The Florida State Conference of the NAACP supports clean energy and all of the benefits it promises, especially to low-income, working class and minority communities. We encourage the development of more clean energy programs and initiatives in which <u>ALL</u> communities can participate.

Currently, the Florida Public Service Commission (FPSC) is considering rules that would increase energy efficiency in the state and increase the development of renewable energy sources such as solar, as required by the Florida Energy Efficiency and Conservation Act (FEECA). On **Tuesday, November 25**, the Commission is expected to vote on whether to continue, revise or eliminate many of these energy efficiency programs.

This year, the NAACP Florida State Conference intervened and filed a brief at the FPSC urging that the companies' existing Solar Pilot Programs, which subsidize wealthy homeowners' rooftop solar installations, not be extended because of the Pilot Programs' negative impact on low-income, working class and minority communities. By discontinuing the Pilot Programs unless their regressive impact is corrected, the Commission can ensure that renewable energy programs are not being subsidized on the backs of non-affluent, financially struggling, non-participating ratepayers.

The undersigned encourage the Commission to design renewable energy efficiency programs, including solar, in which <u>everyone</u> can benefit. On behalf of the solar and renewable energy industry in Florida and the ratepayers who contribute to the Solar Pilot Programs we ask you **not** to terminate the solar pilot program and consider the following request:

- Reduce the incentive for January 2015 for Residential Solar PV to \$0.40
- Apply a similar reduction to the commercial solar PV program
- Require a MW goal
- Require a predictable declining incentive structure
- Maintain the current funding cap

Sighting the most recent Staff recommendations the installed solar photovoltaic prices have dropped in Florida to \$4.13/watt for the average residential solar system and lower for commercial. As compared to slightly over \$8.00/watt in 2009.

In 2009 the Florida Solar Coalition, an intervener in Docket 080407 suggested the following:

FSC (Florida Solar Coalition) suggests that annual support should continue for five years, and decrease every year to account for market development and reductions in technology costs.

At that time 25% of the installed cost per watt was subsidized by this program. This coming January if left unchanged the incentive will have actually increased to approximately 50% of the installed cost. Everything in the middle was purposefully over subsidized in order to promote the Utility argument toward the termination of this program - all at the expense of the ratepayers who provide them their guaranteed profits. The utilities could have avoided this by following the Florida Solar Coalitions recommendations in 2009 and followed a simple market price decline and the residential solar rebate would be approximately \$1.00/watt.

The Utilities have blatantly avoided a simple way of increasing the programs participation rates and it is time to require the utilities to lower the incentive amount for the 2015 program launch to \$0.50 cents per watt. This would positively impact promoting solar energy in Florida all while maintaining the funding cap established in order PSC-09-0855-FOF-EG. Though this appears to be a dramatic step downward in incentive, it signals to the ratepayers of Florida that solar energy should be considered, pricing has come down, the market is maturing and rebates do not and should not last forever. It

also supports staffs favorable recommendation that Florida's Net-Metering rule is supportive of an incentive free solar market.

If the Commission believes this request is prudent and the best decision for ratepayers, participants and reasonable use of funds it would require the utilities to make the adjustment to the program prior to the January launch as part of the order on November 25th.

Regarding the future of the Solar Pilot Programs, we believe that they should have been designed to have a MW goal accompanied with a smooth transition to an incentive less market. We urge the Commission, rather than terminate the Solar Pilot Programs, extend them for 1 more year following the 2015 launch with a MW Goal combined with declining incentives as we approach zero incentives and the programs end.

Though it is not part of the mandate of the commission to consider these statistics we feel that it is important to note that the solar industry employs nearly 150,000 Americans and is growing every day. Every 3 and half minutes a new solar energy system is installed in the United States. These are well paying construction jobs that cannot be outsourced overseas. The sun provides Florida with stable energy that does not come from across our border. It is energy that is generated here in Florida using our most popular resource.

The Florida industry is not asking for overly rich subsidies to promote solar, but simply for a clear and stable business environment in which to operate. One that sends the appropriate signals to ratepayers - incentives that decrease over time, not increase. The utilities have ignored this request on all accounts which is why the staff was easily able to come to the conclusions to terminate the programs. We are now relying on you the Commissioners to heed our requests and enforce make sense policy for the ratepayers of Florida.

The utilities could have avoided this by following the Florida Solar Coalitions recommendations in 2009 and followed a simple market price decline and the residential solar rebate would be approximately \$1.00/watt.

The Utilities have blatantly avoided a simple way of increasing the programs participation rates and it is time to require the utilities to lower the incentive amount for the 2015 program launch to \$0.50 cents per watt. This would positively impact promoting solar energy in Florida all while maintaining the funding cap established in order PSC-09-0855-FOF-EG.

Though this appears to be a dramatic step downward in incentive, it signals to the ratepayers of Florida that solar energy should be considered, pricing has come down, the market is maturing and rebates do not and should not last forever. It also supports staffs favorable recommendation that Florida's Net-Metering rule is supportive of an incentive free solar market.

If the Commission believes this request is prudent and the best decision for ratepayers, participants and reasonable use of funds it would require the utilities to make the adjustment to the program prior to the January launch as part of the order on November 25th.

Regarding the future of the Solar Pilot Programs, we believe that they should have been designed to have a MW goal accompanied with a smooth transition to an incentive less market. We urge the Commission, rather than terminate the Solar Pilot Programs, extend them for 1 more year following the 2015 launch with a MW Goal combined with declining incentives as we approach zero incentives and the programs end.

Though it is not part of the mandate of the commission to consider these statistics we feel that it is important to note that the solar industry employs nearly 150,000 Americans and is growing everyday. Every 3 and half minutes a new solar energy system is installed in the United States. These are well paying construction jobs that cannot be outsourced overseas. The sun provides Florida with stable energy that does not come from across our border. It is energy that is generated here in Florida using our most popular resource.

The Florida industry is not asking for overly rich subsidies to promote solar, but simply for a clear and stable business environment in which to operate. One that sends the appropriate signals to ratepayers incentives that decrease over time, not increase. The utilities have ignored this request on all accounts which is why the staff was easily able to come to the conclusions to terminate the programs. We are now relying on you the Commissioners to heed our requests and enforce make sense policy for the ratepayers of Florida.

Dean Commissioner Balbis,

There has been a lot of back and forth with regards to solar pilot programs that have expired. It seems that TECO, Duke and FPL all feel that energy efficiency costs per kWh saved are greater than what they can generate and sell a new kWh now. Let me state that most of the discussions center around Solar PV or the electric panels while you hear little if any on solar water heating systems.

It could be argued as it is, by the utility companies, that they are in fact, in business to generate electricity and make a return for their share holders. Ulike most companies, their rate of return or profit is limited to around 12 or 13% or as dictated by the PUC. So, on the one hand, you have to ask yourself, why does it make sense to ask utility companies to pay for programs that actually reduce their profit? In a real sense, it is like asking General Motors to pay for me to install energy efficiency improvements on my Chevy Truck to improve its fuel economy rating so I don't need to buy a new vehicle. The concept is ridiculous.

On the other hand, by virtue of being a monopoly and the unique guidelines that govern their operations, utiltiy companies can actually be allowed to charge existing rate payers for the cost of building new power plants and generating capacity long before that new production is realized. This makes the case for looking at other strategies that have a lower impact on rates, the environment, and jobs creation. Of course, most people have no idea that some of their bill is covering these expenses so it is rarely questioned.

In my case, my company makes solar water heating equipment. This is a proven technology that offers significant benefits to the utility companies:

- 1. Storage. Unlike PV, Solar water heating has built in energy storage.
- 2. Not connected to the grid. This whole argument about the wealthy owners of solar systems being paid for on the backs of poor rate payers, simply does not apply to solar thermal since solar thermal water heating does not use the Utiltiy power lines, transformers or switch gear.
- 3. Back up element can be radio controlled. Due to the combination of storage and an electric back up element, utilities can remote control the backup element to turn it off when they experience periods of peak demand like on cold mornings in the winter. Solar thermal water heating can actually help the utility more effectively load level their output by allowing the backup elements to come on at say 4:00AM but cut them off at the peak times of around 5:30 to 6:00AM so that they do not have to run expensive peaking units. PV does not offer this benefit since it has no built in storage.
- 4. The cost per watt offset is greater than with a PV system. A 4x10 solar water heating panel, the most common size installed in Florida, has an approximate equivalent output of about 2100 watts. Most modern PV modules are in the 230 watt range.

Maybe a better strategy for Florida, would be to do what Hawaii has done and just require a solar water heating system on all new homes. This helps to kick the volume higher, lowers cost due to economies of scale, puts the cost of the system into the 30 year mortgage and since Florida does most residential water heating with electricity, will have a huge impact for the utility companies to mitigate new plant construction. This can be done without a utility rebate program. In addition, it has been estimated that 80% or more of Floridians, feel that the state needs to do more with Solar but feel it is too costly and no one wants to pay more on their utility bill to subsidize it.

Just so you know, while Florida lags behind California, New Jersey and now possibly New York in Solar PV, it ranks in the top 3 for solar water heating and has since the late 70's.

Finally, make no mistake, natural gas prices are not going to remain at the historically low figures that they are now forever and Florida is especially vulnerable to spikes and shortages. Look at the attached Boston Globe article that predicts electric rates will rise 37% this year for the North east. This is because the main gas line is not large enough to provide the volume of gas during peak demand events. Florida could have the same problem. Not long ago, FPL used to generate 50% of it's electricity from coal. Now, 70% from Natural gas. Duke just closed down the Crystal River Nuclear Station and will replace it with a gas unit. Consider that this gas comes from a hurricane prone area; the gulf coast. The issue of cost per kWh may be a secondary issue to being able to get power at all if we are hit with the storms we had back in 2003. Use of a technology like solar water heating that can actually store energy, can pull demand off the grid and allow more electricity to be used for more productive activities like running refrigerators for food and meds and oxygen machines for seniors.

Ask yourself, how will you respond in the town hall meetings when the utilities need to raise rates because gas went up and what did you do to mitigate that?



Dean Commissioner Balbis,

There has been a lot of back and forth with regards to solar pilot programs that have expired. It seems that TECO, Duke and FPL all feel that energy efficiency costs per kWh saved are greater than what they can generate and sell a new kWh now. Let me state that most of the discussions center around Solar PV or the electric panels while you hear little if any on solar water heating systems.

It could be argued as it is, by the utility companies, that they are in fact, in business to generate electricity and make a return for their share holders. Ulike most companies, their rate of return or profit is limited to around 12 or 13% or as dictated by the PUC. So, on the one hand, you have to ask yourself, why does it make sense to ask utility companies to pay for programs that actually reduce their profit? In a real sense, it is like asking General Motors to pay for me to install energy efficiency improvements on my Chevy Truck to improve its fuel economy rating so I don't need to buy a new vehicle. The concept is ridiculous.

On the other hand, by virtue of being a monopoly and the unique guidelines that govern their operations, utiltiy companies can actually be allowed to charge existing rate payers for the cost of building new power plants and generating capacity long before that new production is realized. This makes the case for looking at other strategies that have a lower impact on rates, the environment, and jobs creation. Of course, most people have no idea that some of their bill is covering these expenses so it is rarely questioned.

In my case, my company makes solar water heating equipment. This is a proven technology that offers significant benefits to the utility companies:

- 1. Storage. Unlike PV, Solar water heating has built in energy storage.
- 2. Not connected to the grid. This whole argument about the wealthy owners of solar systems being paid for on the backs of poor rate payers, simply does not apply to solar thermal since solar thermal water heating does not use the Utiltiy power lines, transformers or switch gear.
- 3. Back up element can be radio controlled. Due to the combination of storage and an electric back up element, utilities can remote control the backup element to turn it off when they experience periods of peak demand like on cold mornings in the winter. Solar thermal water heating can actually help the utility more effectively load level their output by allowing the backup elements to come on at say 4:00AM but cut them off at the peak times of around 5:30 to 6:00AM so that they do not have to run expensive peaking units. PV does not offer this benefit since it has no built in storage.
- 4. The cost per watt offset is greater than with a PV system. A 4x10 solar water heating panel, the most common size installed in Florida, has an approximate equivalent output of about 2100 watts. Most modern PV modules are in the 230 watt range.

Maybe a better strategy for Florida, would be to do what Hawaii has done and just require a solar water heating system on all new homes. This helps to kick the volume higher, lowers cost due to economies of scale, puts the cost of the system into the 30 year mortgage and since Florida does most residential water heating with electricity, will have a huge impact for the utility companies to mitigate new plant construction. This can be done without a utility rebate program. In addition, it has been estimated that 80% or more of Floridians, feel that the state needs to do more with Solar but feel it is too costly and no one wants to pay more on their utility bill to subsidize it.

Just so you know, while Florida lags behind California, New Jersey and now possibly New York in Solar PV, it ranks in the top 3 for solar water heating and has since the late 70's.

Finally, make no mistake, natural gas prices are not going to remain at the historically low figures that they are now forever and Florida is especially vulnerable to spikes and shortages. Look at the attached Boston Globe article that predicts electric rates will rise 37% this year for the North east. This is because the main gas line is not large enough to provide the volume of gas during peak demand events. Florida could have the same problem. Not long ago, FPL used to generate 50% of it's electricity from coal. Now, 70% from Natural gas. Duke just closed down the Crystal River Nuclear Station and will replace it with a gas unit. Consider that this gas comes from a hurricane prone area; the gulf coast. The issue of cost per kWh may be a secondary issue to being able to get power at all if we are hit with the storms we had back in 2003. Use of a technology like solar water heating that can actually store energy, can pull demand off the grid and allow more electricity to be used for more productive activities like running refrigerators for food and meds and oxygen machines for seniors.

Ask yourself, how will you respond in the town hall meetings when the utilities need to raise rates because gas went up and what did you do to mitigate that?



Dean Commissioner Brown,

There has been a lot of back and forth with regards to solar pilot programs that have expired. It seems that TECO, Duke and FPL all feel that energy efficiency costs per kWh saved are greater than what they can generate and sell a new kWh now. Let me state that most of the discussions center around Solar PV or the electric panels while you hear little if any on solar water heating systems.

