PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. If I can get staff to read the notice, please.

MR. YOUNG: Good morning, Commissioners. By notice issued on Monday, August 25th, 2014, this time and place has been set for this public meeting. The purpose of the meeting is for the Commission to discuss Duke Florida Energy's rerouting initiative with the company's management. In particular, the Commission plans to discuss the necessity and scope of the rerouting initiative; specific information regarding billing impacts for the rerouting initiative; possible resolution, if any, to address customers' concerns regarding being billed for an extended billing period at a higher tier charge -- charges; and any other topic the Commission may determine to be relevant to Duke Energy Florida, Inc.'s, rerouting initiative.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, staff.

Now, so before I start, I call up the first person to speak, I want to make sure it's real clear that we're here to speak about the Duke rerouting initiative and any impact it may have had on your bills or anything that's pertaining to that. This is not a political forum. So if you want to speak about an elected official, let's do it generically, as in the

Governor, the senator, my representative. If you get into mentioning people's names, I will cut you off.

This is not a platform for that. This is to speak

specifically on this Duke issue.

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It's always been my practice, if we have any elected officials in the audience, to bring them up first because they're representing quite a few constituents, and then we'll get to the individual individuals. So if we have any elected officials in the audience, if I can get them -- Senator, please, if I can get you to come to the mike.

SENATOR DEAN: Thank you, Chairman Graham, for allowing me to come this morning and have a few brief words about the billing issue and Duke Energy.

My name is Charlie Dean. I'm a State Senator,
District 5. Approximately 125,000 people or customers
of Duke in my area of the eight of ten counties that I
serve.

I have a vested interest very deeply in this issue because of two particular issues that come to mind real quick, and first is that Duke owns the Suwannee plant in my district and also the Crystal River plant in my district.

You know, the internal decision of a company to do whatever they had to do about rerouting concerns

me first and foremost because I had to read about it in the St. Petersburg Times, and then to see the reaction from my customers -- or the customers of Duke that are my constituents. The extra charges coming in the hottest months of the year is a general unfairness whatever happens to our customers. I agree and I appreciate the fact that Duke's president, President Glenn, decided to do a decision to credit back those charges, extra charges, and I think that was a good step to help the customers.

But really what other things that I'm concerned about is what are we going to do in the future to make sure that this advanced billing doesn't continue and we don't have to go through this crediting system.

I, for one, think that billing first and then trying to credit later is just an inappropriate action.

I would like to know, in your review of this and how you feel about it, if you think we need legislation to prevent this type of activity. I go around the State of Florida and many times I hear that folks that represent the public in different capacities such as you are, it's brought up to be me, well, the Legislature is the one that has the opportunity to change this; it's not our responsibility. That's one of the reasons I came today. If you want to see a legislator, here I am. And I know

if you've been chewed enough, that's all right. I have tough hide myself. So if you have a decision and there is something we can do, let's don't put it off. I'm willing and ready.

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And I'm also conditioned for something that I think somehow or another reflects on this issue. Back when I voted for the nuclear recovery cost, and everybody in the Senate and everybody in the House of Representatives except one lady from South Florida, we bought in. We thought it was the right thing to do. But sometimes with the best of intentions we make mistakes.

And I don't want to create an atmosphere of belief that because we messed up one time that companies that we regulate or y'all regulate or I have to legislate for could have that ability to continue that attitude. Let's stop where we are. Let's think about the future.

I do appreciate again the concern and the credit back, and I really appreciate the fact that you've addressed the fact and been forthright about it and allowed me to come today. And if there's any questions I could answer, I'll be glad to do that.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Senator, number one, thank you for coming. It's always good to see our elected

officials here and take an active roll in things that are going on. Sometimes it tends to be a little bit of a disconnect. But I always enjoy speaking to you guys -- actually I enjoy speaking to you better here than when I'm over in your chambers.

(Laughter.)

SENATOR DEAN: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: But we do appreciate you coming down. And I don't know if any other

Commissioners have any questions of the senator.

Senator -- I mean, Representative -- Commissioner Brisé.

(Laughter.)

COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: Thank you. I just have a comment. Senator Dean, thank you very much for being here today.

