trucker in Frostproof, Mulberry, Fort Meade, Bartow, Polk City and 5 Lakeland to call his broker in Haines City is not only inconvenient but it 6 7 economically affects his/her business. 8 9 I would also note that the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) now 10 has right-of-way acquisition monies in the FDOT work program to purchase 11 land so U.S. 27 can be widened to six (6) lanes. Now, and even more so in 12 the future, U.S. 27 will naturally link Frostproof to Haines City. 13 14 Additionally, one of Haines City's strongest assets is its location. We 15 contend that "all roads lead to Haines City." Because of the State highway 16 system, despite its location on the other side of the county, people do travel 17 between Fort Meade and Haines City for employment and shopping. Both of 18 these activities are conducive to the need for telephone contact. In 19 particular, I find it of interest that the Assistant Principle of Fort Meade Middle 20 School is a Haines City resident. 21 Another important link between the schools of Polk County is high school 22 23 athletics. Both Bartow High School and Mulberry High School are two of our 24 biggest rivals. Athletic events certainly do not end with football season and 25 involve both girl and boy participants. School to school cares, parent to

parent calls, and friend to friend calls are quelled due to a countywide 1 communication barrier known as long distance telephone calls. 2 3 It is also interesting to note that the General Telephone Electronics (GTE) 4 Governmental Liaison for the Haines City area is located in Lakeland. To 5 5 contact him by telephone would require a resident of this area to call long. 7 distance or to call collect. 8 In what ways will the implementation of countywide extended area Q. 9 10 service impact your business and community interest? 11 A. It is my opinion as City Manager that an extended area or calling service 12 opportunity for the citizens of Halnes City would cartainly diversify our opportunity to compete with neighboring cities in attracting not only larger 13 14 businesses but also smaller businesses. This is important in diversifying the business community. Given an opportunity a business will locate in an area 15 16 where telephone access to more of the county is prevalent. Contact with 17 possible customers and suppliers is facilitated by having the ability to make a 18 local call. 19 20 Q. In what ways do you foresee the implementation of countywide 21 extended area service impacting the economy of Haines City? 22 A. Without question this will become an economic development selling point for

the Halnes City area. For so long government representatives from Haines

City have heard criticisms that Haines City is difficult to eccess by telephone.

and the irony is that it is easy to access by major roadways, yet difficult in the

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quickest way of communication which is by telephone. We would be able to encourage economic exchanges by allowing persons in other parts of the county to call the businesses in Haines City for cost comparisons and business information more easily.

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6 Q. Describe what you see as Haines City's growth potential with
7 countywide extended area service for local telephone usage.

A. With or without the extended area or extended calling service, the City of Haines City will continue to grow. However, the quality of this growth will be greatly enhanced by greater communication opportunities. It is true in any business as well as in government that the ability to interact at various levels is most important. The consumer to interact with a business, the business to interact with a supplier, and governments to interact with each other. In those cases, Haines City has been denied that economic opportunity for the most important exchange areas in Polk County.

Please describe any additional factors which you believe the Florida

Public Service Commission should consider with regard to Haines

City's application.

I believe the Public Service Commission should consider the growth of
Haines City and how much the potential growth could be accelerated by the
addition of extended area or extended calling service to the greater Haines
City area. It also should be noted that Haines City has tremendous economic
development opportunities. Accordingly, such industries and citizens
locating in this area not only help Haines City, but Polk County as well as the

State of Florida.

From an educational standpoint, it is disturbing to think that a student from Haines City who wishes to attend a county-wide Magnet School in Lakeland, such as Harrison Center for the Performing Arts, would be unable to make a local call to the school for any reason. Truly, the lack of extended area or extend "calling service has been a barrier to the City of Haines City for economic, cultural, entertainment, and medical as well as information exchange at the governmental level.

Also, the availability for countywide EAS will allow our residents to solicit a larger number of medical specialists and to have "local" access to more medical facilities for health care.

One item that I feel is especially important to emphasize is that the GTE figures on the telephone traffic between Haines City end other Polk County cities is not a true representation of ACTUAL traffic flow. There are numerous businesses and non-profit agencies that have opted to purchase the services of a toll-free line in order for the long-distance issue to be partially addressed. As a result, it is ultimately the consumer or taxpayer who compensates this expense. Furthermore, not everyone chooses GTE as their long distance carrier. Other providers for placement of long distance calls are utilized. Additionally, more and more people are utilizing their cellular telephones to make telephone calls that would otherwise be local. The cost of a cellular call is less than placing the call to or from Haines City

and be assessed a long distance charge. Unless the above-mentioned situations are considered and factored in, a TRUE picture of the traffic flow to and from Haines City is at best incomplete and certainly not reliable.

The bottom line is that businesses and residents in the fourth largest city in Polk County cannot place a "local" cell to the County Scat (Bartow).

Furthermore, the existing economic stress caused by the Halnes City business community's inability to communicate county-wide will continue to increase with each passing month. The further enhancement of this condition comes with the creation of megnet schools, and with the increasing focus on the cultural arts in the Lakeland area with the Lakeland Center, the fine arts series et Florida Southern College, and the Polk County Museum of Art. With the compilation of each item discussed in my testimony, imagine each item representing a brick. When all are gathered together e "wall" is constructed that keeps the residents from Haines City from having free flowing communication opportunities relative to county-wide events and activities, educational and medical options, and from having contact with the governmental and social service agencies of Polk County.

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