It could be argued as it is, by the utility companies, that they are in fact, in business to generate electricity and make a return for their share holders. Ulike most companies, their rate of return or profit is limited to around 12 or 13% or as dictated by the PUC. So, on the one hand, you have to ask yourself, why does it make sense to ask utility companies to pay for programs that actually reduce their profit? In a real sense, it is like asking General Motors to pay for me to install energy efficiency improvements on my Chevy Truck to improve its fuel economy rating so I don't need to buy a new vehicle. The concept is ridiculous.

On the other hand, by virtue of being a monopoly and the unique guidelines that govern their operations, utiltiy companies can actually be allowed to charge existing rate payers for the cost of building new power plants and generating capacity long before that new production is realized. This makes the case for looking at other strategies that have a lower impact on rates, the environment, and jobs creation. Of course, most people have no idea that some of their bill is covering these expenses so it is rarely questioned.

In my case, my company makes solar water heating equipment. This is a proven technology that offers significant benefits to the utility companies:

- 1. Storage. Unlike PV, Solar water heating has built in energy storage.
- 2. Not connected to the grid. This whole argument about the wealthy owners of solar systems being paid for on the backs of poor rate payers, simply does not apply to solar thermal since solar thermal water heating does not use the Utiltiy power lines, transformers or switch gear.
- 3. Back up element can be radio controlled. Due to the combination of storage and an electric back up element, utilities can remote control the backup element to turn it off when they experience periods of peak demand like on cold mornings in the winter. Solar thermal water heating can actually help the utility more effectively load level their output by allowing the backup elements to come on at say 4:00AM but cut them off at the peak times of around 5:30 to 6:00AM so that they do not have to run expensive peaking units. PV does not offer this benefit since it has no built in storage.
- 4. The cost per watt offset is greater than with a PV system. A 4x10 solar water heating panel, the most common size installed in Florida, has an approximate equivalent output of about 2100 watts. Most modern PV modules are in the 230 watt range.

Maybe a better strategy for Florida, would be to do what Hawaii has done and just require a solar water heating system on all new homes. This helps to kick the volume higher, lowers cost due to economies of scale, puts the cost of the system into the 30 year mortgage and since Florida does most residential water heating with electricity, will have a huge impact for the utility companies to mitigate new plant construction. This can be done without a utility rebate program. In addition, it has been estimated that 80% or more of Floridians, feel that the state needs to do more with Solar but feel it is too costly and no one wants to pay more on their utility bill to subsidize it.

Just so you know, while Florida lags behind California, New Jersey and now possibly New York in Solar PV, it ranks in the top 3 for solar water heating and has since the late 70's.

Finally, make no mistake, natural gas prices are not going to remain at the historically low figures that they are now forever and Florida is especially vulnerable to spikes and shortages. Look at the attached Boston Globe article that predicts electric rates will rise 37% this year for the North east. This is because the main gas line is not large enough to provide the volume of gas during peak demand events. Florida could have the same problem. Not long ago, FPL used to generate 50% of it's electricity from coal. Now, 70% from Natural gas. Duke just closed down the Crystal River Nuclear Station and will replace it with a gas unit. Consider that this gas comes from a hurricane prone area; the gulf coast. The issue of cost per kWh may be a secondary issue to being able to get power at all if we are hit with the storms we had back in 2003. Use of a technology like solar water heating that can actually store energy, can pull demand off the grid and allow more electricity to be used for more productive activities like running refrigerators for food and meds and oxygen machines for seniors.

Ask yourself, how will you respond in the town hall meetings when the utilities need to raise rates because gas went up and what did you do to mitigate tha

In response to the Aug. 17 story, "Florida among the states with tons of sun but rules that prevent using it" by Evan Halper:

Florida is one of only a dozen states that does not have a renewable energy

standards portfolio, either mandatory or voluntary. The purpose of these standards are stated as, "Policies designed to increase generation of electricity from renewable resources."

Contrary to what the Public Service Commission is proposing, energy efficiency and renewable energy mandates must be part of the energy mix to sustain Florida's future and our state must establish a renewable energy standards portfolio. For Floridians this would mean putting cleaner skies ahead of the state's 15 coal-fired power plants. Two possible scenarios can play out. One, the re-

placement power will only come from natural gas as FP&L proposes. Or two, Florida will join the 21 century and incentivize the state utilities to mix it up with renewables and greater energy efficiency standards.

The second scenario provides a more stable and secure future for all Floridians and our economy. Renewable energy credit structures could be set in place to have an effective market system that government (state and federal), utilities and consumers participate in to reduce our reliance on carbon-intensive power while increasing the grids resiliency to spikes, outages and the like.

"The Perfect Climate" For Business is the official slogan for Enterprise Florida, the state's office of economic development. Their website quotes "Floridians understand the undeniable link between sustainability and the economy, and are building a robust clean tech industry." Cleaning the air means thousands of new jobs and billions of dollars invested in replacing those outdated coal plants. The right way to accomplish this goal is with a mix

of clean power options.

Hundreds of clean-tech energy suppliers and manufacturers, subcontractors and alike could provide alternative wind, sun, algae, bio-fuels and fuel-cell derived power along with micro-grids that would flourish in Florida but only with economic incentives from Tallahassee.

The new EPA rules outlined in the Clean Power Plan are the right direction for Florida, and will improve the state's energy efficiency, environment and overall economy.

Our state's dominate base-load electric power source, coal, dates back to the 1800's and is caus-

ing rising sea levels and the erosion of our beautiful beaches.

As we continue to face this debate between the renewable and conventional energy, big oil focuses on shale gas, which has ignited a tipping point in energy. This tipping point is the phase out of black carbon (coal) power to lower carbon emission sources to meet new EPA clean-air guidelines.

What does this mean for the Sunshine State? We have the most to gain by effectively meeting these standards. A new clean energy mandate out of Tallahassee now, while our beaches are still around, will become a strong economic driver and set Florida up as an example to be followed by other coastal states in the South.

The good news for big energy players here, Duke, NextEra/FPL, Teco, JEA, FMPA and others, is they can play the central role in helping Florida come in to the 21st century clean-power equation. In renewable energy and energy efficiency projects, we have worked on across America, a mix of players successfully partnered together. Some of which are and were the biggest carbon emitters in the U.S., and by putting aside politics, we made a big difference in achieving reductions in the use of coal and oil.

Florida is soon to be the third biggest state in the nation and the 16th biggest economy in the world with a GDP approaching \$1 trillion. We can and need to make a difference today. There is no time to waste.

Some ideas on how to make that happen include an increased focus on solar energy. Solar is poised to be a leader to a brighter, cleaner energy economy here in Florida. We are light years behind other states in this area. We need no less than 1,000 megawatts (1 gigawatt) a year of new, cleaner power (including natural gas cycled turbine power) installed for the next 15 years to meet federal guidelines. We also need stronger conservation mandates to meet our growing energy needs and protect our way of life.

Critics will argue the balance of cost versus benefits. Well, the benefits for Florida are unmistakable. While the risk for the Sunshine State would be irreversible; beaches gone, tourists gone, drinkable water gone and more. Cheap, dirty coal power is forever a thing of the past in the

U.S., and so are its detractors.

Who would have thought big oil would be the tipping point to have built the bridge to a brighter, cleaner energy future for the United States' power hungry economy? Let's lead the way to a more economically rich future in Florida while protecting our way of life with clean energy legislation to support the execution of the new EPA guidelines.

Ambiguities could muddy the waters of EPA's existing, new power plant rules

Attendees at the annual meeting of the National Association of Regulatory Utility

Commissioners on Sunday heard from two legal experts discuss ambiguities between section 111 (b) of the Clean Air Act, covering new power plants, and 111 (d) of the Act addressed to existing plants. They were among many complications that could fuel litigation over rules the

Environmental Protection Agency will promulgate to enforce both provisions. Roger Martella of the Sidley Austin firm, a former EPA general counsel, said it was unclear what the timing might be for adopting the two rules, but that June 2015 was a firm deadline for the 111 (d) rule. Litigation is likely to swiftly follow adoption, he said. Martella opined that EPA's strongest argument is the very purpose of the rile—climate change—which has been given deference by federal appeals courts. Appellants' strongest line of attack, he said, might be that third parties could be held liable for the actions of others, as could happen here, with both utilities and states under the gun. Rishi Garg, general counsel for the National Regulatory Research Institute, addressed interactions between section 111 (d) and the Federal Power Act and focused on a lack of clarity on what is a new and what is an existing source.

Nevada Power to regulators: Reconsider decision to axe \$438M solar plant

Nevada Power has petitioned the Nevada Public Utilities Commission to reconsider its decision to reject construction of a 200-MW solar project on the Moapa River Paiute Indian Reservation as part of the utility's plan to retire its coal-fired electricity generation within the next five years. The commission voted 2-1 on Oct. 27 to reject the \$438 million solar facility on the basis it was not needed and too costly. Approving the Moapa project would provide value to customers through incremental fuel diversity, generate construction jobs, and yield a net positive impact on Nevada's economy," the petition says. The commission's action, says the utility, a unit of Berkshire Hathaway Energy's NV Energy, "increases Nevada Power's dependence on natural gas, a resource that does not exist in this state in any significant quantity, and increases the price exposure of Nevada Power's customers to fluctuation in the natural gas markets." Sen. Harry Reid called the vote a setback for all Nevadans, according to the Las Vegas Review Journal.

What price tag nuclear decommissioning?

While capital and replacement costs of nuclear generating plants are a huge deterrent to their future development, the end-of-life costs associated with these plants is equally daunting, maintains the EnergyDigital website. In the US, 200 nuclear reactors are due to be shut down by 2040 at an estimated \$100 billion in decommissioning costs. Now the International Energy

Agency is warning governments that there are "considerable uncertainties" about these costs, citing governments' limited experience in the matter. Only ten plants have been decommissioned in the last 40 years. The most recent estimate in the US comes from the San Onofre Nuclear Power Plant. According to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the process could take around 20 years and cost \$4.4 billion, or about \$2.1 million/MW installed, the most ever for such a decommissioning. Adding to the debit side of the ledger, a major cost not considered part of decommissioning proper is the cost of storing nuclear waste produced by the plant. As of right now, there are no commercial facilities to do so. The cost of dry cask storage for the spent fuel onsite and security that might be required adds only question marks to the burden.

Foundation blasts Ivanpah solar plant's request for a grant to pay off its Ioan

Having earlier received a \$1.6 billion construction loan from U.S. taxpayers, the libertarian think tank Reason Foundation says the wealthy investors of a concentrating solar thermal power plant in California's Mojave Desert now want a \$539 million federal grant to pay off their federal loan. Terming the request an unwarranted bailout, Reason Foundation VP of Research Julian Morris called the plan "rather obscene." The Ivanpah solar electric generating plant is owned by Google and diversified energy giant NRG, which are on the hook for paying off the loan. But if approved by the US Treasury, the two companies would use taxpayer funds to pay off the borrowed 30 percent of the plant's cost. Taxpayers would receive none of the millions in revenues the plant will generate over the next 30 years, said the foundation. Ivanpah has produced only one-quarter of the power it was expected to during the first eight months of 2014.

- 16 and the environmental benefits of an energy
- 17 efficient economy. Now, across the country utility
- 18 companies are investing in efficiency to cut monthly
- 19 energy bills, and they are doing more on solar and
- 20 wind, but Florida lags way behind most of the
- 21 country, as you will learn tonight.
- Florida electric utilities have now submitted 22
- 23 their request to the Public Service Commission, and
- 24 it is bad news. Their proposed energy saving goals
- 25 are unprecedented lows. They want to eliminate

- solar pilot projects. This means we will have 1
- 2 higher energy bills for rate payers and pollution
- 3 from new unnecessary power plants. The Public
- 4 Service Commission needs to hear from us. We asked
- 5 for a public hearing. We asked them to come here to
- 6 Pinellas County or somewhere else in Florida and
- 7 hold a public hearing. They said no. They're
- 8 isolated in Tallahassee, comfortable to be there.
- 9 They said no. Here is a direct quote from the chair
- 10 of the Public Service Commission, quote, given the

- $$140702pu\ -\ Vol_\ I$$ technical nature of this goal-setting procedure and 11
- 12 non-legislative directs you to take public
- 13 testimony, I do not find it necessary to hold a
- 14 public hearing. Persons without the resources to
- 15 intervene may file written comments in the docket.
- We are here tonight at the citizens hearing to 16
- 17 make sure that all of our voices are heard. There
- is a court reporter present who will be recording 18
- 19 our comments. We will have some experts testify and
- 20 then hear from the public so that all of you can let
- 21 the Commission know that you want energy savings to
- 22 protect our health and lower our bills. This is
- 23 your hearing, and we encourage you to provide your
- 24 comments tonight.
- Now, I would like to introduce three of 25

Florida's top advocates and organizers who are with

- 2 us; first is Julia Hathaway. Julia, raise your
- hand. 3

- 4 (Audience applauds)
- MR. JACKALON: Julia is the Sierra Club's 5
- 6 representative who served as the first organizer for
- the Sunshine State Clean Energy Coalition and helped 7
- 8 to coordinate tonight's event. The other
- 9 coordinator of the hearing tonight is Sierra Club
- 10 conservation organizer Britton Cleveland. Britton,
- 11 are you there?
- 12 (Audience applauds)
- 13 MR. JACKALON: And finally, I would like to

- 15 Tim Heberlein, the political director of the Florida
- Consumer Action Network, one of the co-founders of 16
- 17 the Sunshine State Clean Energy Coalition. I am

- staff full-time next week. 19
- 20 (Audience applauds)
- 21 MR. JACKALON: Tim will serve as our MC for the
- 22 rest of the program tonight. Tim, take it away.
- 23 MR. HEBERLEIN: Thank you very much. Again,
- 24 welcome. Thank you. That is very loud. My name is
- 25 Tim Heberlein, I'm the political director of the

- 1 Florida Consumer Action Network, and I will be your
- 2 MC for tonight. Just before we get started, I'll
- 3 want to lay out some ground rules. We will have
- some expert testimony as Frank mentioned, as well as 4
- 5 receive public comments. Please when you are making
- your statements, please direct them at the PSC, or 6
- 7 to the commission, if you were, because we will be
- 8 submitting these to the official record on the 21st
- 9 in Tallahassee when the PSC has their hearing there.
- As Frank mentioned, why are we here, the 10
- 11 Sunshine State Clean Energy Coalition believes that
- 12 your voices need to be heard. So thank you very

