PROCEEDINGS

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. I have a quorum. So we have a couple of elected officials here in the audience, so before I reconvene, I always like to, out of respect for their positions and the things that they have to do and their constituency, invite them up to say a few words, and then we can continue the hearing.

So Representative Roberson, come to the microphone, please, sir. Welcome to our Commission chambers.

REPRESENTATIVE ROBERSON: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I appreciate you giving me this opportunity to speak on behalf of my constituents in Charlotte County. Many of them got up at 5:00 this morning to take a bus trip up here, and you're going to be hearing from them shortly.

I've had the opportunity to review the memorandum dated November 18th. It's certainly thorough with all the staff analysis and recommendations, but at the end of the day I really think the proposed rate increase is excessive. And after your consideration and review, I think hopefully you will modify that proposed request to increase the rates so dramatically.

So thank you for the opportunity to be here, and I'm sure you're looking forward to hearing from my

constituents, who are the customers of this utility. Thank you.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Representative, thank you very much for coming down. I know you guys are in the middle of your committee week and your time is tight, but we do appreciate you coming down.

REPRESENTATIVE ROBERSON: Okay. Thank you. **CHAIRMAN GRAHAM:** Thank you. And I also have Commissioner Bill Truex.

COMMISSIONER TRUEX: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I appreciate the opportunity to be here today. And I want to thank you for, first of all, for setting this time today to allow them to make the trip up here. It was very important.

I am the district representative back in Charlotte County for these folks, so they are my direct constituents. And I too went through the packet and I do understand that there's a lot of analysis done on this. I had some questions that I've tried to get a little bit of answers out of, basically how the U&U is taken care of, the used and useful. And I just think that there's probably an opportunity here to step back a little bit and reevaluate that particularly, and I know that there's going to be some testimony, so to speak, later on in reference to this.

But, you know, I also think it's excessive, I have to agree with the Representative, and I do hope that the committee will take a step back and really look at this very hard. So thank you again for the opportunity.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you. I appreciate you very much, and thank you for coming down.

Okay. So we will reconvene the Agenda Conference, and we are on Item No. 19. Is that correct? Yes. We're on Item No. 19. And we have several speakers here to speak today, and we are going to let their attorney, OPC, handle bringing them up. And who is going to be that person?

Hold on a second. Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I look forward to the discussion and hearing from OPC and the customers and all. If you will allow me, I am not sure that on the motion I made on the last item that I included the oral modification. That was certainly my intent, and so I just wanted to say that for the record.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you very much. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: OPC.

MR. SAYLER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Erik Sayler with the Office of Public Counsel. We have ten

speakers that have come today. Speaker number seven, Mr. Nick Mack, was unable to come. So instead of being 11 there are now ten.

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So I would like to call Mr. Leroy Furman, President of Fiddler's Green II. And Mr. Furman does have a handout that he would like to share with the Commission.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: If we can have somebody from staff hand that out for him, please.

MR. SAYLER: I believe Mr. Furman was going to bring that with him to the podium, so.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: And let me go through some of the -- some of our rules here in the Commission chambers. Number one, there is no clapping or booing or hissing because I know there's going to be people that are going to say things you like, there's going to be people who say things you don't like. We'll just let them speak as their will and show them that courtesy, number one.

Number two, you'll be allowed three minutes to speak. There's a light box in front of you. When the light turns yellow, you know you have two minutes left; when it turns solid red, you have 30 seconds left; and when it flashes, you should be done. And so when you come up to the microphone, if you can just give me your

name. I have addresses here, so that's not necessary, but I need your name for the record so when they call you --

> MR. FURMAN: Yes. Leroy Furman, F-U-R-M-A-N. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Let me finish.

MR. FURMAN: Oh, sorry.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: So when you come to the microphone, if you'd just give your name, and that way the court reporter, as she's typing up your testimony, is assigning the name with each testimony and we don't have to try to weed through that later on. That all being said, please, sir.

MR. FURMAN: My name is Leroy Furman. I'm the President of the Fiddler's Green Condo Association II. A little on my background is I spent 30 years in estate and business planning, and my background is in logistics.

And I'd like to read this statement I got. This has to do with the rate increase by Sandalhaven. And it says, "The ratepayers didn't create the problem. It wasn't a bad business or poor management decision by the ratepayers that created the problem. It was poor management and bad business decisions made by the utility that created the problem when they expanded too fast and the management of the facility.

"It didn't have to shut down. However, they knowingly and willingly violated their license and their permit. Sandalhaven operated in violation of its permit by processing tens of thousands of gallons per day over the permitted capacity, and this caused major leakage and seepage problems in and around the facility, including the grounds of Fiddler's Green Condo Association II. Mike Wilson, an employee of Utilities, Inc. and the plant operator's immediate supervisor, told me that the water was coming from sheet flow. He denied it was coming from the plant, which was proven by the DEP to be incorrect. After extensive research by the DEP and the failure to correct the deficiencies, the utility was eventually ordered to be offline by October 1, 2015, by the DEP in a consent order issued October 9th, 2014.

"Very often the noxious odors coming from the facility were unbearable, causing many owners of Fiddler's Green Condo II to close their windows and doors to get relief. All these people you see here, they're being represented by the PSC.