As you stated, you know, every rule every once in a while needs to be looked at again and every statute needs to be looked at again. And maybe this is one of the opportunities that gives us some pause to make sure that the rule does what it intends to do. And so you can be certain that this Commission will definitely take a look and ensure that the rule does what it's intended to do and doesn't have any unintended consequences.

SENATOR DEAN: Thank you for those comments.

Again, let me reassure you, you have the opportunity to 1 2 use me. Do it. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We'll probably look at this 3 first quarter of next year, probably have a workshop on 4 it. And if we can't handle it within our own 5 rulemaking, we'll be definitely reaching out to you. 6 7 SENATOR DEAN: Thank you. Senator, thank you very 8 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: 9 much. 10 SENATOR DEAN: Thank you, sir. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Are there any other elected 11 officials in the audience to speak to this? 12 13 Okay. We'll open it up to the general public who would like to come forward. If I can get you to 14 15 give your name and address. And since we don't have that many, we won't cut you off at two minutes, but 16 17 please be as succinct as you can. Is there anybody else 18 that wishes to speak? 19 Welcome, ma'am. Come forward to the 20 microphone. 21

MS. JOHNSON: My name is Tanya Johnson, and I live at 5383 Turkey Scratch Road in Monticello. I heard you say, sir, that this is not a platform for other things. But I live on a road where this company has tormented me, and I need help with somebody to tell me

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1 why I have to live like this back there.

I don't want to -- I don't want to take this time from the issue that you have here, but I need somebody to help me back there. I'm not trying to tell anybody's names or anything. I have put up with this torment back there, it'll be a year in October. I own one acre of land back there, and I found out that I'm in the middle of some men that are investors back there, and I need to know how come I have to live like this and I need some help.

I don't know of anybody ever in their life that lived every day with a power pole construction coming in front of your door every day, strange men.

I'm a simple widow woman back here by myself. I almost was arrested for just saying, please, don't just take me too with the road. I just want some help. I just want some help and some understanding on how I'm living like this. And is it fair to me and do I have to accept this because I'm just a poor woman back there on an acre of land that I never knew anything about the men around me?

And I heard on the news that, I think his name is Mr. Cowen (phonetic) or somebody from the Duke Energy people were going to be here, and I just want them to see how my life has been back there for a whole year, and it's still going on and they won't tell me nothing.

It's like my life has -- my civil rights to live as a resident has been stoled away from me and nobody told me why. And I got my taxes raised to \$800, and I need to know why I'm being treated like this. So if somebody can just help me and tell me what's going on so I can try to live as my husband wanted me to live back here. And that's the only reason why I stay is because this is what he wanted for me before he died, and I have no other place to go.

I just want some help, and I need some understanding. And I'm sorry if I went off from what you needed to talk about, but I have tried and tried and tried for somebody to help me and tell me why. And all I was told is a man can do what he want to do on his land. But if you don't have your own road and you take the citizens away and tell them that they have to put up with this because they're the poor ones back there, it's not right. And we was never told nothing about them back there like that.

I took my raggedy car and prayed to God that I could get here, and I have to try to take this car back home the best way that I can. But I thank God I got to come here and let people know what's happening to me back here. And I'm sorry for going off on your agenda. Thank y'all for just listening to me.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Ms. Johnson, hold on. on a second.

Number one, I want to thank you for coming out here and making the effort to get here to this meeting. I don't know if this is necessarily the issues that we came here to cover. But since you are here, if I can get one of our attorneys to walk back into the back with Ms. Johnson and see what the issue is specifically that we can deal with, and get back to me as soon as possible, like maybe just before we start IA. And if there's something we need to do, if we need to reach out to the Duke representatives that are here, we can talk to them now, or if there's a docket or something we need to open, we can do that.

But, Ms. Johnson, thank you, number one, for coming down here and for speaking with us. And if you'd walk back here with Ms. Helton, she'll walk you through this process.

MR. KISER: Mr. Chairman?

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes.

MR. KISER: I might be the only person in the room who knows where she lives. She's actually a neighbor of mine. She probably lives less than a mile from my house. So we'll take your words to heart and see if we can get to the bottom of some of the specifics

that might be of some help to her and get her in touch with the right people.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Thank you.

Anybody else from the public that came to speak to this issue? I'm not seeing anybody raising their hands moving forward, so we will close the public comments.