- 21 the Sierra Club, go ahead.
- 22 MS. MARTIN: Good evening, folks. We are
- 23 moving into the public testimony portion of the
- 24 evening, so I'm going to kick us off. My name is
- 25 Kelly Martin, and I'm the senior campaign

- 1 representative with the Sierra Club, Beyond Coal
- 2 Campaign. I'm here tonight to ask the Public
- 3 Services Commission to set much, much higher energy
- 4 savings goals than the ones that the big power
- 5 companies have proposed, because saving energy
- 6 through efficiency is the cheapest, fastest and
- 7 safest way to meet Florida's electricity needs.
- 8 There is a huge opportunity here in Florida to save
- 9 more energy and more money starting right now in
- 10 2014. Simple things, simple programs can go a
- 11 really long way, compact florescent light bulbs,
- 12 modern appliances that use less electricity, energy
- 13 audits and good insulation so that air conditioning
- 14 cools the inside of our homes and not the outside,
- 15 and through setting strong goals, the Commission
- 16 should hold the big power companies accountable for
- 17 helping all customers install these efficiency
- 18 measures and gain the benefits of lower power bills
- 19 and the benefits of energy efficiency investments
- 20 going far beyond low power bills. They help create
- 21 local jobs.
- 22 If the big utilities in Florida were to match

- $$140702 \, \text{pu} \text{Vol}_{_}\text{I}$$ the industry standard for investments in energy 23
- 24 efficiency that one percent of the previous years
- retail sales that most -- a lot of states, more than 25

2

- 1 half the states nationwide are hitting, we would
- 2 create here in Florida 900 jobs in the first year
- 3 alone, and consumers would save \$10 million on their
- electric bills over the life of these energy 4
- 5 efficiency programs. But instead, Florida's power
- 6 companies have proposed dramatic, unprecedented
- 7 reductions from the modest annual energy savings
- 8 that they currently achieve. That is a giant step
- 9 backwards, and it means higher power bills, economic
- 10 stagnation and dirty air. What is proposed by the
- 11 power companies are unwise because they fail to look
- 12 ahead and to acknowledge that saving energy can help
- 13 save avoid expensive new power plants and expensive
- 14 pollution controls for the old plants.
- So just recently, as you heard, the U.S. 15
- 16 Environmental Protection Agency has announced
- 17 historic carbon pollution standards, and they will
- 18 require that we reduce our emissions in every state,
- and part of that includes a one-and-a-half percent 19
- 20 annual energy savings, energy efficiency savings
- related -- which is relative to sales by 2020 and in 21
- 22 every state including Florida, and the utilities --
- 23 the utilities' goals that they propose right now in
- 24 this energy savings proceeding, also known as PIKA,
- 25 are nowhere near the standard, and so that means

- 1 that they are failing to capture the savings for
- 2 peoples' bills, and they are also -- how on earth --
- 3 how on earth is Florida going to meet the carbon
- 4 pollution standard if they are not maximizing
- 5 investments in energy efficiency. That is the
- 6 cheapest, that's the fastest and that is the safest
- 7 way to reduce our emissions.
- 8 So let's be clear, Florida ranks 27th in the
- 9 country on energy efficiency. North Carolina,
- 10 South Carolina, Ohio, all the other states where
- 11 Duke Energy operates, are all achieving much, much
- 12 higher energy savings every year. Even Arkansas is
- 13 achieving much higher energy savings every year, and
- 14 here is one reason why, so when the utilities
- 15 propose the goals they look at what is cost
- 16 effective, which makes sense, but what happens is
- 17 they're using a really flawed analysis to look at
- 18 cost effectiveness. Nearly every state in the
- 19 country has rejected the analysis that Florida
- 20 companies are using. It is called the rate impact
- 21 measure test and the two-year payback provision, and
- 22 what these are is they are very limiting. They are
- 23 really narrow ways to look at whether a particular
- 24 energy efficiency measure is in the consumer's
- 25 interest, and as a result, the companies, Florida

- 1 companies are missing out on most of the great
- 2 energy efficiency programs that are working all over
- 3 the country to reduce bills, reduce pollution and
- 4 protect our interest.
- 5 All right. So I'm going to try out an analogy
- 6 here and I think it is kind of like this to describe
- 7 this cost effectiveness, so-called cost
- 8 effectiveness test. So pretend for a minute that
- 9 you are at a breakfast buffet, and you want to have
- 10 a big fruit salad for breakfast, right? You want it
- 11 to be full of delicious fruits that are chockful of
- 12 vitamins and minerals and nutrients are good for
- 13 your health, right? And then you go up to the
- 14 buffet, and it has got this weird section where only
- 15 the blueberries are available, and all the other
- 16 fruits are like behind a glass cage that you can't
- 17 get to, and then somewhere along the way you learn
- 18 that maybe a pork company backs the restaurant, and
- 19 you start to think that might be weird, and then you
- 20 see that your only option for this big, healthy
- 21 fruit salad that you want is these expensive
- 22 blueberries; the watermelon, the oranges, the
- 23 peaches, raspberries, grapefruits, they are all off
- 24 limits, right? So what was going to be your big,
- 25 healthy fruit salad is limited to the boring, narrow

- 13
- 1 option of blueberries that are more expensive than
- 2 the other fruits, and then slowly bacon starts to
- 3 look pretty good and the waffles look pretty good, Page 11

- 4 and your pathetic blueberries aren't even looking
- 5 very appetizing or cheap anymore, so why even
- 6 bother.
- 7 So this little silly rule about what kind of
- 8 fruit you can have means that you have ended up with
- 9 a meal that has no vitamins, no minerals, little
- 10 nutrition and leaves all these delicious and lovely
- 11 options left on the table, and that is how this
- 12 screen works for the utilities what they are looking
- 13 at. It is an arbitrary rule. The limits the
- 14 options that allows us to make the best choices for
- 15 energy efficiency. The leaves awesome energy
- 16 efficiency and ion solar programs on the table that
- 17 consumers in Florida can't take advantage of, and it
- 18 makes the options much like the bacon and waffles.
- 19 It makes the options to build new expensive,
- 20 polluting power plants much more palatable. They,
- 21 all of the sudden, look like better options than
- 22 energy efficiency, and it skewes with the results
- 23 for options that pays more money for the
- 24 shareholders and less options available that save
- 25 money for consumers and protect our health. So I

- 14
- 1 ask the Public Service Commission to please leave
- 2 behind this flawed test that the utilities use and
- 3 allow customers better choices for energy savings
- 4 like is happening all over the country.
- 5 I will close with this, so I'm a mom, probably
- 6 like many of you in the room, and I like to make Page 12

- 7 sure my kids eat healthy fruits and vegetables such
- 8 as you could tell in my analogy, but I have three
- 9 small children, and I worry about their future, and
- 10 what their future looks like, really quite literally
- 11 keeps me up at night. We're already feeling the
- 12 impact of climate disruption from super storms and
- 13 severe temperatures to droughts out west and eroding
- 14 beaches. Climate change is on our doorstep, and
- 15 power plants are the largest source of carbon
- 16 pollution of causing climate changes.
- 17 This Commission right now this summer has an
- 18 opportunity to set easy high goals for the utilities
- 19 for energy savings. It is the cheapest way, the
- 20 easiest way to reduce our reliance on dangerous and
- 21 polluting fossil fuels, to reduce our carbon
- 22 emissions, to mitigate the worst impact of climate
- 23 change, because our window to act on climate is
- 24 closing. We are the last generation of people that
- 25 can act. By the time that my three children are

2

- 1 grown up and are my age, our window to act on
- 2 climate will have closed.
- 3 So I ask the Commission to please hear our call

- 4 for more energy savings and set these high goal for
- 5 energy efficiency that are on par with nationwide
- 6 standards, to expand these narrow tests that
- 7 utilities use to calculate what programs are cost
- 8 effective and to protect and expand the solar pilot
- 9 programs, and by doing so, the Commission will help Page 13

- 10 protect clean air and clean water and create jobs in
- 11 the clean energy economy, saving millions of dollars
- 12 for our consumers. So thank you very much for that
- 13 opportunity to testify.
- 14 MR. HEBERLEIN: Thank you very much, Kelly.
- 15 I'm glad you are staying and we are going to
- 16 the timely comment portion of tonight's meeting.
- 17 REVEREND BELL: Good evening, everyone. I'm
- 18 Reverend Andy Bell. I'm a licensed psychotherapist
- 19 here in St. Petersburg, and I come here tonight as a
- 20 representative of Sunshine State Interfaith Power &
- 21 Light. We have been told that these issues are far
- 22 too complex for us mere public folks to understand.
- 23 There are certain things I understand that I want to
- 24 try to address them very quickly tonight. I
- 25 understand that our governor may say he doesn't get

- 1 it. I understand that he is being told it is too
- 2 complex even for him to understand, but what I do
- 3 understand is this, I am one of those many, many
- 4 people in the state who suffers with asthma. I am
- 5 thrilled that my asthma doctor is here this evening
- 6 and is much more educated on these issues, and I
- 7 know that she is going to be an advocate, as well.
- 8 I understand it when energy is produced, we
- 9 need energy, we do, but when it is produced in a way
- 10 that causes toxins to flow into the atmosphere it
- 11 causes our children to be sick. It causes our
- 12 elderly to be sick. I also understand that the Page 14

- 13 solar panels that are on my house work well. I
- 14 understand that at my home we haven't paid a power
- 15 bill to Duke or Province in over two years. I get
- 16 that. I also understand solar works. I understand
- 17 energy efficiency works. I understand energy
- 18 efficiency is the least expensive option for some
- 19 people.
- I want to sum up by telling you about Martha.
- 21 Martha is a woman who has come to Lakewood United
- 22 Methodist Church, who comes in and she asks for
- 23 assistance with power bills, two months worth of
- 24 power bills that total over \$650. Martha is a
- 25 single grandmother raising two children with no

- 17
- 1 possible way to ever pay those bills. She lives in
- 2 a sieve, living in her home -- she is actually a
- 3 homeowner. Her home was built in the 1950s, typical
- 4 block style. She tries to air condition it. It is
- 5 like trying to air condition a sieve, and I
- 6 understand also that with a few hundred dollars
- 7 worth of energy efficiency programs savings would go
- 8 a long way in probably cutting that bill at least in
- 9 half, along with some good energy conservation
- 10 education. Martha is one of many.
- 11 In closing, now Martha is one of many. Every
- 12 church, every synagogue, every mosque, every house
- 13 of faith, every social welfare organization in
- 14 Florida is deluged with people just like Martha,
- 15 every year. We need to call on the Public Service Page 15

- 16 Commission to actually step up to help our brothers
- 17 and sisters who can have affordable air conditioning
- 18 in their home, who can have affordable power, and we
- 19 need the public service commission to satisfy our
- 20 request to stand up to help them. We have to do
- 21 this. Thank you.
- 22 (Applause)
- MR. HEBERLEIN: Thank you very much.
- 24 MS. HAYES: Hello. My name is Maria Hayes. I
- 25 live in St. Petersburg, Florida. I'm here to speak

- 18
- 1 to the PSC. I may not be a financial analyst, but
- 2 what I do understand is that under the state law the
- 3 PSC must ensure our electric rates are as low as
- 4 possible, and currently we are ranked ninth in the
- 5 country, but that is slowly changing due to
- 6 increasing temperatures here in Florida. I remember
- 7 last year, last summer, and I am not one to get
- 8 overheated, I actually like it to be 75 degrees and
- 9 seem comfortable. I actually feel cold in my home.
- 10 I have the thermostat set around 78 to 80. I like
- 11 to keep it that way because it is energy efficient,
- 12 but this year I have noticed, because of the
- 13 increasing heat and because of global warming, my AC
- 14 is constantly running. I am a single mother of two
- 15 children on a single income. I don't receive any
- 16 help. So for me, utility bills matter to me, just
- 17 like I pay my rent, just like I pay my car
- 18 insurance. Utility bills are slowly raising, and Page 16

- 19 that means less money for investing in my children,
- 20 less money for them to go to after-school programs,
- 21 less money for -- you know, clothing, decide whether
- 22 to pay the bills or to, you know, opt out of paying
- 23 medical costs and things like that. So that is a
- 24 huge concern for me.
- 25 The other thing is that fossil fuels and

우

- 1 nuclear power is expensive and harmful to the
- 2 environment, while solar power is inexpensive, and
- 3 we have an abundance here in Florida. We are the
- 4 Sunshine State, and I, like the other gentleman that
- 5 spoke, I suffer from chronic allergies and
- 6 respiratory issues, and so does my eldest daughter,
- 7 and this last spring we had a ridiculously high
- 8 pollen count. It made me so sick I couldn't
- 9 function, even to the point where I broke out into
- 10 hives for several days. I couldn't get rid of them.
- 11 This affects us. It affects us financially. It
- 12 affects our health. So in conclusion, we need
- 13 financial, efficient renewal goals here in the State
- 14 of Florida, and Floridians just can't afford this
- 15 anymore, and it is just not sustainable. Thank you.
- 16 (Applause)
- 17 MR. HEBERLEIN: Thank you.
- 18 SPEAKER: Good evening, everyone. My name is
- 19 Neo Constintino. I'm with a small public interest
- 20 think tank called Camelot Florida. Our mission goal
- 21 is Florida first and quality of life and sustainable Page 17

- 22 living, and we had put together a program twelve
- 23 years ago at the University of South Florida clean
- 24 energy where we saved -- put saved the Frenchen
- 25 Trail Bridge and then we put panels on the bridge.