"There was no attempt by the utility to work with the ratepayers to solve any of these problems. Look around the room. These people traveled more than six hours to attend this meeting and to be able to have

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a voice as ratepayers who are being asked to reward a business for making bad management and poor business decisions. When bad management and poor business decisions are made, businesses fail. But because of a special statute that private franchised utilities operate under they cannot fail, and there's something wrong with that picture.

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"They offer investors a fair rate of return in excess of 10 percent. Incidentally, I'd like to know who are the investors. When a business makes bad management and poor decisions and it fails, the investors lose. Why do the ratepayers have to -- who have no say in the operation of a private utility have to guarantee any rate to the investors? This should be the responsibility of the utility. However, by using these exorbitant rates and under the special statute, the utility will not be held accountable for making poor management and business decisions.

"Most of the people being served by this utility are on fixed or subsidized incomes. Even collectively they cannot afford to hire lawyers to meet with the PSC staff on a regularly scheduled basis to be present to present their views to the utility."

> CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Furman, your time is up. MR. FURMAN: I didn't -- my light is not on.

000009 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Next time if you'd just let 1 it stay on so he can see it blinking. 2 3 MR. SENA: It might have gotten disconnected. I've got to check it. 4 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Go ahead. I'll give 5 you another minute. 6 7 MR. FURMAN: I don't need another minute. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. 8 9 MR. FURMAN: But my lights didn't work. 10 MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, the customers would like to call Pastor Brian Arden [sic] from the Faith 11 Lutheran Church to come testify. 12 13 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Pastor, just hold on just a 14 second. We're dealing with technical --MR. ARMEN: While you're dealing with a 15 technical light issue, can I clarify who I am on the 16 17 roster? CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure. 18 19 MR. ARMEN: Because my last name is spelled A-R-M-E-N. And Faith Lutheran Church where I am pastor 20 21 is at 551 Rotunda Boulevard West. My personal address 22 is 6800 Placida Road, No. 116. The church is not served 23 by Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven, but I live and am a resident in that area. Members of my congregation are 24 25 also residents of the area served by Utilities, Inc. of

Sandalhaven.

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Are we ready to -- no, we're not ready to begin yet.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Well, number one, I do appreciate you correcting the record because it's always good to have things correct, and we especially don't want for notifications that may go back out going to the wrong location, or for somebody trying to say that we don't -- the utility doesn't even go to the church. So thank you very much for correcting that.

Sir, you can just go ahead. I've got the time right here in front of me.

MR. ARMEN: Okay. I will try to stay within the lights.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman and Commissioners, for hearing our testimony today. And thank you, Leroy, for sharing our thoughts, which are echoed by the members at Fiddler's Green Association I where I am on the board and also secretary of that board.

A rate increase of 137 percent, which is the second increase in what I believe to be about three years, indicates some significant change has happened in our area. Perhaps, one, mismanagement of the system, perhaps indicated by reports in the paper about a DEP consent order, and perhaps building for

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future capacity that didn't develop as in other reports.

Who is responsible for prudent or imprudent decisions of the Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven that have led to this rate increase? I know when our church had to do an expansion serviced by another utility, our church itself had to pay \$100,000 for a lift station to be installed so that current users were not paying the cost for our addition. And that didn't sit well with the church, but that's the law and that's what we had to abide by and that's what we did.

I would like to share some statistics on the type of people in our area. Our church has an ability to draw a map of an area, which I did, indicating the Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven area. It drew information from the U.S. Bureau of Statistics, Synergy (phonetic) Technologies, and Experian, as well as Decision Insight, and that information shows 83 percent of our members are senior citizens, 25 percent of our housing is less than \$99,000, 57 percent of our membership is coming with housing costs under \$149,000. 71 percent of our people are not employed; they are not in the labor force. They are either retired or senior citizens.

Given these realities, it appears as that Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven believes that the sole

000012 responsibility of the prudent or imprudent planning and 1 business decisions lies with the consumers who have no 2 3 say in their business operations. I would implore the Commission in your decision not to grant this outrageous 4 5 increase of 137 percent. Do not reward the utility company for imprudent decisions regarding the operation 6 7 and expansion of capacity that never developed that we are now being asked to pay for. Please do not make the 8 9 utility and its investors whole at the expense of the approximately 70 percent of its customers who are senior 10 11 citizens or unemployed. Please do not grant the 12 request. 13 (Applause.) 14 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Please, we'll have none of 15 that. Pastor, thank you very much for your comments. 16 17 OPC. 18 MR. SAYLER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 19 Just to back up to Mr. Furman, he had two different handouts. The first handout was his comments 20 21 from today, and the other handout were his comments that 22 he shared with the Commission staff back at the 23 September 24th customer service meeting. 24 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. 25 MR. SAYLER: Ms. Jane Aman, and I hope I

pronounced that right. And followed by Ms. Aman will be Mr. Martin Atkins.

MS. AMAN: Good afternoon. Actually I pronounce it Aman, but that's fine. It's a simple name that gets pronounced different ways.

Prior to my retirement I worked for over 20 years for the New York State Association of Retarded Citizens, which is the largest provider of services to people with developmental disabilities.

My husband and I moved to Fiddler's Green in April. While looking at property, our broker did point out to us that this was -- the current sewage treatment plant was operated by a private company and that they were going to dismantle the plant sometime during this year due to past operational problems. This was important for us to hear as there was a definite strong odor of sewage wafting in the air at that time. We have always had either septic systems or sewage water services provided by municipalities. We never gave a thought to having a problem with our sewage treatment being handled by a private company.