And I did send a letter to the President of Duke Energy on this issue. I got the response that I was looking, that I was looking for. Basically they, they apologized. It was an unforeseeable mistake and that they have promised to make everybody whole. The main reason why we continued to still have this, in case there was something else out there that I did not see or something that myself or the staff missed, and I don't think so. I think it's quite evident that -- because one person spoke -- that I think this may address the issue. I didn't know if any of the other Commissioners had any questions of Duke while they're here. I don't see any lights coming on.

Okay. Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

And I want to also thank you for the action that you took on behalf of the agency and behalf of all of us. I know about the time that your letter went out I was at

that moment, I think, on the phone with our Executive

Director asking some of the questions and trying to have
a better understanding of what the situation was and
what remedies, if necessary, were available. And you
jumped right on that and moved forward, and I thank you
for that.

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And I also do want to acknowledge that the company did, it appears, certainly did jump right on it as well in response to your letter, in response to concerns from consumers and others to look more closely at what unintended ramifications may have taken place due to the planned rerouting and the purpose down the road of efficiencies, but some of that in the meantime unintended ramifications and how best to address it. So I appreciate all of that.

I do understand -- and this is now to my question -- I do understand, I believe, that a review has taken place and will be ongoing to assess if due to the timing of the rerouting for any customers and if there was an unintended impact to their bill due to hitting that mark where the rate goes up slightly.

So my question is, on the back side what processes are there and will be in place so that you all have assurance, the customers have assurance, and we have assurance that in those instances, where

appropriate, that has been addressed? Because I certainly recognize that there's a lot of bookkeeping that needs to go into that.

MR. BERNIER: Sure. Matt Bernier for Duke

Energy. Thank you for the question, Commissioner. And

I would say on the back end going forward to reach out

and proactively let everybody know, you know, that we

are taking the right steps, as we've said that we would.

We'd be more than happy to reach out to the Commission

any way that you would find appropriate to make sure

that everybody is comfortable with how we're

progressing.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you. And I guess what I would ask, Mr. Chairman, at this point is just, as we are all here together discussing this item, that our staff kind of follow up on that. I'm sure there are some reporting mechanisms. But just so we all have the same information and it's all available, but that our staff follow up so that you receive that information in whatever way is the most transparent and understandable.

I also, you know, encourage, as I do every utility, that for you and those that you work with, continue to try to reach out and communicate with those that you work for so that as you are taking steps, that there is that two-way communication and perhaps better

understanding of what the process is and what the available means are for customers if they have a concern, how they can best contact you and have it addressed. And, of course, if they're not satisfied, then they come here next. But, you know, please do continue and take it to heart that I think some additional outreach at times may be helpful.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, Commissioner

Edgar. I can tell you I had a talk with the Executive

Director, and staff will be following up. What's that
saying that Ronald Reagan used to say? "Trust yet

verify." So staff will be auditing to make sure that
they've dotted all the I's and crossed the T's on this,
on this issue.

Commissioner Balbis.

COMMISSIONER BALBIS: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. And just to follow up on Commissioner Edgar and also your comments and from the representative of Duke. I'm glad to hear there's still activities going forward, because I know even as late as last night we received some correspondence from, I believe, Senator Simpson's office that his constituents are still contacting him. So it may be just, you know, your measures haven't come into play yet, so there might be some additional outreach that's required and that'll certainly help with

this situation.

And, you know, the other comment I wanted to make is that, Mr. Chairman, you indicated that the first quarter of next year, you know, maybe workshop this issue. Unfortunately I will not be here at that time, so I wanted to get my two cents in at this point.

And, you know, in looking at the rule that's in place, there seems to be some gray areas, at least specifically on what is prorated once you trigger past that five-day mark, et cetera, what it may be. So I think that when you do move forward with that process, I think it should be clear so that the companies know and the customers know what is going to happen in a case where it might be three or four days past the month where they get around to reading the meter and how they address that so we don't find ourselves in this situation. So thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you. Seeing no further, other lights on, we will conclude this.

I want to, number one, thank you for your responsiveness and for coming here today to answer any additional questions that we had.

We are going to adjourn this meeting. We are going to start the IA in this room. I need to give my audio people about 15 minutes to get set up. So by that

clock in the back, at 25 till we'll start IA. We are now adjourned.