우

- 1 Well, that didn't work for a lot of reasons, but
- 2 history repeats itself. So we are back again. The
- 3 bridge is there, but we're smarter this time because
- 4 we want to put solar panels not only on the Frenchen
- 5 Trail Bridge, not only on the two other bridges on
- 6 the Gandy but all the bridges in Florida, all the
- 7 bridges in Tampa Bay. So words are good. It is
- 8 called talk the talk, and it is a wonderful talk to
- 9 talk tonight, but if you really want to do
- 10 something, an actionable item, something that gets
- 11 done and we're working together to get it done, look
- 12 at the Fourth of July as independence from these
- 13 four power companies. It is a new way of looking at
- 14 the Fourth of July. We are independent of these
- 15 people. We take control, and we can indeed put
- 16 solar panels on these eight bridges we have. We
- 17 could be solar and that could work, but we all have
- 18 to pull together to make it work, and we are asking
- 19 for your help tonight to make it work.
- 20 We can generate upwards of 100 megawatts of
- 21 solar panels, or we call it megasolarwatts instead
- 22 of megawatts, explain how it was generated. The
- 23 other thing on our production of energy, you can all
- 24 buy solar panels and join the coal op and then we Page 18

25 would install your panels on bridges. There is a

- 1 lot to it. We have a website. Thank you very much,
- 2 and thank you, all of you for being here.
- 3 (Applause)
- 4 SPEAKER: Hey, everybody. My name is Mike
- 5 Antheil. I'm the executive director of a group
- 6 called the Florida Alliance for Renewable Energy.
- 7 I'll be real quick. We just want to hopefully
- 8 convey this message to the Public Service
- 9 Commission. That message is simply that the eyes of
- 10 the state are on this process, the eyes of the state
- 11 are on the Public Service Commission and the folks
- 12 that are up there making decisions on our behalf. I
- 13 have traveled all around, probably to every city in
- 14 this state with Susan and some others working
- 15 renewable energy. We are a trade association. We
- 16 essentially represent the solar businesses,
- 17 renewable energy businesses in the state. I can
- 18 tell you just like the people that are in this room
- 19 tonight there are pockets all across the state of
- 20 people that are very serious about taking control
- 21 and taking renewable energy a little more serious
- 22 than some of our decision-makers are. Right now we
- 23 can tell you firsthand there is this drumbeat.
- 24 There is this slow and steady drumbeat, and every
- 25 time another nuclear power plant gets commissioned,

- 1 the drumbeats a little louder. Every time a million
- 2 dollars flows into the coffers of whoever is
- 3 campaigning so on and so forth for the utilities,
- 4 the drumbeats a little louder. Every time the
- 5 public is denied input in a process where all times
- 6 the public should have input in that process, the
- 7 drumbeats a little louder, and I can tell you
- 8 without question that if the Public Service
- 9 Commission doesn't take their obligation to the
- 10 public serious, that the citizens and the public and
- 11 residents in the State of Florida are going to take
- 12 it upon themselves to take control and make change.
- 13 Thank you very much. I just want to say to
- 14 everybody that is here awesome conversation, love
- 15 the blueberry analysis, for this many elected
- 16 official representatives, all the commissioners
- 17 here, seriously fantastic and great
- 18 job, Sunshine State Energy Coalition. Thank you.
- 19 (Applause)
- 20 MR. HEBERLEIN: Thank you.
- 21 SPEAKER: My name is Jim Shirff. I live at
- 22 8705 Cove Court in Tampa, yes, the other side of the

- 2 G-o-w-e-n. Janet and I live at 104 Clippers Way in
- 3 Tarpon Springs. We have lived there for 20 years.
- 4 We are no longer Hoosiers. We are Floridians. Our

- $$140702pu\ -\ Vol_\ I$$ burial sites are in this county. I'm going to say 5
- 6 that lightly. Let's get serious for a moment.
- 7 There are 20 solar panels currently sitting on a
- 8 wastewater plant in Tarpon Springs as a \$50,000
- 9 pilot project that is one year old. It is working.
- If you are accepting any kind of exhibits tonight, 10
- 11 here is Exhibit No. 1 about that project. There is
- 12 example after example after example appearing in the
- 13 news to tell us that solar saves money. Scientists
- 14 recently told us in May of this year that Tampa Bay
- 15 is in the cross-hairs of climate change and
- 16 Senator Nelson called a conference in April of this
- year because of flooding in Miami Beach streets, the 17
- 18 beach erosion and the saltwater contamination, you
- may not know too much about that, are occurring now. 19
- 20 Pinellas County is ready to move on solar and
- other alternative sources. I won't pretend to speak 21
- 22 for that because Commissioner Welsh is here, but he
- 23 knows about a year ago I wrote him and challenged

- carefully is transit costs. When I start getting 3
- 4 people off the grid and then the utility goes to the
- Public Service Commission for more money because 5
- 6 they have less customers, you have big problems.

- SPEAKER: Hi, everybody. My name is Greg 11
- 12 Wilson. I'm the president of Windjammer Energy.
- 13 When I was designing my patent for a new type of

- 14 wind energy, our governor, Rick Scott, went to see
- 15 the Coke brothers, and he came back and did away
- 16 with all the federal grant money that was in the
- 17 state hands, and so I have been trying to come up
- 18 with funding for the last three years to get my
- 19 invention going. It is pretty simple. The sails in

MR. MESSINA: My name is Charles Messina,
M-e-s-s-i-n-a. For the intent of full disclosure,
I am a candidate for Florida State House
District 76 as a Democrat for Representative
Rodrigues.

I am here today to let the Public Service

Commission know that they are not acting as a good steward for the people that they represent here in Florida. They are neglecting the idea of creating a renewable portfolio standard, which there are only three states that don't have one, and Florida is one of them.

And we should be looking at clean renewal sources of energy here in the state of Florida. It would be an economic benefit to the people of the state of Florida because every year Florida consumes or purchases \$9 billion in fuel used to generate electric power for the state. If we invest in solar power, we would not have to spend that much money. There would be a huge savings for the consumers in the state.

And if we were to invest in solar power in the state of Florida, which we do in certain ways, in other ways we don't, the Public Service

Commission says that if you generate solar power -- or if you generate power, that you need to be regulated as a power generator.

There are companies that will come to our state, to our homes, and install solar panels and connect to the grid on a lease to purchase agreement, and the Public Service Commission refused to let that happen. Consequently, the only ones that can get solar panels or solar panels in their home are the affluent and well-heeled.

There was 119,000 solar jobs in the United States in 2013, and the state of Florida only participated to the tune of 2,500 solar jobs for a state with a population of 19 million. By the year 2030, there would be 220,000 more new solar jobs created, and I fear that the people of Florida will not be participating in these new good paying jobs.

The Public Service Commission needs to get out of the way of solar power and clean renewables and promote them instead of hindering them. I would recommend that the Public Service Commission approve the Babcock Ranch exemption -- exception, I'm sorry -- request, because this is a project in

Public Statements the state of Florida that has -- it's an excellent experiment for the development of solar energy in Florida. saying that there are entities, Babcock Ranch being one of them, that would like to have their own solar power generation facility. I know that Cape Coral is looking into the idea of taking over the business of distribution of power in their area because companies like LCEC are just middling the deal, they don't create the energy, they just maintain the infrastructure. And, quite frankly, there's plenty of talented people around that could do that.

One other fact I would like the Public Service Commission to be aware of is solar is economical, it is feasible, it's getting less and less costly every day. Every day I work with youth in the St. Pete area and in the Tallahassee area and all over the state, and we all have one goal, to make this world cleaner, to have more clean energy. Of all the things that we're concerned about, the primary goals we focus on are health for all of our citizens, national security and a clean environment we can call home.

We all know that using less oil or any form of fossil fuel would be good for us as a society because it would let us release ourselves from foreign powers that we have unstable relationships with, such as Russia. We would be more secure as a nation if we felt that we didn't have to go to wars to protect our oil security.

I helped organize the solar rally in

Tallahassee with Southern Energy Network and

Southern Alliance for Clean Energy on April 10th
in Tallahassee, and hundreds of youth from all

over the state came out to say that they care
about solar energy. We are the solar generation.

We care about these issues. It is of the utmost
importance to us that we make something that we

can be proud of.

MR. WILSON: My name is Greg Wilson, and I live in Dunedin, Florida.

I would like to talk about the future of having too much carbon in our atmosphere. We need to cut back on that, which is where energy efficiency comes in. I also have a new type of wind energy. And for them to make up rules that will stand for ten years, it will possibly block out new innovation for any kind of new type of electrical energy.

Global warming and climate change are a big issue for Florida because the climate scientists, some of them say that they may be off a little bit and sea level rise may happen faster than what it's predicted. Greenland glaciers are sliding off at a much faster rate than they were ever predicted. And the west side of Antarctica is starting to slide also, which includes thousands of years of icepack and glaciers.

So to encourage energy efficiency is very important due to the fact that Florida is very susceptible to sea level rise. And that will be very expensive if we have to start moving away from the coastlines. We will lose our barrier

1 islands. And there's really not a price tag that 2 you can put on something like that. 3 So the power companies should help with 4 energy efficiency, especially solar and any kind 5 of new wind energy, which Florida does not have 6 wind energy here. And my wind invention is the 7 only one that will work here in Florida. 8 safe for birds and wildlife and it works in very 9 light wind conditions. I think that's it. 10 MS. where they talk about renewable energy in Germany.

And they already have the problem that there is an overflow of energy created by wind and solar, and that they have not enough facilities to detain it -- I don't know the right word -- to keep it.

They don't know what to do with it. They send it to Czechoslovakia, to Yugoslavia and also to Austria, but the Austrians don't have the capacity to work the energy.

So definitely in Germany by 2050, I was

So definitely in Germany by 2050, I was reading that they want to have 100 percent solar wind power. So there is good information out there. And look over the boarders, it's already happening, it's already effective and successful. Thank you.

MR. SILLMAN: David Sillman, S-i-l-l-m-a-n, from New Port Richey, Florida.

And I want to put on my support for efficiency and solar standards. I know this question has been studied by other utilities, one in Austin, Texas in particular, that found clearly that efficiency is a far better investment than new power plants, as verified in one of the opening statements in the opening session. To protect for-profit utility monopolies does not

serve the public's interest. That is not what the Public Service Commission should be in the business of doing.

Solar and efficiency are proliferating around the country and around the world. Florida stands out for its status as a laggard in these areas.

Fortune 500 companies are implementing solar efficiency at an ever increasing pace, not out of altruism but because these make business sense.

Solar projects that pay for themselves in five years or less and efficiency projects that do even better are solid business decisions. And to set an unfair bar of a two or three-year payback when clean energy that we desperately need is set to too rigid of a standard is not in the public interest and not a good policy. That's about it.

MS. ROSS: I'm Kim Ross, R-o-s-s, and I'm from Tallahassee, Florida.

The investor and the utilities are giving as small of an investment and energy efficiency and renewal energies as possible and they aren't taking into account the true needs of its ratepayers, especially poverty stricken ratepayers, as they go about making their recommended goals.

I run, as a contractor, a Demand-Side

Management Program in Tallahassee, and I have run
a low income weatherization program called

Neighborhood Reach here in Tallahassee. And these
programs are great examples of what investor-owned
utilities ought to be doing and would save on a
statewide basis a larger percentage of energy than
any of the larger investor-owned utilities are
recommending.

Energy efficiency and renewable energy both provide far more jobs than the conventional form of energy production, which also further boosts Florida's economy. So while we're listening to this show of Public Service Commission considering the testimony, it does not appear that Florida's citizens and ratepayers' true needs are taken into account.

The Public Service Commission should be accountable to the public and protective of the public good. The types of tests that they're talking about using for determining whether or not to allow any particular measure don't take into account the public good, specifically there are documents that define -- that specifically state they don't take into account the public good. The

Public Service Commission should have found a way to allow themselves to hear from the public rather than ignoring the public.

MS. EMMEL: My name is Linda Emmel,

E-m-m-e-l, Plant City, Florida 33566. We have a

solar energy panel, a solar panel at home, and I

love it. It's cut our electric bill down quite a

bit. It's for the water heater. And the power

will go out for a week at a time with storms and

whatever, but I always have hot water, that's why
I love it.

It's jobs for people putting them up, solar energy, solar power, it's clean. I can't see why people don't go for it, why the Commissioners and stuff can't see it. It's the best thing, you know, we're missing out. Other states have it, they have the wind turbines. I believe there's a country, it's Scotland, it's either 90 or 99 percent completely clean energy. It's all solar and wind turbines. So if the whole country can do it, why can't Florida, one state, do it? We have sun here almost every day of the year, it doesn't make any sense not to use it. It's healthier. It helps the environment. I guess that's about all I have to say.

MS. GARGEL: My name is Cheryl Curry Gargel, G-a-r-g-e-l, and I am from Gulfport, Florida. I'm also a realtor in the state of Florida holding an EcoBroker's Green Certification. I'm also a broker in Aspen, Colorado.

My concern as a citizen and as a professional realtor of 30 years is that one of the first questions I get when I interview clients to buy a home, after they have selected a home, I should say, is what does the electric run on the house. Today it seems as though even qualifying for a mortgage, we have to take in consideration the expenses that the client is incurring presently. And if that is not sufficient to pay for the new home and the ratio that is already set, then they will not qualify for what they are trying to buy.

And as the electric rates go up, if this policy is allowed to expire, which electric rates will go up, then it's going to impact our buying clients, home purchasing, which in turn will have an impact on the taxes in the state. So it's a great concern professionally and also as a citizen of the state of Florida. So I'm asking that the Public Service Commission keep the policy that is currently in place and work toward more efficiency

1 in our state. And that is my purpose being here 2 today. Thank you. 3 MS. GRIFFITHS: Beverly, B-e-v-e-r-l-y, 4 Griffiths, it's spelled G-r-i-f-f-i-t-h-s, like Sam, Tampa, Florida. 5 6 I would like to see the Public Service 7 Commission consider keeping the percentage of renewables required by utilities the same or 8 9 higher, not lower them. I am the Chair of the Democratic

Environmental Caucus of Leon County and am on the

State Board for the Democratic Environment Caucus.

I am here today because I am opposed to fracking, f-r-a-c-k-i-n-g, in Florida. I feel fracking will destroy Florida's environment.

There are 18 permitted wells in Florida, each well can be fracked 18 times. Each fracking requires 8 million gallons of water. If all wells are completely fracked, we would have generated 2.6 gallons of highly explosive, highly toxic fracked water that will have to be stored for more

than 100 years and will never, ever be able to be clean water again.

We do not have enough water to support this industry. We do not have a viable aquifer that will allow fracking without damage to our drinking water, to our spring systems and to our natural wildlife lagoons and Everglades. We must stop fracking in Florida.

I would support subsidizing solar for any household that is under -- I should say within or under 400 percent of the federal poverty level.

This will allow these poverty level citizens to be able to afford food and housing.

I think it is criminal that Duke Energy has charged their customers for a nuclear power plant they will never build and has refused to reimburse those costs to the public. They should be investigated and prosecuted for criminal theft to the public.