Our first indication was -- that we were wrong came about this summer when we found out that Utilities was requesting a monthly rate increase in excess of \$100. A shocker, to say the least. We have all heard

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of price gouging, but this was just ridiculous. Spending that kind of money would be like flushing money down the drain. I could have used some other words except money.

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The justification Utilities, Inc. had presented for this outrageous increase appears to be based on poor management decisions made by the company, which is now trying to cover its operational losses at our expense. That is its problem. It's not ours. If any company experiences financial problems, it cannot just expect its customers to ante up the funds to pay for its mistakes. Unfortunately, we are not able to just say keep your services, we're going to find a new provider. How we would just like -- love to walk out and become part of another local sewage treatment plant.

Like many retirees, our reason for making Florida our retirement destination was, of course, its wonderful climate, but it was also an economic decision. Shelling out over \$100 a month to dispose of sewage was not in our retirement budget calculations.

The impact of this proposed sewage rate is also going to have dire results for property owners who some day might want to sell their properties. When potential buyers see the sewage bill they will have to pay compared to other areas, they will certainly start

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looking elsewhere for more affordable services.

Prices for most goods and services have a tendency to rise over the years and I am sure all of us accept that fact, but to be burdened with such a huge, immediate increase is just unacceptable.

In medieval England, which is my home, there are five groups of robber barons. They just extorted money from their tenants whenever they needed cash to cover their excessive lifestyle debts. I feel Utilities, Inc. has fallen into this category. It has just become a 2015 robber baron, probably in cahoots with its shareholders, whoever they may be.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Ma'am --

MS. AMAN: I hope you will take my comments into consideration when making your decision. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you.

MR. SAYLER: Mr. Martin Atkins from The Hammocks of Cape Haze.

MR. ATKINS: Good afternoon, Commissioners. And, Mr. Chairman, thank you for allowing us to give testimony here today.

23 My name is Martin A. Atkins, a permanent 24 resident of Florida. And presently I would like to give 25 the following testimony.

I've got a bachelor's degree from the University of Bridgeport in Connecticut, a major in economics and accounting. I also hold a designation as a CLU from the American College in Bryn Mawr, Pennsylvania. More importantly, like yourselves, I was a commissioner of a rate setting commission. That was the Health Care Rate Commission in Massachusetts. Our commission was a little different than yours. We had a completely independent staff who made recommendations to the commission. We heard testimony from the providers, which were either hospitals, nursing homes, mental health facilities, social service agencies, and after a public hearing and receiving the testimony, we made our decision. Prior to that we had no discussions with staff. Everyone was treated on an equal basis. And that's all we're asking from you.

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Sandalhaven was granted a franchise many years ago and -- to provide sewer and water treatment services to a small section on Placida, Englewood, Cape Haze. They committed themselves to provide effective management, efficient operations, and a well-run system. They have failed in all of these three categories. Today with only approximately 825 customers, of which they had originally anticipated in excess of 3,000, they have not even been able to handle that. In fact, their

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plant was shut down as mandated by DEP.

But as we stand here today, Sandalhaven has not proven that this rate increase is necessary. They have gone through the formulas, they have given us all the statistics, all their expenditures, and essentially they're asking for a bailout.

If you approve any substantial portion of this request, it will be interpreted as a reward for gross mismanagement, and I know in my heart you would not want that to happen. I can tell you this, if you were on the board of directors of Utilities, Inc., you would have fired those responsible for running Sandalhaven. Not only that, you would have written off the total investment to zero and ceded that plant to Englewood many years ago.

Today, in finalizing my remarks, we're only asking to be on an equal footing, and I would just mention a couple of categories here. Return of capital. Return of capital historically has been granted to utilities for a guarantee to raise capital. This utility has no longer a need to raise any capital in the lower Placida year. Okay. Essentially also with corporate overhead, there's an allocation here of approximately \$150,000 for corporate overhead. With running a simple pipeline of two miles, we feel it is

unnecessary to allow even one cent for corporate overhead.

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Additionally and finally, we think that Sandalhaven is presently mismanaged and they should have contracted with Englewood for any additional expenses that they permanently -- that they presently incur that is in your rate base today. One just happens to be an engineer, a person to monitor the system. And I feel, after talking with many experts in the field, that that cost of in excess of \$65,000 should be reduced by at least 40 because I know that Englewood could do this on an hour and a half to two hours a day, which is basically 20 percent of the 65,000 in the rate base.

That concludes my remarks. I appreciate your time and effort in hearing from me and hope you make the correct decision. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, sir.

Hold on a second, sir. We have a question for you. Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. Thank you for coming and providing your testimony. You just recited some numbers, and could you just repeat those again?

MR. ATKINS: The one about the return on equity?

COMMISSIONER BROWN: No, the 65,000.

