

Re: Service hearings related to FPL and PEF rate cases

Dear Chairman Carter:

I have previously stated my concerns related to the conduct of the referenced; the purpose of this letter is to re-iterate, re-state, and expand on those concerns.

Preliminarily, I note that the notice regarding the service hearings being conducted advises that the hearing(s) are for the purpose of taking "testimony from the public on the quality and adequacy of FPL and Progress Energy Florida Inc's service and other matters related to FPL and Progress Energy Florida Inc's petition for a rate increase."

Inasmuch as the Commission is limited by law (F.S. 366.041) in the matters it may consider in deciding a rate case, "other matter related to" must involve only those matters contemplated and published in statute. I look in vain for anything inviting the Commission's consideration of the magnitude of FPL and PEF's corporate citizenship, its general or specific benevolence, or its pre-tax community largesse.

Yet that is precisely what has been chronically, continually, and systematically introduced by numerous speakers. In fact, based on a decade of conducting and participating in public hearings, the similarity of approach, the inelegant use of the service "hook" to get a foot in the door, and the unusual situation of having people happy with the status quo appear before a public body hearing comments on the matters published in the notice, leads me to believe that irrelevant testimony going to the benevolence of FPL and PEF could be orchestrated.

The consequence of this – and if subsequent investigation shows my suspicion to be in error  $\frac{1}{\sqrt{3}}$ then the quantity of the testimony going to benevolence alone – is ominous:

- 1. Accepting the irrelevant testimony has the potential for poisoning the fact finding purpose of **OCUMENT NUM** the hearing, and in fact debases and diminishes the value of the input. Commissioner Edgar, in declaring that she would consider all testimony, where the statute limits the matters to be considered, reflects that the potential has become actuality.
- 2. The irrelevant testimony is of such vastness and dimension, and our failure to make any effort to curb such so glaring, that a case may be made that the hearing, a due process

component, has been so devalued as to repudiate the purpose of the service hearing, and fatally effect the rate case going forward.

- 3. Although it should not need to be said, the FPSC has no authority to re-distribute income in the interest of accomplishing social goals. That is strictly the purview of the legislature. Yet that result is implied by the majority of those speaking to the benevolence of the utility: give them money by way of rates so that my entity, or one that I am pleased to support, can continue to receive the company's contributions. But we cannot take from Grandma Jones, by way of rate exaction, to give to the Boys and Girls club. Regardless of the goodness, nobility, purity or other virtue of the recipient.
- 4. The appropriate venue for commenting on the need and goodness of the utility in contributing to community interests is the utility's Board of Directors.
- 5. As one speaker, testifying on the impact which increased rates would have on his family noted, the extent of the corporate giving rather reflects no need for a rate increase. Of course, that conclusion is also outside the scope of those matters which the statute permits to be considered.

Permit me to suggest, in the interest of perhaps preserving the purpose of the hearings, that the Chair read the filed notice regarding the matters to be presented, pre-advise anyone who would be inclined to introduce extraneous or irrelevant material, warn the speaker upon such introduction, and declare at the end – I respect the reticence in restricting the ostensible public from speaking – that the testimony going to good corporate citizenship is simply not relevant to the purposes of the hearing.

Thank you for your consideration of these matters, and making this communication part of the record.

The festival offers great family experiences 23 for all residents and visitors to southwest Florida. FPL's roots can be traced back to Thomas 24 25 Edison through the General Electric Company. As

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recently as 2003, Florida Power and Light was recognized 1 2 for its achievements in clean energy production and environmental excellence when FP&L won the electrical 3 industry's highest honor, the Edison Award. Florida 4 5 Power and Light is a great partner of the festival, in 6 particular the Edison Day of Discovery, which is 7 comprised of the Thomas Edison Alva (phonetic) Regional Science and Invention Fair and Discovery Village. The 8 regional science fair awards over 500,000 in 9 scholarships locally and has produced national and 10 international scholarship winners. 11

12 The 2009 Discovery Village gave opportunity 13 for hands-on experiences, including Florida Power and 14 Light's interactive solar energy project that popped 15 popcorn for all attendees using only solar power. This 16 showcased Florida Power and Light's continuing 17 commitment to clean energy sources such as the solar 18 energy project.

19The public was also entertained and educated20by Florida Power and Light's Professor Wise Powerful21Adventures that taught the wonders of science as they22relate to electricity. Florida Power and Light also23participated in the grand parade of light, a24multi-generational family experience which has an25attendance of over 200,000. All in attendance were

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enlightened about the past and future of FPL service
vehicles beginning with their 1925 Model 18 Mack truck
followed by Florida Power and Light's 2008 hybrid
service truck, the first in service in the United
States.

20	for or against the rate increase.
21	COMMISSIONER ARGENZIANO: Thank you very much.
22	Mr. Chair, that was my purpose in speaking up
23	before was that we heard a lot of goodwill, and I'm not
24	saying that's a bad thing, I am just saying that the
25	statute says that goodwill is precluded in the

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1 calculating of rate base.

2	So I just want to make sure that we hear from
3	the moms and pops and the seniors who are on fixed
4	incomes also, and the guys who are struggling to make a
5	living. And I appreciate the fact that Florida Power
6	does so much, but I'm just going to ask the same
7	question of everybody who comes up with a goodwill issue
8	if you have information regarding the case at hand
9	before us.