MR. MASCIA: My name is Nick Mascia,
M-a-s-c-i-a, Sanford, Florida. I've been hearing
comments concerning solar electric. They seem to
conflict research done by other states,
specifically the installation of solar energy on
residential homes will actually save money for

utility companies as opposed to having costs passed on to those homeowners that don't have solar energy. I heard it quoted twice, once by a utility company passing the costs off onto other users. And I'm speaking of grid costs.

There is research done by the Public Utility
Commission of Nevada that supports my statement as
done by an outside research firm in San Francisco.

I would be glad to supply this evidence.

Also missing from the use of solar energy on a home is the fact that one home with solar electric energy will negate the use of 55,000 gallons of water that a power company would need to use to cool down liquid to provide electricity for that one home. Water conservation should be tied into energy conservation when considering the replacement of fossil fuel energy by utilities with solar energy.

I do not understand how the determination of ten years of energy use for 17 million, 18 million Florida residents can be determined by five individuals listening to five utility companies and not utilizing research resources to get information for both sides from a neutral provider.

There was a comment by the NAACP that impoverished -- poverty level families are penalized by increased costs of utility availability because of homes that can't afford solar energy do not contribute to the cost of the grid. Not true. By utilizing solar energy on a home, it reduces the cost for the utility companies to create power, they just don't pass the savings to those that don't have it. End of statement.

Energy efficiency is the lowest cost resource in meeting electricity demand, it is also the fastest and cleanest way to reduce harmful carbon pollution from the electricity sector.

Many residential utility customers do not have the information or the financial resources to implement energy efficiency measures. These measures help reduce energy use and help customers save money on their bills. These savings are realized not only by those who use the measures, but by all electricity customers because the use of efficiency defers the need to construct new, more costly power plants.

We understand that FPL has proposed significantly lowering its goals for utility-sponsored energy efficiency. We also understand that FPL shareholders earn a rate of return on its power plants, therefore, there is an incentive for it to reduce energy efficiency efforts that can defer the very assets up which it shareholders earn a rate of return.

The Public Service Commission is charged with balancing the interest of customers against that of the utility. FPL's significantly reduced proposed goals will hurt customers and should be rejected. Furthermore, higher goals should be set in order to capture all energy efficiency that cost less than building new power plants. Don't leave customer savings on the "table."

As FPL customers, we urge you to show courage and side with the customers' best interest in rejecting FPL's proposed energy efficiency goals. Moreover, goals should be set that make FPL a national leader in saved energy from energy efficiency programs.

Dear PSC,

I am writing in response to the latest solar initiative that FPL has announced. This is a program similar to the previous FPL program in the 2000's known as the "Sunshine Energy Program" where customers (including my parents) were able to pay an additional voluntary amount each month in order to foster the development and installation of solar power generation. Later we were appalled to learn that most, if not all, of those voluntary contributions went to administrative and marketing purposes. After our parents passed away, my sister and I inherited the house just in time to participate in the program whereby FPL gave a \$2 per watt rebate for solar installations on private homes up to a system size of 10kW. I installed a system of 6240W and have since added capacity bringing my system size to 7210W. This system generates an average of 850 kw/h per month of electricity and has so far avoided emissions of over 46000 pounds of CO2 since it was installed. I plan to further increase the size of the solar array by another 50% to facilitate the use of an electric car. Since installation of this solar array, the house has essentially been carbon neutral and since it is part of a 5 acre tree farm nursery with over 600 trees, the entire parcel is very much carbon negative.

It must be noted that all of this would not have been possible without the wisdom and forethough of **your office** in supporting this plan. Rumor has it that this plan and the size of the funding were directly proportional to the funds collected (but never spent) by FPL for the "Sunshine Energy Program."

FPL has also benefited from this sort of "distributed generation capacity" by the fact that the historic period of highest daily demand is also the time when solar installations such as those owned by myself are contributing the greatest amount of energy back into the grid helping to reduce peak load.

Sadly, I have read on FPLs webpage, that they are now "badmouthing" the previous solar rebate program (supported and/or directed by the FL PSC) as a waste of money from ratepayers. This is especially sad given the fact most of what FPL collected under the "Sunshine Energy Program" went to G&A and Marketing. FPL claims that the money spent under the recently completed rebate program was wasted and went to only 900 homeowners. I personally can refute this: even 3 years after I installed the system, where can anyone get a completely engineered and installed Photovoltaic system installed for \$2/Watt, which was what this system feeding into the grid "cost" FP&L?

Given FP&Ls history of being a bit "creative" with their funding received under the "Sunshine Energy Program" and being "economical with the truth" in their comments on the Solar Rebate Program, I would urge that the FL PSC *extremely* closely monitor all aspects of their new 2015 solar program initiative to prevent another customer ripoff program where the vast majority of collected funding goes toward "administration."

Growth rates in focus, as company's poised to up expectations

The disparity between the 'Haves' and 'Have Notes' continues to widen, as company's like Dominion appear teed up to increase their structural growth expectations at their promised Investor Update with 4Q results in early February 2015; specifically, we see a ~7% rate potentially supported from its midstream business as well as eventual splits. Moreover, NEE could yet be poised to accelerate drop-downs to NEP, benefitting from new tax-equity structures which would enable new wind assets to be dropped down immediately upon completion, with tax investors enabling a steady stream of cash flows. Growth here could yet be revised to the ~mid-to-high teens from the current 12-15% articulated with its recent IPO, although this remains a moving target. We see a modest acceleration in the growth to achieve a 'best in class' trajectory as improving NEP's overall multiple – and enabling a slightly higher NPV of GP cash flows.

Laying out investment thesis for 2H: remains oriented towards infrastructure

We include updates from a wide range of our coverage universe [D, DUK, DTE, NEE/NEP, ITC, NU], reiterating a common theme across the space: nearly all of our coverage appears geared to update their infrastructure spend in 2H14. Specifically, D, DTE, NEE, and now DUK will push forward to finalize recently announced pipelines, all with stated intentions of upsizing projects off their original volumes.

Focusing on renewables, utility-scale solar remains the renewable growth lever

We flag SO, DUK, and NEE all continue to evaluate solar RFP opportunities across the Southeast, with developments likely in 2H14. We look towards GA Power to release the results of its own ~400 MW RFP in October, while NC could yet provide a source for ~300MW of incremental utility-scale build via RFP. We suspect DUK could yet own the vast majority of this build. Altogether, we emphasize the Southeast appears to have found a green tinge despite having limited formal renewable targets.

Doubling down on our infrastructure thesis with latest updates

We see the latest Fall updates as generally supportive of our thesis, with renewable and midstream updates dominating presentation and meetings this past week; rather, we heard little else new in the sector aside for this thesis. We see D as firmly positioned as among the best names into 2H. We include SRE, NEE, ITC, and EIX to a certain extent within our 'Infrastructure' themed-orientation. Please see our latest note 'Articulating the Infrastructure Investment Thesis' for more.

NextEra Energy: A quieter 2H14 before '15 updates

What's the right growth rate for NEP? We think an upward revision is likely

We believe management is increasingly biased to raise its structural growth up from its committed 12-15% at NextEra Partners (NEP), up to a range that represents its 'best in class' opportunity set. While management appears keen to keep an eye towards the longevity of its advantageous cost of capital and growth trajectory, it does appear poised to ratchet expectations modestly.

Stars should align on key issues for management to be able to provide a longer-term outlook on growth.

While unclear exactly what a 'best in class' (our words) growth rate would be, we estimate it is somewhere close to NYLD's disclosed 15-18% growth rate, with a biased towards the upper end. While management has complete latitude to engineer NEP drop-downs to its liking, the latest organic outlook for both renewables and midstream would suggest it is indeed possible to have such an acceleration (particularly amidst the meaningful backlog of potential drop downs).

Accelerating drops through 'structured' tax equity deals

Among the most promising developments of late is NextEra's confidence in structuring novel tax equity deals on new wind projects, which would effectively enable for a constant distribution off the project entity through the life of a wind PPA, despite the upfront ten-year tax equity structures put in place on many new deals. Typically these tax equity structures effectively 'grab' all cash flows off new assets during the 10-year life of the Production Tax Credits (PTCs), leaving just the last ten-year period eligible to be dropped into the structure. NEE's proposed structure would allow for a relatively consistent 20-year payout from the structure, effectively allowing NEE to drop down even its newly developed assets into the YieldCo structure. We see the ability to accelerate the drop-down of newly constructed assets as enabling the depreciation benefits to deem cash flows as a 'return of capital'.

Structuring 'tranched' drop-drops the next evolution in YieldCo's?

While not necessarily attributable to NextEra directly, we see the direction of the latest tax equity deal, and potential structuring of a 'note' to effectively pay out cash flows from its Point Beach nuclear unit as indicative of the trend in the YieldCo industry towards financially optimizing 'non-qualifying' assets into YieldCo eligible drops. Diversification across the sector will inevitably continue to push the conventional notion of what is an eligible drop down.

Carbon 111 (d): the biggest driver of long-term renewables growth

We agree with management's view of long-term renewable growth as increasingly driven by carbon 111(d) mandates, with RPS standards likely 'cemented' by final rules. Moreover, many companies will opt to lean heavy on renewables in lieu of EPA's proposed 'building blocks' to achieve targeted reductions (such as excessive levels of coal to gas switching, etc.).

Longer-term guidance possible early next year

We continue to see a revision to the 2016 EPS guidance as a visible positive; however, we now anticipate an update in early 2015 versus potentially as early as 4Q14. By early next year NextEra will have certainty on the (1) Florida gubernatorial election, (2) potential PTC extension (mgmt. believes still better than 50% chance of extension with other outstanding tax items), and (3) a Florida Public Service Commission decision on ratebasing of gas assets which could potentially be worth a few hundred million per year in spending.

Handling the regulatory relationship in Florida

As we discussed in <u>our note last week</u> following the Democratic primary, a victory by Democrat Crist over incumbent Governor Scott (R) will be perceived negatively for NextEra's Florida Power & Light (FP&L) and TECO's local utilities given previous interactions with the regulated entities. It does not appear to be a secret that the business community is more supportive of Scott but the potential impact of Crist winning is an unknown.

Utilities are likely hoping that Governor Scott's record on the economy wins out with voters...

Gubernatorial certainty will be key as we look beyond 2016 where management could revise its 5-7% EPS CAGR from 2012-2016 as we assume that FP&L will file a rate case in 2016 (FP&L remains in a rate stay out through 2016). NEE is currently weighing a decision on whether to file a rate case in late 2015/early 2016 for Jan 2017 implementation. In the event of a Crist win, the company may attempt to avoid a filing with cuts to both capital and operating spending in an effort to preserve ROEs (albeit at a slower investment and earnings growth rate) through the duration of his term.

...which will be key for NextEra's next rate case expected in 2016.

The company does not anticipate its next large generation need until the 2019/2020 timeframe so absent impacts from depreciation studies or utility scale solar, we would not expect significant rate inflation and pushback from regulators.

Risk around Florida PSC appointments declining

With Commissioners Balbis' and Brown's terms expiring at the end of this year and the remaining three Commissioners having terms extending through 2016-2018, Governor Scott's nomination process is currently underway, with 16 candidates recently interviewed for the two opening spots.

Our impression is that none of the 16 candidates would be objectionable to the state's utilities. This is important in that should Crist win the election, he may reject Scott's final picks, but may only replace them with the other candidates already approved by the Florida Public Service Commission Nominating Council unless he receives legislative approval for a new nominating process – unlikely to be given by a still deeply Republican legislature that is largely antipathetic to Crist's recent "conversion" to the Democratic party in December 2012. In any event, we believe that a silver lining of a Crist administration could come in the form of a stronger emphasis on (ratebase-eligible) solar initiatives that have been sidelined on economic concerns by Scott. Exposed companies include TE, NEE, and DUK.

Signs of a nuclear renaissance?

Southern Company spent much of their recent 2Q14 earnings call discussing the possibility of new nuclear build in the early 2020s and NextEra could be following suit if the latest EPA standards force the state to further reduce carbon emissions. NextEra is closely watching SCANA and Southern's progress on their respective projects and given the long lead-time ahead of nuclear development, we would not be surprised to hear management announce its intensions sooner rather than later with respect to its Turkey Point Units 6 & 7 (collectively 2.2GW). FP&L received approval from the Florida Siting Board in May 2014 for the two units and the 2009 application is still pending with the Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC). Late in August the NRC voted to end the moratorium on issuing new plant licenses and the Company is optimistic that it can receive its licenses in 2017.

Serious Southern nuclear discussions could be kicked off in the next few years as sixty year license expirations loom.

The broader question from Southern and NextEra's contemplation of new nuclear is to what extent the country intends to replace nuclear units that will see their sixty-year licenses expiring in the late 2020/early 2030s. For example, Turkey Point Units 3 & 4 came online in 1972 & 1973. We see this issue becoming an increasingly popular topic in the next few years as the subject gains greater clarity with regulated utilities especially in the context of the latest EPA standards. The discussion of further extensions to eighty-year licenses remains a topic for discussion although retrofits and upgrades would be needed.

Infrastructure remains a hot topic with more expected to come

Following <u>Tuesday's announcement of the Mountain Valley Pipeline</u> (MVP) with majority owner/operator EQT Corp., we expect more updates following the binding open season which ends on September 29th. Management characterized the economics of the project as solid at 1.5bcf/day but it is optimistic that the project could reach 2bcf/day, thereby enjoying much better economics. More importantly we expect NextEra, Dominion, and other regional peers to increasingly become involved in midstream plays as they stray outside their traditional regulated utility footprints to capture growth. Despite having a minority stake in MVP, this could potentially be a \$1Bn spending opportunity for NextEra and Dominion/Duke's Atlantic Coast Pipeline announcement only reaffirms that fact.

NextEra wants to be integrally involved in the shifting Southern fuel mix and MVP is only the start of the pipeline buildout.