000019 MR. ATKINS: 65. I know in the 1 recommendations presented by staff originally they had a 2 rate adjustment -- originally Sandalhaven had, I 3 believe, two and a half people, two and a half persons 4 to run their system, and I believe they had reduced that 5 down to essentially a one-time full-time equivalent. 6 7 And I feel that -- and I believe it was 65,000 in that calculation. I believe that they could have contracted 8 9 with Englewood for not only that service but for others to monitor their system for essentially \$20,000 per 10 11 year. COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thanks so much. 12 13 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, sir. 14 MR. ATKINS: Thank you. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: OPC. 15 16 MR. SAYLER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. I'd 17 like to call Mr. Coleman Wholean, who is the operator of 18 Cape Haze Car Wash. 19 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sir, welcome. 20 MR. WHOLEAN: Thank you. Coleman Wholean, 21 Cape Haze Car Wash. I appreciate having the time to 22 speak here today. I only relatively recently learned 23 about this. I'm a new owner to this car wash. My 24 business, basically I purchased it with the intent to 25 maybe in ten years or so have the opportunity to retire

and run a small business.

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This rate increase will cause me to have to increase the rate that I am charging to my customers, who are, as was stated earlier, on a fixed income. The likelihood that they will stay using the same car wash is slim to none because there is one-half mile down the road another car wash. They charge the same rate I do now. They won't raise their rates. I'm going to lose customers.

If I don't run my car wash properly, if I don't fulfill the duties that are expected of me by my customers, I lose customers. The utility company has apparently not run their utility company properly. And what do they do? Instead of losing customers which they can't lose, they just come to you and request another rate hike. Apparently this is the third rate hike since 2006 that they requested. Don't allow it.

There's a much more reasonable rate that you can have them get through. Like, as was stated earlier, if they need a rate hike, I'm sure something a whole lot more reasonable than 97 or 130 percent -- I've heard two different numbers batted around -- can be reached. But send them back to the drawing board. Make them figure it out so that the rate is reasonable and so that businesses like mine and several others -- there's

restaurants in our plaza that are going to suffer from 1 This is going to affect a lot of businesses. 2 it. Here we have a busload of 60 people that came up here, which 3 is actually, in the total number of people that this 4 company services, 825, I believe, that is a good number 5 of people to turn out to speak to any board, to speak to 6 7 anybody, especially when you take into account that we had to get on a bus at 5:00 this morning. I just 8 9 strongly request that you deny any rate hike. Thank 10 you. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, sir. Thank you 11 12 for coming up, for your testimony. 13 MR. SAYLER: Ms. Joanne --14 MS. AGOSTAROLA: Agostarola. 15 MR. SAYLER: Thank you. 16 MS. AGOSTAROLA: I thought I'd help you there. 17 Like you said, you have the spelling, you have my 18 address, you have all the stuff that you need. 19 Okay. Thank you very much for the opportunity 20 to meet with you as one of the 835 Sandalhaven 21 customers. We have traveled more than 750 miles today 22 in order to demonstrate the serious financial impact 23 that the rate increase will impose upon us. 24 In a recent November 23rd letter from the PSC, 25 it stated, and I quote, the Commission is required to

set rates that are just, reasonable, compensatory, and not unfairly discriminatory. I respectfully ask you how does approving this unbelievable rate increase meet your requirements? How is a rate increase just and reasonable when Sandalhaven customers are already paying more than all customers that use wastewater services in Charlotte County, Boca Grande, and Englewood, all of our neighbors? With a 94 percent increase recommended by your staff, we will be paying more than twice as much as any non-Sandalhaven customer. Allow me to repeat that, more than twice as much for the privilege to continue to flush our toilets.

Current customers should only pay for property needed to serve current customers, not property anticipated to serve potential future customers. We're being held hostage by Sandalhaven. They have a monopoly hold on us. When other local utilities offer the same service at half the price, you have to question the business decisions being made by Sandalhaven.

In closing, I wholeheartedly endorse and support the concerns, observations expressed by my fellow customers here today. Respectfully I ask you consider what you hear today on behalf of the 835 customers our 911 call to you as we have nowhere else to go. So, please, do not grant Sandalhaven this

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outrageous increase. Thank you.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Ma'am, thank you very much. MR. SAYLER: Skipping over Mr. Nick Mack, the owner of the Ristorante Italiano who couldn't make it today, calling Mr. Lloyd Abbot, President of Hacienda Del Mar Association.

MR. ABBOT: Good afternoon. My name is Floyd Abbot. I'm a retired naval officer and naval aviator. I'm here to represent the 112 unit owners in our condominium. We comprise more than 10 percent of the customer base that's involved in this rate increase. I have over a hundred petitions strongly opposing the rate case which I'd like to place on file with the Commission.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: That guy you're giving it to is the perfect person.

MR. ABBOT: We strongly resonate with all the comments made by previous speakers. I have four points that I'd like to make. Economic downturn. Many Sandalhaven customers purchased their units during the 2005 to 2008 time frame just before the economic downturn. Units are now worth substantially less and the planned growth in our corridor never materialized. Sandalhaven was unreasonably aggressive in their growth forecasting. No one is helping us with our situation

and no one should help Sandalhaven. Theirs was a pure business decision, and they should be responsible for the consequences of the downturn. Customers -- current customers should pay for property needed to serve current customers. They should not pay for property needed to serve potential future customers.

Point two, reasonable rates and rate increases. It has been only two years since Sandalhaven last requested a rate increase from Charlotte County. At that time they were requesting a 100 percent increase and received 38 for essentially the same level of service. The rationale for the increase then is the same as it is now, and they are now seeking a 139 percent increase. This is generally referred to as double-dipping. We question the rationale for the PSC staff recommendation of a 94 percent rate increase.

