# REQUEST FOR CONFIDENTIAL CLASSIFICATION OF CERTAIN INFORMATION IN ITS 1998 FERC FORM 1 AND DIVERSIFICATION REPORT

NOW, BEFORE THIS COMMISSION, through undersigned counsel, comes Florida Power & Light Company ("FPL") and, pursuant to section 25-22.006 of the Florida Administrative Code and section 366.093 of the Florida Statutes, hereby requests confidential classification of certain information provided to the Florida Public Service Commission ("FPSC" or "Commission") in connection with FPL's Annual Report of Major Electric Utilities for the year ended 1998, as supplemented by FPL's Analysis of Diversification Activities report, submitted pursuant to Sections 25-6.135 and 25-6,1751, respectively, of the Florida Administrative Code. In support of its Request, FPL states as follows:

2. Pursuant to Section 25-6.135 of the Florida Administrative Code, FPL is

required to submit its Annual Report of Major Electric Utilities for the year ended 1998

("FERC Form 1"). FPL also is required to submit a report entitled "Analysis of

Diversification Activities" ("Diversification Report") pursuant to Section 25-6. FPL submits

its Diversification Report to the FPSC as a section within the FERC Form 1. FPL considers

certain information within its FERC Form 1 and its Diversification Report to be proprietary

confidential business information within the meaning of section 366.093 of the Florida

Statutes. Therefore, FPL submits these two reports in their entirety as Exhibit A to this

Request and hereby requests confidential classification for the information identified as

confidential in Exhibit C and highlighted in Exhibit A.

- 3. The following exhibits are included herewith and made a part hereof:
- a. Exhibit A consists of all documents for which FPL seeks confidential treatment, whether in whole or in part. All information in Exhibit A that FPL asserts is entitled to confidential treatment has been highlighted. Exhibit A is submitted separately in a sealed folder or carton marked "CONFIDENTIAL."
- b. Exhibit B is an edited version of Exhibit A. All information that FPL asserts is entitled to confidential treatment has been blocked out in Exhibit B.

- c. Exhibit C is a table containing a line-by-line and page-by-page identification of the information for which confidential treatment is sought, and, with regard to each document or portions thereof, references to the specific statutory basis or bases for the claim of confidentiality and to the affidavits in support of the requested classification. Exhibit C is sometimes referred to hereinafter as the "Justification Table."
- d. Exhibit D is the affidavit of Donald L. Babka.
- e. Exhibit E is a copy of FPL's Request for Confidential Treatment of its FERC Form 1, filed with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission ("FERC").
- 4. FPL seeks confidential protection for the information highlighted in Exhibit A. The statutory bases for FPL's assertion of confidentiality with regard to each document or portion thereof are set forth in the Justification Table under the column titled "FLORIDA STATUTE 366.093(3)." The letters (a) through (f) refer to subsections of section 366.093(3), as applicable. Support for FPL's Request for Confidential Classification of the referenced material is provided through FPL's Request for Confidential Treatment of its FERC Form 1 filed with FERC ("FERC Request"), included herewith as Exhibit E, and the affidavit of Donald L. Babka, included herewith as Exhibit D.
- 5. FPL submits that the information highlighted in Exhibit A is proprietary confidential business information within the meaning of section 366.093(3). With respect to the highlighted information in the FERC Form 1, FPL incorporates by reference the arguments and discussion set forth in the FERC Request and Attachment A thereto, to the extent applicable. In particular, FPL notes that the public availability of detailed information

pertaining to FPL's costs and operations affords wholesale power marketers and other non-traditional utilities an unfair advantage in developing marketing strategies that target FPL's existing and potential customers. These competitors are not subject to the same reporting requirements, thus putting FPL at a competitive disadvantage and impairing FPL's business interests. While in the past, the Commission has declined to protect certain information on the basis of such arguments, FPL submits that in light of current circumstances and competitive conditions, particularly manifest in the vigorous efforts of non-utilities to locate merchant power plants in the State of Florida, these issues should be revisited.