Other investment opportunities

- Transmission investments are "inching forward" and we could see some regulatory decisions in the next approximate six months. By 2020 this could be a \$50-100Mn net income business (~\$35Mn UBSe), potentially worth an incremental ~\$1/sh in our valuation.
- <u>Utility scale solar</u> could be a big opportunity later in the decade and NextEra has accumulated ~800MW of eligible sites in Florida but management continues to have a less optimistic outlook for distribution generation (DG). On the 1Q14 call management stated that they do not see much of an opportunity with distributed solar.
- Florida peaker studies are still progressing and management continues to view this as more of a shift in capex rather than a risk of spending not materializing. While there is competition from other projects, we see the real question as whether the Florida PSC will accept the proposal under its Environmental Cost Recovery (ECR) Rider, rather than through a conventional rate case (as mentioned above, FP&L remains in a rate stay out through 2016).
- Storage is a small investment for NextEra today but the company comments that it could be "meaningful" by the end of the decade. Early indications appear to bias towards frequency regulation and other short term solutions.

M&A: Unlikely for NextEra to pursue Oncor under auction

While the prospects of acquiring Oncor appear "off the table right now" given the two-tier auction process, we would not rule NextEra out, despite their having withdrawn their bid. NextEra likes Texas and the fundamental Oncor business so it remains to be seen whether management returns to the table in the next ~month. Turning to what NextEra looks for in regulated M&A, one of the most important factors is a jurisdiction with supportive regulators, a characterization which management believes that Texas meets. While Florida's regulatory climate has been consistently rated in the top ten in recent years, NextEra says regulatory diversification would be a plus and while the regulatory environment must be favorable to consider an investment, the target jurisdiction does not necessarily have to be as high quality as Florida's.

M&A is important for NEE but the company cautions that it will not pursue a deal unless its strict criterion are met.

With respect to NextEra Energy Partners, the emphasis continues to be on drop-downs from NextEra Energy but the door remains open for M&A at the YieldCo. While management reiterated that it has no real interest in acquiring merchant power, the company did say it might be interested in contracted gas for NEP, akin to the strategy utilized by NRG Yield.

What kinds of options does the Mountain Valley pipe hold?

We look for further data points this Fall around the success of its binding open season and expect further expansions in the upcoming months/years. Dominion's announcement of a \$500Mn, 1-1.5bcf/day Supply Header Project off of its Atlantic Coast Pipeline announced just a day earlier is an excellent example of incremental expansion opportunities from a base pipeline.

NEE set to follow Dominion's lead.

Don't look for much on the wind development side until PTC clarity

We don't expect management, nor its counterparties, will sign much in the way of further wind deals ahead of pending clarity of a further Production Tax Credit (PTC) clarity in the lame duck session later this year. While investor expectations continue to call for a further 2-year extension (pushing the effective date for project in-service to qualify into 2016, and some into 2017). As a reminder, management has already 1.8GW of backlog, out of the 500MW – 1.5GW range previously articulated at its last Analyst Day.

More solar soon? Utility-scale opportunities still lurk

Management appeared surprisingly confident in its outlook for up to ~400 MW of further utility-scale solar projects, with RFP developments likely to yield formal projects in 2H14. Not only could NEE be awarded some projects in the southeast, but could see further awards in California as well. While we expect the utility-scale market to continue to decelerate (amidst an increasingly competitive field of players), we suspect management will continue to de-emphasize opportunities in this segment.

Bias remains for utility scale over distributed generation.

Still not stoked on merits of DG – outside of C&I

Management maintained its more sober view on the value proposition of distributed generation amidst a clear preference for large-scale C&I. We flag a clear reticence persists across a variety of companies from entering too aggressively the residential DG market.

Dominion: Onwards and Upwards


February Analyst Day will summarize all the growth

With many balls 'still in the air', we look towards a February update with which management will summarize its long-term EPS and dividend outlook, among several other datapoints (likely pushing out this expectation through at least the 5-year 2019 view, consistent with that latest capex budget). Currently we estimate a ~6.6% 2014-2019 EPS CAGR and would anticipate an upward guidance revision to the 6-7% range versus 5-6%

currently. In summary, we reiterate our expectations for an EPS growth rate that could yet have an 8% estimate at the top end of the band when fully factoring the company's updates from Wednesday through the February Analyst day as well.

We expect Dominion to revise its long-term growth rate up to 6-7% at its Analyst Day in February.

Capex updates: adding it all up yields a rosy outlook.

Dominion announced an incremental annual spend of \$0.8bn per year compared to their last plan (the new plan includes an additional forecast year 2019 but the incremental capex is also impacted by new projects that add to each year out to 2019). The table below shows the change between the old plan and the new. Importantly, this excludes new pending projects such as the Supply Header project, for which Dominion is likely to gain sufficient clarity later this year to move forward with development (~\$500 Mn spend). Moreover, upsizing of newly contemplated Atlantic pipeline is excluded.

The Southeast Solution: The Atlantic coast pipeline and supply header

The first new project is a 45% stake in the \$4.5-5bn (ex-finance costs), 550+ mile long, 1.5bcf/d capacity Atlantic Coast pipeline. Dominion's 45% share in costs will be ratable. We believe the capacity has potential to increase (pipe is expandable to 2-2.5bcf/d) given our expectation for gas demand to ramp up further. The fact that the company has an open season lined in next few weeks even after 92% of capacity is already subscribed also signals possible expansion. FERC pre-filing is fall 2014, with a FERC application fall next year; once approved by FERC (~summer 2016), the pipeline should be operational by late 2018. The table below shows the ownership structure for the Atlantic Coast pipeline. Amongst the owners, Dominion is in charge of constructing, operating and managing the pipeline.

And how about a gathering network to go along with it?

Secondly, Dominion announced a complementary 100% owned, ~\$500mn, 1.0-1.5 bcf/d "Supply Header" project which will be used to gather the gas, compress it, and bring it to the Atlantic Coast pipeline. An opens season for the header is planned for this fall. Capacity for the header is expandable to ~2.5bcf/d levels as well. The project will allow for more access to Marcellus and Utica gas supplies. Although we don't see the pipeline itself as competition to NEE's MVP pipe, we believe the header can be in direct competition. Company expects the header to be operational by late 2018, along the time the Atlantic Coast pipeline starts service. We flag this ~\$500 Mn project would similarly drive 'chunky' EPS growth in ~2019 (following a November 2018 in-service.

We think both these projects are well supported by increasing Marcellus and Utica gas supplies. Dominion noted Wood Mackenzies' increased 2025 forecast production from ~23 bcf/d (in their 2013 forecasts) to an expected ~30bcf/d (in their revised forecasts made in 2014). The pipeline should be able to serve the heating/industrial and also power generation demand (increasing, owing to coal shutdowns) arising in Virginia and parts of Carolina.

Regulator and policy support for such investments in the Southeast has also heightened after the Polar Vortex events in the last winter. For such projects, (with project financing at the JV level during construction) we would expect Dominion to earn returns in the mid-teens.

Solar generation and electric substation security

Dominion also announced new solar utility scale development (selling to utilities under long term 15-20 year PPAs) which is beyond the 250MW planned earlier and above the \$500mn already spent on solar. Most of this will be in California and also Virginia (where they are installing ~2mn solar panels this year in old tobacco farms). The company has articulated a clear preference for solar over wind.

The company will spend slightly above \$550mn through the period to 2019 on physical security of their substations.

Upside to the Atlantic Connection pipeline too.

Following disclosures earlier this week that Dominion and other parties had received ~90% of necessary volumetric commitments to move forward with their proposed Atlantic Connection pipeline, we believe there is likely upside to the contemplated 1.5 bcf/d project. In particular, we suspect the 42" inch pipeline project could yet have plants to be upsized to 2.0-2.5 bcf/d prior to its in-service in late 2018 as regional utilities continue to contemplate their gas needs. Moreover, we suspect some additional producer volumes could yet coalesce around the project – and its target markets of Eastern Virginia and Eastern North Carolina.

Could yet extend the Atlantic pipe too.

We believe management could yet look to extend the pipeline down further from NC, into SC and even GA in future expansions to address continued coal-to-gas switching. We see this project as uniquely benefitting from the Carbon 111(d) regulations due to their disproportionate ask of Southeast coal-to-gas switching.

Update on long-term outlook would necessarily involve view on VEPCO

We believe management may yet be looking to pro-actively address its VEPCO biennial review process again to minimize over-earnings risk. We suspect further legislation to further adjust the mechanism/process could minimize even the distant risk of an over-earnings risk in the ~2019 period. We suspect this will cement the company's comfort in raising growth projections through the period that includes this potential reset.

While VEPCO has earnings certainty for the investment horizon, it could look to cement even more.

Valuation: Increasing Price Target \$2 to \$82

Our valuation is based on a 2015 utilities sum-of-the-parts analysis. The primary catalyst in the higher valuation is a \sim 0.5x improvement in the regulated peer multiple and a recovery of Mass Hub power prices.

Duke Energy: Flurry of activity not yet over

International strategic review - don't necessarily expect a sale

We increasingly emphasize Street expectations for a sale of the International business are likely misdirected, with a variety of other potentials clearly before management. We emphasize a direct sale of the business would appear dilutive given depressed regional multiples in the Americas (generally in the ~6x EBITDA range), and with management committed to making any transaction accretive, this would appear a tough hurdle to cross.

Strategic review = Sale? Not a guarantee

What's the purpose of the strategic review?

The purpose appears first and foremost is to solve the segment's relatively flat EPS profile through the forecast period. We suspect management will not suffice with any outcome that does not deliver a corresponding 4-6% EPS trajectory from the business.

Could a deal with AES Tiete work? We think there's good logic.

Among these, we emphasize the opportunity to pursue a transformative merger of the international business appears the most interesting, with synergy opportunities from bringing the business to scale. In particular, we emphasize its regional peer, AES Tiete, could yet fit nicely as a recombining of the two asset bases (previously housed under the same parent company in a prior life). With total EPS of ~\$0.23 from the Brazilian segment in 2013, we see the opportunity to add ~\$0.03 from conservative synergy expectations, and most importantly enable Duke to monetize its position via a public equity listing (via a share-for-share transaction). We suspect even if AES Tiete is not the partner, Duke's bias remains to take shares with a regional partner in the Americas to gain the liquidity to gradually sell down the business.

Bringing the foreign assets back to their origin?

Tax structuring remains the missing piece

We also emphasize the key to any transaction would be resolving off-share tax considerations, enabling the company to repatriate the \$1.7Bn (at least over time). We suspect the structure of any sale could prove crucial to effecting the appropriate tax basis.

Exploring ways to bring back the trapped cash

What's the timing? Still an update by year end.

While we're not necessarily convinced a final deal will be announced by year end, we suspect management will delineate at least coalesce around a strategic path forward by year end.

Getting utility-scale solar going: the next positive datapoint?

We emphasize that utility-scale solar opportunities could involve material spending (like for NextEra discussed above) and Duke currently has a 300MW RFP in North Carolina and is able to invest in up to 150MW of projects by 2021.

More wind in Texas too?

Wednesday Duke also announced its plants to build and operate a 110MW wind farm in Texas at the Los Vientos wind farm. The new capacity will be sold under a 25-year PPA to Garland Power & Light and other local municipalities. Upon expected completion in 2H15, Duke will have 912MW of capacity at its Los Vientos I-V projects in Texas and over a 2.1GW wind portfolio.

ITC Holdings: No news on structuring front

Once again, all about REITs and ROEs

The conversation remains dominated once again by considerations that factor into whether ITC could (and would) convert to a REIT. We increased our probability of a REIT to 20% with our 2Q14 note following the comments, or lack thereof, on the most recent earnings call but management shed additional light onto the topic. The company emphasized that there are both positives and negatives with opting for a new corporate structure with the 75% asset test being towards the top of the list as it limits diversification opportunities. Two other areas of uncertainty that the company said they would have to gain comfort with include confidence on the continued health of the equity markets (given the need to continually issue equity to finance the REITs growth) and certainty surrounding tax reforms. With the latest rhetoric around potential tax reform due to tax inversion M&A this summer, management appeared more cautious in particular on this front. Wisconsin Energy specifically addressed a similar question about REITs/YieldCos on Wednesday but expressed skepticism when CEO Gale Klappa stated that the entities "may not create permanent shareholder value." Regardless, WEC management would likely not truly consider such a corporate structure change ahead of the closing of its pending Integrys Energy Group (TEG) acquisition which is still set to close in 2H15.

ITC still continually evaluating the potential of a REIT but do not want to sacrifice long-term flexibility for a short-term valuation uplift.

Having said this, we increasingly believe that the possibility exists for ITC to essentially form a REIT 'YieldCo' and spinoff assets into the new vehicle as they reach maturity. The benefit here is that the company would maintain its flexibility to pursue growth while also getting a higher valuation of the stable components of the business. Throwing cold water on the story in the short-term was the logical comment that it is unlikely to expect any radical changes before MISO ROE clarity. <u>FERC could act on the MISO case as soon as this month</u> and based on our recent mark-to-market, we see a ~100bp higher FERC 75th percentile at 11.56% based upon a 6.74-13.16% zone of reasonableness.

Could ITC form a true YieldCo where it spins-off existing, stable transmission assets while leaving the growth story intact?

We discuss Kansas Corporation Commission's Section 206 transmission formula rate complaint against Westar Energy below but we do not believe that that ITC Great Plains (Kansas and Oklahoma subsidiary) faces the same challenge as the background issues appear to be more Westar specific.

What about FERC 1000? Cuts both ways

Management continues to view competitive bidding as a positive catalyst that opens the door for the company to expand its footprint. ITC has specifically not looked to gain incumbent advantageous in its 'home territories' in order to preserve the playing field in new regions. While the company has shied away from California in the past, it actively is receiving requests 'all the time' from developers in the state who value ITC's independent nature and believe it gives them an advantage in competitive solicitations. In its 'Tier One' alone (SPP and MISO North & South) management sees \$9.5-11.0Bn of opportunities with MISO South being an area for opportunity as the company leverages the intel it gains from the attempted Entergy transaction.

Independent orientation appears to be yielding early benefits in California but only time will tell if that translates into opportunities versus incumbents.

Westar Energy: Challenging the system rather than the company

Westar transmission ROE complaint unlikely to go very far, we think

After reviewing the Kansas Corporation Commission's (KCC) Section 206 transmission formula rate complaint, we reiterate our Buy rating that is largely predicated on a robust long-term transmission investment growth rate. We are convinced that the KCC faces long odds of success in their attempt to convince FERC to adjust their methodology so soon after the resolution of the New England case in order to produce a base ROE radically lower than the 10.56% set for New England. Moreover, FERC specifically advised that evidence and analyses provided in other complaints be "guided" by the New England outcome. Comments are due on Sept 29th, after which an ALJ may be assigned during a possible settlement phase. We do not expect a conclusion until 2015 at least.