If you look at the recent history of Sandalhaven rates, they were receiving 7.92 per thousand gallons prior to the latest request. With the interim increase it went to \$9.35 per thousand. Our three closest water/wastewater facilities are charging \$4.34, Charlotte; \$3, Englewood; and \$5, Boca Grande, per thousand. To make matters even worse, Sandalhaven is paying Englewood 7.28/thousand gallons while other Englewood residents are paying \$3. Normally businesses

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get a discount for volume and our rates should be less than the \$3, but Sandalhaven has requested approval to charge \$18.93 per thousand gallons and the PSC has recommended 15.36. Neither of these rates represent a fair market value for the service being provided. If Sandalhaven were competing for business with these proposed rates, they would go out of business.

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PSC roles. The website, your website addresses the role of the PSC. It uses phrases such as "making sure Florida's consumers receive essential services in a safe, reasonable, and reliable manner," and "PSC exercises regulatory authority over utilities in one or more of the key areas: rate base, economic regulation, competitive market oversight, and monitoring of safety, reliability, and service." Given this, we question how the PSC can ignore the fact that these three nearby waste operations are charging a quarter to a third of what Sandalhaven is requesting. There's no justification for this disparity. Sandalhaven is a monopoly. And it seems to us that one of your charter responsibilities should be to ensure fair and competitive rates, not reward a company making bad decisions.

I have one last point. Sandalhaven value added. Sandalhaven waste processing has been shut down

by the Florida Department of EPA. All they are doing 1 now is pumping wastewater to Englewood for processing. 2 3 There is no treatment being performed at Sandalhaven. What is the PSC staff's rationale for recommending a 4 \$15.36 per thousand gallons when Sandalhaven is doing 5 nothing but transporting sewage for others to process? 6 7 Okay. Bottom line, we are requesting that you vote not only to deny Sandalhaven's request for further 8 9 rate increase, but roll back their rates to be consistent with those of our neighbors. 10 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Abbot. 11 12 MR. ABBOT: If Sandalhaven cannot make a 13 business out of these more reasonable rates, we request 14 that the PSC --CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Abbot. 15 16 (Microphone turned off.) 17 (Applause.) 18 Now I have been patient. I do appreciate the fact that you all came down here. More than 7 percent 19 20 of your utility came down here. That says a lot. There 21 will be no clapping. You guys are given three minutes. 22 Please understand that. I've been patient and let you 23 go over that. That's completely fine. There's really 24 no need to quote back to us what our rules are. We do 25 know what our rules are. If you can get to the facts

000027 that we don't have, we would appreciate that. 1 Mr. Abbot, I apologize I did it right after 2 you spoke. I do appreciate your military service and 3 thank you so very much for your service to the country. 4 One of the questions I wanted to ask you before you 5 walked away is how many petitions did you turn in? 6 7 **MR. ABBOT:** 101. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: 101. Sir, thank you very 8 9 much. 10 OPC, next speaker, please. 11 MR. SAYLER: Yes, Mr. Chairman. Ted Wilson, 12 President of Harbortown Village Property Owners 13 Association. 14 MR. WILSON: Mr. Chairman, I also have 15 32 signed petitions from the owners at Harbortown 16 Village Property Association to submit. 17 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you. 18 MR. WILSON: My name is Ted Wilson. I'm the 19 President of Harbortown Village Property Owners Association. Prior to this I was Product and Marketing 20 21 Manager for 35 years for Commercial Intertech in 22 Youngstown, Ohio, and Plant Manager for Pentoha 23 (phonetic) Logistics in Youngstown, Ohio, for five 24 years. 25 I'd like to thank the Commissioners for taking FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

the time to listen to the concerns of all of us here today that represent the vast majority of the customers of Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven.

First I'd like to say I'm in complete agreement with all the information presented to you by the previous members. The idea that the current customer base is being asked to fund the infrastructure necessary to process wastewater for not only themselves but for all possible future customers simply does not make any sense for any business model, regulated monopoly or otherwise.

Another area of concern is the issue of competitive rates. And I won't preach to you. You know about one of your areas of authority is competitive market oversight. The proposed rate increase by Sandalhaven as well as staff's recommendation for a rate increase are astronomically higher than the other waste handlers in the area who are literally just across the street. One of these is actually processing our wastewater for Sandalhaven and charging them more than double than they do for their regular customers.

And it's my opinion that there really was no need to really close this plant. There were people who are actively seeking reprocessed water for many uses. Charlotte County is currently running a line right up

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

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through the same area to provide reclaimed water to everyone, and they have signed contracts for many.

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No real value added here because there's no processing being done. Again, this simply doesn't meet my interpretation of competitive rates. In a zero interest rate, low inflation rate environment, even the idea of 100 percent increases would seem to be beyond imagination.

What really disturbs me about this whole matter is this. Most, if not all, of the customer-generated information that we are presenting to you here today was presented in verbal, written, and videotaped formats at the previously mentioned public hearing held in Englewood on September 24th, 2015. I find it almost impossible to understand how none of this information seems to have been considered in staff's recommendation report as I read it. If I were in your position and I were hearing this information for the first time, I'd be concerned that there's a systemic problem somewhere in the flow of information. Just -that's just me.

I certainly don't claim to fully understand the complexity of making regulatory decisions. You, ladies and gentlemen, are the experts. I can only ask that you apply that expertise and wisdom to all of the

facts that are presented here to you today and base your decision on them. Thank you for your patience and understanding.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you very much for your testimony.