- 6. As Mr. Babka's affidavit indicates, the highlighted information in FPL's Diversification Report consists of details pertaining to new or amended contracts with affiliates, and affiliate transactions. This information would reveal the nature and specifics of certain contractual relationships between FPL and its affiliates, the disclosure of which would impair the efforts of FPL or its affiliates to contract for goods and services on favorable terms. Disclosure of such information also would assist competitors of FPL and/or its affiliates in identifying, among other things, key facts and elements pertaining to the business or strategic plans of these entities.
- 7. Pursuant to section 366.093, such materials are entitled to confidential treatment and are exempt from the disclosure provisions of the public records law. Thus, once the Commission determines that the information in question is proprietary confidential business information, the Commission is not required to engage in any further analysis or review such as weighing the harm of disclosure against the public interest in access to the information.

8. Upon a finding by the Commission that the material in Exhibit A for which FPL seeks confidential treatment is "proprietary confidential business information," pursuant to section 366.093(4) such materials should not be declassified for a period of at least eighteen (18) months and should be returned to FPL as soon as the information is no longer necessary for the Commission to conduct its business.

WHEREFORE, for the above and foregoing reasons, as more fully set forth in the supporting materials and affidavits included herewith, Florida Power & Light Company respectfully requests that its Request for Confidential Classification be granted.



Dear Secretary Boergers:

Enclosed please find the 1998 FERC Form 1 of Florida Power & Light Company ("FPL" or "the Company"). FPL hereby requests that the Commission treat designated portions of its 1998 Annual Report, FERC Form 1, as confidential pursuant to 18 C.F.R. § 388.112. The increasingly competitive environment in which electric utilities operate has made some of the information that is required in the Form 1 commercially sensitive and justifies its treatment on a confidential basis under the Commission's regulations.

# JUSTIFICATION FOR REQUEST FOR CONFIDENTIAL TREATMENT

## The Nature of the Competitive Wholesale Power Sales Market

In any competitive market, the availability of information about competitors can provide market participants a competitive advantage. This is increasingly true for the electricity market. FPL, like other public utilities, is facing competition from wholesale power marketers and other non-traditional utilities. Consequently, the commercial sensitivity of information about the Company has increased in recent years. Although FPL does not have market-based rate authority within the State of Florida, it sells power at market-based rates outside the state. The public availability of information about FPL's costs and operations gives competing power suppliers a significant advantage in developing marketing strategies that target the Company's existing and potential power sales customers.

The public availability of information about FPL's costs and operations would be less objectionable if all market participants were subject to the same reporting and

disclosure requirements. However, most of the Company's competitors are non-traditional utilities that are not subject to the detailed reporting requirements that apply to FPL and other public utilities. Consequently, FPL is operating in an environment in which its competitors have detailed commercial and financial information about the Company, but the Company has little or no such information about most of its competitors. The disparity in information makes it virtually impossible for the Company to compete as effectively as other wholesale market participants.

## Consistency of Request with Commission Regulations

The Commission's regulations, 18 C.F.R. § 388.112, provide that a party may seek confidential treatment of any document filed with the Commission by claiming that some or all of the information contained in a particular document is exempt from the mandatory public disclosure requirements of the Freedom of Information Act, 5 U.S.C. § 552, and should otherwise be withheld from public disclosure. Both the Commission's regulations and the Freedom of Information Act recognize an exemption from public disclosure for "trade secrets and commercial and financial information that is privileged or confidential.<sup>1</sup>

There can be no dispute that the information for which FPL is seeking confidential treatment is "commercial and financial information." The Commission has interpreted the term "commercial and financial information" as "anything 'pertaining to or dealing with commerce' .... including such items as profit and loss data, overhead and operating costs, and information on financial condition." *Central Maine Power Company*, 72 FERC ¶ 61,118, 61,680 (1995). The data contained in the Form 1 unquestionably constitutes commercial and financial information since it includes the reporting company's operating costs and information on its financial condition.

The information also is privileged or confidential because it is directly relevant to the ability of FPL to compete effectively in the wholesale marketplace for power sales. If wholesale customers know the details of the Company's costs, they will be able to develop offers to purchase power from the Company that minimize the Company's ability to obtain a contribution to its fixed costs. Competitors in the wholesale power sales market will be able to develop competing offers that undercut the Company's offers because they will have superior market information. Such unfair competition will adversely affect the public interest because it will allow competitors to raise their prices to just below the Company's cost-based prices, which would increase the prices that power purchasers must pay.