Recent challenge does not shake our confidence in the long-term transmission story.

While WR's current base ROE of 10.8% plus a 50 bps adder for SPP RTO is above FERC's 10.56% upper-half midpoint, it is still well within the 9.39%-11.74% zone of reasonableness and unlikely to be changed significantly, in our view. In contrast, the KCC cites 8.87% base plus 50 bps as more reasonable based on its adjusted calculations using the FERC two-step method. In our opinion, a reduction of 169 bps is unlikely to be considered consistent with FERC guidance. It is our impression that WR refused to file a Section 205 complaint (as requested informally by the KCC) in order to avoid opening the issue up to other parties. Furthermore, while a Section 205 filing need only show that proposed rates are just and reasonable, a Section 206 must also meet the higher burden of proof that existing rates are unjust and unreasonable as well.

Challenge could be an uphill battle for the KCC

We believe that the KCC request reflects the testing of FERC rates generally throughout the nation and is not necessarily a reflection of a serious deterioration of their regulatory relationship with WR. The utility's current Kansas jurisdiction authorized ROE is 10.4% and as noted in the complaint, WR and the KCC both agreed recently to voluntarily reduce the ROE component of its Generation Formula Rate from 10.8% to 10.2%. It is our understanding that the KCC staff is irritated with WR for refusing to negotiate on transmission ROEs after the voluntary reduction for generation. With trailing 12 month overall ROE at a healthy 9.8% (9.5% for Kansas jurisdictional assets), we still expect WR to file its next Kansas ratecase in March or April 2015 in order to place the remaining portion of LaCygne scrubbers into ratebase. While the settlement of equity forward sales (~3M shares in 2H14 and another 8.9M shares in mid-2015) will flow into the average shares outstanding through mid-2015, note that no further market sales of equity are required through this time. The dividend currently stands at the low-end of their payout target 60%-75% and will probably remain there through the next ratecase (in a test year now). The earliest a dividend step-up would probably occur is Feb 2016.

DTE: Nexus is On

All systems are go with Nexus, and a bigger size

Management characterized themselves as "very enthusiastic" about the project and increased the capacity on the pipeline to 1.5bcf/day from 1.0bcf/day and surpassed its 80% firm commitment criteria for the project. DTE also reiterated that they are "very, very optimistic" that the pipe will be completed in 2017. The project is now expected to meet the "majority" of the \$20Mn of 2018E operating earnings 'white space' for the gas segment. The key question now becomes whether DTE and Spectra Energy could increase their ownership levels from 33% currently contemplated in the guidance with Enbridge potentially left on the outside looking in.

Despite investor skepticism, Nexus finally looks fully locked-in.

Northeast Utilities

NU's Connecticut ratecase settlement possible, but not this month

To the extent that a settlement is possible, we don't expect to hear of anything in Northeast Utilities' CL&P ratecase this month, although we think that a settlement of the case is somewhat more likely this time around without the former Attorney General Richard Blumenthal to knock down any deal. With a draft decision due December 1, any possible settlement would probably come in the Oct/Nov timeframe, earliest. A final decision is due December 17. In early August, the CT Office of Consumer Counsel (OCC) filed testimony recommending a \$143M increase (vs \$232M ask) based on an 8.9% ROE. We consider the 8.9% to be the low-end of expectations for a final outcome later this year, with a bid/ask midpoint of 9.55% a reasonable expectation vs the currently authorized 9.4%. We expect a ~150 bps rise in earned ROE beginning December 1, 2014 and beyond as a result of finally being allowed to recover and earn a return on \$286M of net deferred storm expense and resiliency investment. The returns on storm cost and investment should boost earned ROE to the mid-9%s, allowing CL&P to earn its allowed ROE for only the second time since 2004 (it also achieved this milestone in 2011). We further note that under the earnings sharing mechanism, shareholders retain 50% of all earnings above the authorized ROE and that state law allows the utility to over-earn by as much as 100 bps before a mandatory rate review.

November could be quiet in CT.

NESCOE process slowed down by failed legislation; RFP by December?

The New England States Committee on Electricity (NESCOE) had been expected to provide a schedule for its RFP by September for the development of transmission and delivery of at least 1.2-3.5 GW of clean energy into New England. However, this is now highly likely to be postponed through Nov/Dec as a result of the failure of Massachusetts to pass a Clean Energy Bill on July 31. The Bill would have allowed the state to enter into long-term contracts for ~19 TWhs of hydroelectricity from Hydro Quebec, essentially providing backstop financing for new power lines intended to be developed under a NESCOE RFP. Similar clean power procurement legislation already exists in Connecticut. Press reports indicated that environmental group opposition to hydropower in favor of wind and solar were a key factor in the Bill's demise. With no chance of any similar legislation this year, NESCOE's plan to file for two new tariffs to fund both electric transmission and new gas pipelines into New England have stalled as the states reconsider how to proceed.

We think NESCOE may be a dead-end for now

Without more gas, we emphasize the need for new electric transmission is all the more dire

Kinder Morgan Energy Direct project facing some intense local opposition

The proposed Tennessee Gas Pipeline Northeast Energy Direct (NED) Project into New England continues to be the subject of intense local opposition in some of the Massachusetts towns where engineering surveys are set to be conducted. The company plans to make preliminary FERC filings this month for the 0.8-2.2 bcf/d pipeline that would transport Marcellus gas from Wright, NY to Dracut Mass and be in service by winter of 2018. A FERC decision is expected in 2016.

Regulators asked to scale back energy goals

Florida power providers say rebates expensive, benefit few.

TALLAHASSEE — Florida's biggest electric providers are asking state regulators this week to let them scale back energy-efficiency programs — such as rebates for installing solar panels and power-saving appliances — that they say have become expensive and benefit few customers.

But conservationists argue that dramatically reducing energy-efficiency programs will only result in higher monthly bills for customers as the utilities eventually will need to build more natural gas and nuclear power plants.

This week, Florida Power & Light, Duke Energy Florida, Tampa Electric Co., Gulf Power Co. and JEA in Jacksonville are presenting testimony to the Florida Public Service Commission that they should be allowed to roll back energy-efficiency goals, as demand for the conservation programs has declined.

"We think it's in the best interest of our 1.7 million customers to reduce that energy conservation goal and let us look at programs that could benefit the whole entire customer base," Duke spokesman Sterling Ivey said. "It could be a community solar offering versus a rebate to an individual to put a solar panel on a roof, perhaps we can build a community solar array that all our customers pay into it and all would benefit."

Rep. Dwight Dudley, D-St. Petersburg, said customers' electricity bills have dropped due to conservation efforts and "slashing" the energy-efficiency programs will simply allow the power companies to make more money.

"This is not in the interest of the public, this is not in the interest of the people," Dudley told the commission.

The hearing is expected to last three days. Two extra days have been set aside next week if the review runs long.

The commission isn't expected to make a ruling on any of the requests until late fall.

Before the hearing began Monday, Dudley joined about 100 conservationists, many up since 3 a.m. as they bused from the Tampa region, demanding the energy-efficiency programs be retained or expanded.

"The opportunity to take action on climate is right now," Kelly Martin, of the Sierra Club, said during a pre-hearing rally outside the Public Service Commission building. "Climate change is not some far off thing in the future. Severe weather, extreme weather is happening right now on our doorsteps."

Susan Glickman, Florida director for the Southern Alliance for Clean Energy Action Fund, said the proposal will "effectively eliminate energy efficiency programs in Florida" as FPL seeks to expand its nuclear plants in South Florida and Duke is planning a new natural-gas plant in Citrus County.

"The utilities feign that their concern is for poor people in our communities," Glickman said. "If the concern was for poor people, why don't they help them lower their bill by offering cost-effective energy efficiency?"

Utility officials say the economic advantage of conservation has waned as natural gas has grown in use. Also, government efficiency rules have resulted in more energy-efficient construction and in people using products such as lower emitting light bulbs.

Duke Energy now charges residential customers \$4.02 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours on monthly bills for environmental programs, including energy efficiency. FPL has a similar monthly charge of \$3.37 per 1,000 kilowatt-hours.

If the Public Service Commission approves FPL's full proposal, company spokeswoman Alys Daly estimated the savings on a typical bill would be about \$1 a month.

State Public Counsel J.R. Kelly, whose office represents consumers on utility issues, said some of the proposals are "extremely low" and expects the commission to find a middle ground in its decisions.

"We're very cognizant of the impact of rates on our constituents," said Kelly, whose office is taking a limited role in the hearings. "You have some of my clients who want all the conservation in the world and don't care what the rates are. I've got others, seniors, low income, that say, 'Look I just can't conserve any more, so don't make my rates go up.'"

Last year, Duke spent \$1.4 million for solar programs that were approved for about 150 of its 1.7 million customers.

In the past three years, FPL's solar installation program has been used by 916 of its 4.7 million customers at a cost of \$16.5 million.

Please consider these points of opposition and instead of promoting nuclear energy by approving the proposal, promote alternative energy by NOT approving the application. You could take the lead.

In fact the Schumacher Center for a new Economics in Great Barrington, Massachusetts continues to remind us that sustainability is a central economic concept that needs to direct so many decisions today.

If we study this economics of sustainability/permanence, it takes us profoundly in the opposite direction than our conventional thinking regarding the use of the limited fossil fuels. Agreed? Sustainability/Permanence should also force us to move in the direction of growing the decentralization of power production simply for the sake of safety being less vulnerable to unexpected malfunctions, regular shutdowns for servicing, terror and natural disasters. Likewise, the rule of sustainability/permanence forces us to think in terms of diversification in the production of various energies (wind, photovoltaic, methane from animal waste etc.).

Just 3 weeks ago I was in Rutland, Vermont and walked into a store called the Energy Innovation Center. It is sponsored by the largest of their power companies, Green Mountain Power. I was amazed at the positive and sustainable things the power companies are currently doing, to encourage decentralization and diversification of energy production. Along with encouraging photovoltaic and wind energy, they are even assisting dairy farmers to turn cow poop into methane power on the farm. Needles to say, I was quite encouraged. Schumacher's call for sustainability/permanence is taking root and slowly will become the way of true progress in the world of energy production.



Opinion - Florida, "The Perfect Climate" For Business

Assemblyman Joe Gibbons gets it. Now will the rest of the Florida Legislature and our next Governor sign on? Solar and other renewable energy sources MUST be part of the energy mix to sustain Florida's future. For Floridian's this would mean cleaner skies ahead as the state's 15 coal-fired power plants will need very costly upgrades or be replaced, the likely choice for our big utilities. But will the replacement power come from only natural gas fired plants built on top of the old coal sites or will Florida incentivize the state utilities to mix it up with renewables? "The Perfect Climate" For Business (the official slogan for Enterprise Florida, the state's office of economic development) truly epitomizes where we are headed as a state. Cleaning the air means thousands of new jobs and billions of dollars invested in replacing those outdated coal plants. Not only will Lake Mary based Mitsubishi-Hitachi Power Systems America need to double down on it already robust operations to replace these plants but so will Siemens USA in Orlando, GE in Pensacola and several dozen other clean-tech energy suppliers and hundreds of sub-contractors in building these new plants and in providing alternative wind, sun, algae, bio-fuels and fuel-cell derived power. It was a breath of fresh air to see Duke Energy already commit to retiring and replacing two older polluting plants with much cleaner, more efficient and reliable gas-cycled turbine power. It is also another way to also reduce our reliance on costly imported oil. The last missing link in this equation is a strong legislative mandate for the state to put its money where its mouth is. On the Florida Enterprise website it quotes "Floridians understand the undeniable link between sustainability and the economy, and are building a robust cleantech industry, with particular strength in energy, efficiency, and environmental technologies." Actions speak louder than words. With the Governorship up for a vote this November, who will provide a legislative platform that outlines the steps that will be taken in the next state budget cycle to put words to action? Florida is one of only a dozen states that does not have a renewable energy standards portfolio, either mandatory or voluntary. The purpose of these standards is in quote "Renewable portfolio standards (RPS), also referred to as renewable electricity standards (RES), are policies designed to increase generation of electricity from renewable resources. These policies require or encourage electricity producers within a given jurisdiction to supply a certain minimum share of their electricity from designated renewable resources. Generally, these resources include wind, solar, geothermal, biomass, and some types of hydroelectricity, but may include other resources such as landfill gas, municipal solid waste, and tidal energy." This, taken from the U.S. Energy Information Administration website outlines the REC's or renewable energy credit structures that could be set in place to have an effective market system that government (State and Federal), utilities and consumers participate to reduce our reliance on carbon-intensive power while increasing the grids resiliency to spikes, outages and the like. With the inevitable replacement of 15 aging coal-fired plants in Florida, and the investment of several billion dollars for such creating thousands of new jobs, Florida has "The Perfect Climate" for Business. Now our State and Federal representatives must support this remarkable clean energy renaissance with supportive legislation and funding. One state legislator, Joe Gibbons gets it. The question now is will his colleagues sign-on to this opportune moment in truly making Florida a cleaner, brighter state to live, work and play.

New EPA rules should keep the Sunshine State sunny

The new EPA rules outlined in the Clean Power Plan are the right direction for Florida, and will improve the state's energy efficiency, environment and overall economy.

Our state's dominate base-load electric power source, coal, dates back to the 1800's and is caus-

ing rising sea levels and the erosion of our beautiful beaches.

As we continue to face this debate between the renewable and conventional energy, big oil focuses on shale gas, which has ignited a tipping point in energy. This tipping point is the phase out of black carbon (coal) power to lower carbon emission sources to meet new EPA clean-air guidelines.

What does this mean for the Sunshine State? We have the most to gain by effectively meeting these standards. A new clean energy mandate out of Tallahassee now, while our beaches are still around, will become a strong economic driver and set Florida up as an example to be followed by other coastal states in the South.

The good news for big energy players here, Duke, NextEra/FPL, Teco, JEA, FMPA and others, is they can play the central role in helping Florida come in to the 21st century clean-power equation. In renewable energy and energy efficiency projects, we have worked on across America, a mix of players successfully partnered together. Some of which are and were the biggest carbon emitters in the U.S., and by putting aside politics, we made a big difference in achieving reductions in the use of coal and oil.