MR. SAYLER: Mr. Robert Lang, Chairman of the Franklin Township Sewer Authority in Pennsylvania, who is also a customer of the utility. Mr. Lang.

MR. LANG: Good afternoon, and thank you. Μv name is Robert Lang. For the last 25 years I've been Chairman of the Franklin Township Sewer Authority in Green County. We process approximately a million and a quarter gallons per day. We began operation in the 1973/74 area, and in 2010 we increased our rate by 25 percent. It was a 36-year run with no increase. We did that because we just finished a \$12 million plant expansion to serve our clients. Any time a developer came to us for sewage, either they paid to have the line put in at our specification or we put the line in and they paid for it. Our ratepayers were never subject to pay for lines put in at a developer's pleasure. It is unconscionable that the ratepayers should be financially responsible for paying an overcapacity building that we had no say in. That was poor management and we should not have to pay for it. We are not the federal

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government bailing out Chrysler or GMC.

Construction has increased in the area and will continue to increase, and those costs that they incurred will slowly be mitigated, but we, the current owners, should not be paying for bad practice by a utilities company. I'll ask that my additional time be passed on to speaker number 11, Clark Gillaspie. I'm sure he'll need more time. Thank you very much.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sir, thank you very much for your testimony today.

MR. SAYLER: The customers would like to call Mr. Clark Gillaspie or Gillaspie, the Association Manager of Cape Haze Resort. He does have a handout, so if he could be assisted with that, that would be appreciated.

MR. GILLASPIE: I have petitions here, 108. Thank you. And this is the handout.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Are these the same petitions or are these different petitions?

MR. GILLASPIE: These are different. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Different verbiage? MR. GILLASPIE: Pardon me? CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Is it the same verbiage as the other petition?

MR. GILLASPIE: It's similar, but all of us

prepared different versions.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Okay. I just wanted to make sure.

MR. GILLASPIE: Are we ready?

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: He'll restart it for you. MR. GILLASPIE: Okay. Thank you very much.

Dear Commissioners, thank you. Thank you for this opportunity. Here we are again. How many times is this company going to get a rate increase based on essentially the same set of facts? Sandalhaven expanded their system and was awarded a rate increase in 2007 to compensate. That should have been the end of it. But three years later they went to Charlotte County, same infrastructure, same management, same company, same basic set of ratepayers, and they were awarded a 38 percent increase. To us that was outrageous, but we thought that that was the end of it. It wasn't. Here we are again with rates perhaps doubling.

What has changed since 2007 to justify this? What is happening to us? Well, we could say that the plant closed. But surely such a material thing as that would have made sense only if there was not going to be a negative cost increase to us. A simple analysis, and it's in my handout, shows that those costs could be as high as 375, maybe even more on an annual basis. That's

a lot. We feel that any and all costs related to that, the early retirement of a plant should be borne by Sandalhaven and not by the ratepayers.

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As to all the other material issues, why is the same set of facts resulting in these massive increases? Commissioners, I don't mean in any way to be insulting by this, but this system doesn't seem to be working for us.

You know, one of the basic principles of ratemaking is that costs should follow the cost causer. The current ratepayers are not causing cost increases, so why are rates increasing? Current customers should not pay for future growth. Perhaps the most -- perhaps most hearing cases can be handled on a formulaic basis, but I don't think this is one of them. We just know this isn't right and that's why we're here today.

You know, would you impose this on your friends and family? How do you explain to your neighbor that his rates are going up 2.3 percent -- 2.3 times, pardon me, and that's spelled out in my handout, compared to the neighbor across the street? That's just a huge amount of money. That's a huge difference. What we're -- we're in your hands. Okay? Please help us out here. This is the Public Service Commission, not the Utility Service Commission. And, again, I don't mean

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that to be insulting in any way, but our choices are taken away from us, and we're in your hands and we need your help.

You know, Sandalhaven was not prudent in expanding their plant the way they did. If you look at the growth in our corridor over the last 25 years, it's been 20 to 30 units a year. That's not very much. When you go in and put facilities in that can serve as many as 3,000 units, that's 100 years of growth. That's not prudent.

You know, we all paid upfront for these connection fees. And in the case of the community I represent, we paid over \$200,000, but we're now being asked this time to pay again for the same facilities that we've already paid for.

You know, if you capitalize the rate increase that staff has recommended, use the Kiplinger multiple, 15.7 times, this is a \$10 million gift, and it comes right out of the pockets of the ratepayers and into the pockets of the utilities. It's huge. We pay for it in our monthly rates. \$52,000 a year for my community. Again, it's in my handout. We pay for it in decreased property values, and we pay for it in the harm it does to some of our local businesses.

You know, we didn't make the bad decisions.

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You know, we ratepayers didn't make any of these decisions but Sandalhaven did. You know, normal market forces would cause a company to be responsible for the harm it has caused. All we're asking here is that you please simply let Sandalhaven pay the consequences for its actions and not us. Again, let them feel free market forces. Any other company that mismanages its assets or overbills has to make a choice. They either tough it out, you know, wait until the market catches up with them, or they go out of business. You know, please help us out on this. You know, the costs again should follow the cost causer. And we're not causing, we're not causing the increases. We're the innocent ratepayer here. Thank you very much for your consideration.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Gillaspie. Thank you for your testimony today.