### Consistency of Request with the Public Interest

The public interest does not compel the Commission to continue to make commercially sensitive Form 1 data publicly available. If FPL makes a cost-based rate

filing that requires Commission review of the Form 1 data, the Commission Staff will have easy access to that information since the Company is filing an unexpurgated version of the Form 1 in compliance with Commission regulations. Customers that demonstrate a need to review the confidential portions of the Form 1, either in conjunction with matters the Commission has set for hearing or in the course of evaluating whether to make a filing under Section 206 of the Federal Power Act concerning the reasonableness of the Company's filed rates, can obtain that information if they sign the model confidentiality agreement that the Commission adopted last year. Consequently, granting FPL's request for confidential treatment will not adversely affect the ability of the Commission to fulfill its regulatory obligations or the ability of the Company's customers to obtain the information they need to protect their interests.

FPL recognizes that the Commission has previously held that granting of a request for confidentiality for the Form 1 of one public utility would provide it a competitive advantage because the Form 1s of other public utilities are publicly available. See, e.g., Consolidated Edison Company of New York, Inc. and Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corp., 72 FERC ¶ 61,184 (1995). The Commission's conclusion in that proceeding, rather than justifying denial of the request for confidential treatment, actually demonstrates why such treatment is necessary. The Commission's order includes the justification that the availability of Form 1 data for some utilities and not for others would provide a competitive advantage to the utilities that have access to their competitors' commercial information but have not provided their own commercial information. As explained above, FPL is seeking to forestall its non-public utility competitors from obtaining that same competitive advantage — an advantage that the Commission has acknowledged results from disclosure of Form 1 data. The logic that supports the Commission's order thus justifies granting the Company's request for confidential treatment.

The filing of FERC Form 1 by other public utilities without requests for confidentiality does not justify denying FPL's request for such treatment. Each public utility must make its own determination about whether the information it provides in the Form 1 is commercially sensitive or could otherwise cause it competitive harm. The decision of a public utility to not seek confidential treatment for its Form 1 affects only the utility that made that decision. Therefore, FPL cannot — and should not be required to — point to any special circumstances that justify treating its Form 1 differently from those of other public utilities. Consequently, the Commission should evaluate the request for confidential treatment of the Form 1 for each public utility that makes such a request rather than basing its decision on what other public utilities have done. This is far more fair than holding FPL captive to the decisions of other public utilities, as would be the case if the Commission were to deny confidential treatment for FPL on the ground that other public utilities had not made similar requests.

The availability in other forums of information that is similar to the Form 1 data also should not affect FPL's request for confidential treatment of the Form 1 data. As explained above, the need for confidential treatment has increased as the electric

industry has become more competitive. FPL is requesting the Florida Public Service Commission for confidential treatment of its proprietary, confidential business information. If FPL were required to defer its request for confidential treatment from any regulatory agency until all regulatory agencies agreed on the scope of confidential treatment and the date on which such treatment would begin, no information would ever receive confidential treatment. The appropriate approach is for each regulatory agency to make its own determination as to what information is confidential without regard to the actions of other agencies. FPL recognizes and will accept the risk that there will be differences in the timing of decisions on confidentiality.

The filing of quarterly reports of transactions by power marketers does not justify the denial of this request for confidential treatment. The Company's quarterly reports provide only the high and low price and the total amount of energy purchased by each customer, aggregated for each quarter. That information is not at all comparable in detail or commercial sensitivity to the detailed cost data that public utilities must file.

Nor is it necessary to keep the Form 1 data public in order to allow the Commission or the Department of Energy's Energy Information Administration ("EIA") to prepare its reports on the industry. The EIA reports present aggregated data that do not identify individual utilities. Consequently, EIA reports that are based on the Form 1s of individual utilities would not disclose commercially sensitive information about FPL or other public utilities. Moreover, the EIA does not make use of many of the most sensitive types of information that are included in the Form 1, such as plant generating statistics, monthly peak loads and generator output and wages and salaries. If it is necessary to obtain confidential status for the Form 1, FPL does not object to providing to the EIA the unexpurgated version of the Form 1 subject to the same confidentiality protections that are provided by 18 C.F.R. § 388.112.

#### EXPLANATION OF SPECIFIC REQUESTS FOR CONFIDENTIAL TREATMENT

Attachment A to this filing is a chart that sets out the page, column and line numbers for the Form 1 entries for which FPL is requesting confidential treatment, together with explanations as to why confidential treatment is required.