We are also home to the world's largest clean energy technology and equipment providers, Seiman's AG, who provides thousands of Floridians and Americans clean-energy jobs out of Orlando.

To be successful, our next governor must lead the charge to invest \$100 million a year (about one-tenth of 1% of the state budget). Florida is soon to be the third biggest state in the nation and the 16th biggest economy in the world with a GDP approaching \$1 trillion. We can and need to make a difference today. There is no time to waste.

Some ideas on how to make that happen include an increased focus on solar energy. Solar is poised to be a leader to a brighter, cleaner energy economy here in Florida. We are light years behind other states in this area. We need no less than 1,000 megawatts (1 gigawatt) a year of new, cleaner power (including natural gas cycled turbine power) installed for the next 15 years to meet federal guidelines. We also need stronger conservation mandates to meet our growing energy needs and protect our way of life.

Critics will argue the balance of cost versus benefits. Well, the benefits for Florida are unmistakable. While the risk for the Sunshine State would be irreversible; beaches gone, tourists gone, drinkable water gone and more. Cheap, dirty coal power is forever a thing of the past in the

U.S., and so are its detractors.

Who would have thought big oil would be the tipping point to have built the bridge to a brighter, cleaner energy future for the United States' power hungry economy? Let's lead the way to a more economically rich future in Florida while protecting our way of life with clean energy legislation to support the execution of the new EPA guidelines.

At long last, equality comes to Florida

Fly that rainbow flag high, Florida, for equal rights is just around the corner.

Thursday's ruling by a judge in the Florida Keys overturns - in his jurisidiction of Monroe County the state ban on gay marriage that voters added to the state constitution in 2008. While the ruling only covers Monroe, similar rulings are expected any day in Tallahassee and in a Miami-Dade case brought by six cou-

ples, including four from Broward County.
Since the U.S. Supreme Court threw out a key provision of the federal Defense of Marriage Act last year, courts across the country have been striking down statewide bans on same-sex marriage.

Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi quickly said her office would appeal Thursday's ruling, but her fight will be upstream against a tide of nationwide acceptance. Indeed, in Florida, polls show 67 percent of voters support legal recognition of same-sex couples

Nineteen states and the District of Columbia now allow same-sex marriage. Just last week, a federal judge ruled Kentucky's same-sex marriage ban was unconsti-

It's just a matter of time until all of Florida is added to that group. And it's about time.

"This is a monumental step forward for Florida," said Nadine Smith, CEO of Equality Florida Institute. "[Thursday's] historic ruling affirms what the majority of Florida residents already knew to be true: All couples and their families deserve to be treated equally by their government."

While a majority of Florida voters put the same-sex marriage ban into the state constitution, Circuit Judge Luis Garcia said in his ruling that "it is our country's proud history to protect the rights of the individual, the rights of the unpopular and the rights of the powerless, even at the cost of offending the majority.'

Opponents will not let up. Attorney Mathew Staver, founder of the conservative Liberty Counsel, said if Bondi "does not want to present a vigorous defense, she owes it to the voters of Florida to step down and allow

someone else to represent the interests of the state."

Actually, Bondi and Gov. Rick Scott would be better served to give up the fight, rather than continuing to waste time and taxpayer money in an embarrassing attempt to enshrine discrimination in Florida.


The time has come to allow same-sex couples the same legal and financial rights as heterosexual couples.

The time has come to allow them equal hospital visitation rights, instead of making them go through a bureaucratic and emotional nightmare.

The time has come for Scott, Bondi and others to realize that in the 21st century, bigotry and prejudice should not be given constitutional protection.

Same-sex couples who want to marry aren't infringing on anyone's rights. They don't pose a threat to traditional marriage or society. They merely want to enjoy the "pursuit of happiness" that our Founding Fathers guaranteed more than two centuries ago.

Solar technology still needs subsidies

Sometimes good intentions can produce bad outcomes. A case in point is the framework by which we subsidize residential solar panels. With the good

intention of promoting more solar

panels on consumer rooftops, Florida has created a system of subsidies that benefit solar panel owners, who are usually high-income homeowners, at the expense of working-class families and individuals on fixed incomes. This is a policy outcome which no one but those few who benefit would argue is in the best, long-term interests of our state.

Solar technology is expensive. To help offset costs, a wide array of generous state and federal subsidies were advanced to encourage more residential roof-top solar installa-

One such state subsidy is known as "net metering." With net metering, whether a homeowner buys or leases their rooftop solar system, utility companies are required to buy back the excess power they generate at full

While this full retail price credit brings substantial savings to solar homeowners, those bill reductions are financially supported by consumers without solar panels, including low income consumers, who end up with higher bills because they have to pay for the solar homeowners' share of the costs of the electric grid. And by the way, every solar homeowner continues to rely on the transmitting and distributing services provided by



The vast majority of Floridians cannot afford to buy solar panels for their house, nor do they have the near-perfect credit needed to qualify for a solar lease. In California, a study by the Public Utility Commission found that the average income of households using solar is nearly twice that of homes without solar. Add to that the fact that low-income electricity consumers spend a disproportionally higher percentage of their income on household energy

This policy has created a subsidy system that allows high-income rooftop solar users to enjoy all of the benefits of traditional generation of electricity, and the grid that distributes it, without helping to pay for maintaining the overall network.

Furthermore, people who rent a house or apartment are simply locked out of the subsidies even if they can afford it. Those who own a home in a densely shaded area or next to a large building are also out of

We must remember that our electric grid is essential to all communities, and we can't leave those who can least afford it holding the bill.

Solar is hardly a bad thing. Floridians value clean technologies and are increasingly interested in reliable, energy-efficient, and affordable options. But our elected officials and regulators must acknowledge that there are simply more equitable ways to develop this technology.

For example, we could do a better

job of incentivizing large industry-scale solar installations that give all consumers the opportunity to participate in the both the benefits and

It's clear that Florida needs to rethink its unbalanced solar policies. All citizens and communities throughout the state deserve clean, affordable energy options.

Going hard on China isn't easy for debtor nations

TOKYO — Julie Bishop, Australia's foreign minister, is beginning to understand what former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton meant in 2009 when she posed this question about China: "How do you deal toughly with your banker?"

Clinton was conferring with then-Australian Prime Minister Kevin Rudd about China's rapid rise and, according to cables released by WikiLeaks.org, the leverage Beijing's massive store of U.S. Treasuries (\$1.3 trillion at last count) gives it over Washington. Australia finds itself in a similar bind as its resource-based economy begins to look like a ward of China.

Not happy with this state of affairs,
Bishop's boss, Prime Minister Tony Abbott, is
grasping for a harder line on China and not
doing it very well. Abbott used last week's
visit to Australia by Japanese Prime Minister
Shinzo Abe to preview his China policy.
Abbott had previously declared Japan,
China's sworn enemy, Australia's "best friend
in Asia." Last week, though, he went off the
diplomatic rails when he said, bizarrely, of
the Japanese submariners who fired missiles
at Sydney harbor during World War II: "We
admired the skill and the sense of honor that
they brought to their task."

Huh? Try telling that to the families of Australian and British prisoners during World War II, many of whom the Japanese tortured during the death marches of Sandakan and starved while working at gunpoint on the Burma railway. China's foreign ministry, which clearly hasn't forgotten the war, hit back arguing that "anyone with a conscience will disagree with the remarks made by the Australian leader."

Beijing mouthpiece, the Global Times, challenged Bishop's comments about a more assertive stance toward China, deriding her as a "complete fool" who was helping to turn Australia into an outpost of "rascals and outlaws" who don't understand Asian geopolitics.

What are we to make of all this? The obvious point is Clinton was right. Why would China fear a nation it could traumatize tomorrow by dumping its debt or shifting its iron ore, coal and copper orders elsewhere?

There are two cautionary messages embedded in this Beijing-Canberra imbroglio – one for Abbott, one for Abe.

For Abbott, the issue is how China is forcing democratic nations to choose between obedience to the Communist Party or eco-

nomic pain. Britain is clearly going the former route as Prime Minister David Cameron turns his back on Hong Kong. Why is Cameron silent as China clamps down on civil liberties in a former British colony that the Communist Party promised Margaret Thatcher it would leave alone?

Among conservatives, Abbott and his chief diplomat Bishop may score points by pushing back against China. It may also be his way of reminding the United States it still has a friend Down Under. But Abbott's bromance with Abe comes as former Prime Minister Malcolm Fraser hawks a new book, "Dangerous Allies," critical of Canberra's closeness to Washington at the expense of China. Time will tell if Australia pays a price for cozying up to a nationalist like Abe who leads a waning economic power as China extends its reach around the globe. China, after all, is Australia's No.1 trading partner and a rising military superpower. And, let's face it, the Communist Party really knows how to hold a grudge.

Abe, meanwhile, should consider how badly his foreign policies are traveling. Just this week, he complained that Chinese President Xi Jinping continues to rebuff requests for a summit meeting. How about looking in the mirror? His unapologetic visit last December to Tokyo's Yasukuni Shrine, where 14 Class-A war criminals are interred, enraged China and South Korea. So has Abe's silence as people in his political orbit deny that the Nanjing Massacre happened or that the Imperial Army rounded up women and forced them to work in brothels. More recently, Abe's move to "reinterpret" Japan pacifist constitution has shaken Asia's security status quo.

As the Sydney Morning Herald asked in a July II headline: "Are We Really Comfortable With Abe?" When other democratic leaders are getting flack for being your friend, it's time to assess how your domestic politics are undermining external relations. After all, a key pillar of Abenomics should be closer relations with Asia's biggest economies, not alienating them.

Australia may now have a similar problem on its hands as China stews about Abbott's affection for Japan. As a sovereign nation, it's Australia's right to forge relationships as it sees fit. But as recent events attest, balancing China's economic might with its diplomatic idiosyncrasies is something few governments have achieved — including the one Clinton may run come 2016.



RE: Florida Energy Policy - Promote Energy Efficiency to Benefit Consumers

Dear Chairman Graham:



Thank you for the opportunity to share my concerns regarding the request by Florida investor-owned utilities that the Public Service Commission ("PSC") diminish the commitment to consumers under the state energy efficiency and conservation goals. Florida utilities are proposing to slash their annual energy savings goals from an already anemic 2,012 gigawatt hours (GWh) from 2009-2013 to 263 GWh for the period of 2015 through 2019. In fact, the largest electric utility in Florida, comprising nearly half the entire state's electricity sales, is proposing annual energy savings of 100 times less for 2015 then what it achieved in 2013. Drastically reducing energy savings will diminish the potential to decrease carbon pollution which is the main contributor to climate change and its devastating impacts. I urge you not to reduce Florida's very modest energy efficiency initiatives and instead side with Florida consumers and businesses and *increase* the state's commitment to cost-effective energy efficiency and demand-side renewable energy.

The timing of the PSC's action could not be worse. It is clear that Florida will have to make a major shift to reducing carbon pollution in the coming years. Energy efficiency will be one of the primary tools our state will need to meet carbon pollution reduction goals. If you reduce the state's modest energy efficiency initiatives, you are making the road ahead much more difficult and likely much more expensive for Floridians.

It costs less to save energy than to produce energy. Yet, under Florida's electric utility regulatory scheme, utilities have incentives to build large operating power plants and sell as

much energy as possible. The business model is outdated and fails to meet the modern challenges of Florida's future and protect Florida consumers.

As a member of the U.S. House Energy and Commerce Committee, I have watched other states outperform Florida on energy efficiency and clean energy. Florida is far behind other states that have been innovative in helping consumers save money. When a consumer or business saves money on their electric bill, they have more resources to invest in other goods and services. Energy efficiency also boosts job creation in construction, weatherization, retrofits, manufacturing and installation of energy-efficiency equipment. According to the American Council for an Energy-Efficient Economy (ACEEE), a more aggressive commitment to energy efficiency would yield significant economic benefits. By 2050, ACEEE estimates that significant investments in energy efficiency at the state and federal level could benefit all parts of the economy including residential, commercial, industrial and transportation sectors. Theses efficiency investments would result in a net gain of almost 2 million jobs and save consumers an average of \$400 billion per year (about \$2,600 per household).

Just imagine what the ratepayers on the west coast of Florida could have done with the \$3 billion they spent on the broken Crystal River nuclear power plant or the jettisoned Levy County plant? They are on the hook for \$3 billion that did not produce a single kilowatt hour of energy. With \$3 billion we could have provided energy-efficient appliances, air-conditioning systems, weatherized homes, insulation, smart meters to many Floridians and businesses - and create thousands of jobs doing so.

I understand that the electric utilities argue that they are concerned about the costs of energy efficiency and clean energy. The greater financial concerns for Floridians are the huge costs of the changing climate such as dealing with extreme weather events, flood insurance, homeowners insurance, beach renourishment, and property taxes for local infrastructure repairs. Add in costly health impacts like asthma and the PSC and State simply cannot shirk its responsibility to the citizens of Florida.

In addition, a recent Standard & Poor's report highlighted the economic danger of not acting to reduce carbon pollution: "climate change is likely to be one of the global mega-trends impacting sovereign creditworthiness, in most cases negatively." Climate change will impact credit ratings in several ways. First, economic performance will be reduced as agricultural yields decrease because of "repeated and prolonged droughts, heat waves and wildfires, or floods" and health effects reduce worker productivity. The report states that "extreme weather events, especially floods, can be expected to increasingly take a toll on a country's infrastructure and thus productivity." Second, fiscal performance will decline as government budgets come under increased stress from climate-induced emergency support and infrastructure reconstruction costs.

According to S&P, "[n]ational budgets would invariably come under additional strains, potentially putting downward pressure on sovereign ratings and debts and deficits mount."

In the face of these challenges, Florida must dramatically *improve* its commitment to energy efficiency and clean energy – not go backward. The PSC will harm Florida consumers and businesses if it keeps our state stuck in the last century. Plus, the state will find it impossible to meet its carbon pollution reduction goals unless it reworks its incentives for fossil fuel energy consumption and modernizes its energy policies now. Many other states have a much more robust commitment to conservation, efficiency, solar and other clean sources of energy. It is embarrassing that states like Georgia and New Jersey produce more solar energy than the Sunshine State.

For all of these reasons and with an eye to the future of our great state, I respectfully urge you to reject any weakening of Florida's energy efficiency standards.