Is that it?

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MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, I don't have anymore speakers that signed up ahead of time. I don't know if there are any other citizens who would like to speak.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Is there anybody else in the audience before I close public hearing -- public testimony that would like to speak? I know you guys came all this way. If there's something that hasn't

been said that you feel like you need to say. Sir. 1 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: My bills were wrong --2 one of my bills was wrong again this month. I paid six 3 times the usage charge than was the actual usage. 4 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Well, thank you very 5 much. Once again, it means a lot for us to see this 6 7 kind of participation, to see this kind of feedback. People think that customer participation means that you 8 9 guys really care about what's going on here. Your 10 emails, your letters, the fact that you're here all means a lot, and the fact that you guys all had to get 11 up today at 5:00, that means a lot. 12 13 **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** 4:00. 14 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: 4:00. **UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER:** 3:45. 15 16 (Laughter.) 17 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Staff, let's tee up 18 Item No. 19 for us, please. 19 MS. BRUCE: Good afternoon, Commissioners. 20 I'm sorry. Give me just a minute. 21 I'm sorry. My name is Sonica Bruce on behalf 22 of Commission staff. Item No. 19 is Utilities, Inc. of 23 Sandalhaven's application for an increase in wastewater 24 rates in Charlotte County. The utility is a 25 wastewater-only utility serving 835 customers.

In 2014, DEP received a complaint from representatives of the Fiddler's Green Homeowners Association regarding leaching of wastewater into surrounding areas. In October of 2014, DEP issued a consent order that required the utility to divert all flows from the wastewater treatment plant to the Englewood Water District and decommission the wastewater treatment plant.

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The diversion project was completed on November 2nd, 2015, and the decommissioning of the wastewater treatment plant was completed within the past week. Staff's recommended revenue increase is 93.81 percent. The major issue in this case is used and useful.

The utility and its representatives are present as well as Office of Public Counsel and its customers. Staff is prepared to answer any questions that you all may have.

> CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you, staff. Mr. Friedman.

MR. FRIEDMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, Commissioners. Marty Friedman, attorney for Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven. To my left is Mr. John Hoy, who is the president; Patrick Flynn, who's the vice president; and I think y'all know Jared Deason, who's the financial

000038 analyst for the company. We're going to split up our 1 2 issues as lead person back and forth, if we could. Do you want to go through them, issue one by 3 4 one or --CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Let's start with your first 5 issue. 6 7 MR. FRIEDMAN: Okay. Our first issue or --I'm sorry? 8 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: 9 MR. FRIEDMAN: The first issue that we have? 10 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes. MR. FRIEDMAN: All right. The first issue 11 that we would like to address is Issue No. 3, and it's a 12 13 small issue but has significant repercussions. And that is that the staff is suggesting that we amortize the 14 15 abandoned plant over ten years, which is fine, but then 16 they go a step further and said in ten years after 17 you've amortized that plant, we want you to reduce your 18 rates and kind of like what you do for rate case 19 expense. The problem with that is two-fold. One is 20 21 that while it's specifically provided for by statute for 22 rate case expense, it is not provided for by statute for 23 any other expenses, and I would suggest that the 24 Commission doesn't have the authority to do that.

And secondly, and also importantly, is this

expense is less than 1 percent of the current year's revenue. In ten years you can imagine how miniscule the amount of money we're talking about will be compared to the revenue in ten years. So it makes no logical -- in addition to it being legally insufficient, it makes no logical sense. It will cost more to make this refund in ten years than we're going to be refunding. And so I would suggest to you that from a legal and practical standpoint, the amortization period ends, it ends, and there's no rate reduction directly associated with that.

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The next issue that we want to discuss is Issue No. 5. There's two aspects of that issue as well. One legal, which I will address, and one practical, which Mr. Flynn will address.

We did a handout earlier, it's probably at the bottom of your handouts because it was the first one, and, you know, just for your convenience we provided you with a copy of Section 367.081(2)(a). And down at the bottom, and you'll see we've highlighted some language in it, it speaks to exactly what occurred in regard to Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven and it having to abandon its plant and interconnect. And it says, "Notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph," which talks about growth and used and useful, it says, "the Commission shall," there's the word shall, "approve

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

rates for service which allow a utility to recover from customers the full amount of environmental compliance. Such rates may not include charges for allowances for prudently invested or similar charges." That's not at issue in this. And then it goes on to discuss that environmental compliance includes all reasonable expenses and a fair return on any prudent investment incurred by a utility complying with the requirements or conditions contained in any permitting, enforcement, or similar decision of USEPA, DEP, a water management district, other government entities.

And you heard the gentleman earlier say that -- I agree that DEP required Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven abandon this plant because the plant was no longer -- the ponds were no longer treating the effluent to state standards, and the only logical alternative was to interconnect, and the DEP entered into a consent order with the utility. And Mr. Flynn will tell you the status of compliance with that consent order. But the upshot is that pursuant to this provision of 367.081(2), this interconnection line, which the staff has said in Issue 1 was a prudent investment to make, this rule requires that it be included entirely in plant without any adjustment for used and useful.

And then I'll point out one other thing is

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that the Public Service Commission's used and useful rule is on wastewater treatment plant. The rule wasn't adopted to address pumps or mains or generators or any other thing or part of a wastewater facility. It was intended to address wastewater treatment plants. And we went through lots of rulemaking on that issue for many years. And so I would question whether it would be appropriate to make a used and useful adjustment to this main for purposes that the rule was not intended to cover. And I'm going to let Mr. Flynn weigh in on the specifics.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Flynn.

MR. FLYNN: Thank you, Commissioners. In regard to the comment Mr. Friedman made, I'm happy to report that the treatment plant, Sandalhaven wastewater treatment plant is fully decommissioned. In fact, the DEP official was onsite to verify that was the case and expects to deliver a closure letter for the consent order that's currently open. So essentially the plant is no more and the consent order will be closed within about a week.

My comment, in addition to what Mr. Friedman said, has to do with the excess I&I adjustment made by staff, which is primarily a function of the information provided by the utility in its MFRs, Schedule F6.

Subsequent to that MFR submittal, we discovered the fact that we had not included a significant portion of the sewer main assets that are in our inventory in service. And so upon identifying that error, we identified the corrected number and submitted that to staff. That has the impact of identifying that there's no excess I&I present in our system, and, therefore, because excess I&I is not occurring, I respectfully ask that the rates be adjusted to reflect the fact that there should be no excess I&I adjustment for purchased power, chemical expenses, or purchased wastewater treatment in order to be consistent with the facts presented in the docket.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Flynn, why wasn't that information supplied the first time?

MR. FLYNN: It was our oversight in preparing the MFRs. We had incorrectly identified the total volume of pipe, although it was the case in the 2007 docket that pipe length was included and identified. So it was our oversight in the MFR preparation. We identified it subsequently.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Staff?

MS. WATTS: And what would you like to know? CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Well, let's start with -we're with Issue 5.

MS. WATTS: Yes.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: What both the attorney and the -- what Mr. Friedman and Mr. Flynn had to say about it.

MS. WATTS: Okay. I believe we should let the attorneys address the things that Mr. Friedman said on the DEP requirements.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay.

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MS. WATTS: As far as the excess I&I, he did provide that information very late. And when I looked back at the previous docket in '07, they had provided a -- it was for a future test year, and they had provided 29,000 -- more than 29,000 feet of 8-inch pipe, but they had not provided the length of pipe that they had included in the MFRs this time. And so the total back then was 29,863, and now 40,930 for the total. So it's -- it still wasn't quite right, but we do accept that that pipe is probably in the ground. And we have a -- would use the methodology for calculating I&I that we have used consistently before this Commission, and my calculation comes up with an 11.07 percent excess I&I.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay.

MR. BALLINGER: Commissioner?

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes, sir.

MR. BALLINGER: If I may add a little to that on the I&I. It is correct, it was not provided to staff

in the MFRs. Our interim rate recommendation that went out had the calculations, and they're showing the lengths of pipe used provided by the company.

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The company at that time had the opportunity to correct staff or at least point it out. They did not until this hour. While I agree with Ms. Watts that we really don't have any doubt to not agree with the number, the length of pipe, we do have to have some demeanor in our process to have information on time, in a timely manner so staff can do its job and not at the eleventh hour. That is to your discretion of how we do that.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I don't have a problem with that at all. I'm just trying to understand.

MR. BALLINGER: And I -- if you like, I can speak to the DEP requirement and to the statute.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure.

MR. BALLINGER: As you know, I'm not an attorney, but I can say this, the way staff interprets that is this is correct if DEP or the EPA had required, let's say, the closing of a well or something of that nature, and that's fine. And this may be true for the closing of the plant. But DEP did not mandate an interconnection, DEP did not permit the size of the interconnection. So I think to draw that leap that the

interconnection should be fully utilized because of a mandate is a little different. I don't think that's the intent of the statute is to deal with mandates of what DEP or other environmental regulations are proposing.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Mr. Friedman, what other issues?

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MR. FRIEDMAN: Thank you, Commissioners. I've got one issue, one on Issue 10, weighted cost of capital. The rule requires for utilities of this size to calculate the debt based on you take the first year and the last year and then you average it. And the staff didn't like what number came out of that, so they just took a 12-month average instead of that. And my only concern with that is, you know, we've got a rule that says how to file it and what's the appropriate way to determine a particular thing based upon the size of the utility, and then have the staff decide we don't like the result, so we're going to do it a different And I just don't think that's appropriate to do way. that. You got a rule that tells you how to do it. You do it. You take the result, good, bad, or ugly.

The next issue we want to address is Issue No. 12, which are wages and salaries. And I think Jared and Patrick are going to address that.

MR. DEASON: I just had one minor issue on the

way staff calculated the salaries and wages for Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven employees. Typically -well, not typically -- every year Utilities, Inc. provides a 3 percent cost of living adjustment for all of our employees. We recognize the economic realities that our employees face. Their compensation has to increase at a rate equal to inflation plus any increases in taxes just to stay the same. If we don't provide those, they will fall behind and they may seek employment elsewhere. So we have always historically provided that 3 percent cost of living adjustment.

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In staff's recommendation, they wanted to remove that for the non-operator salaries. We did not feel it was appropriate to treat some of our employees deserved it and others did not. So we would ask that the Commission put back in the 3 percent, our annual 3 percent cost of living adjustment.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Flynn, did you have anything to add to that?

MR. FLYNN: The only other thing on that item has to do with the excess I&I adjustment paragraph where in Item 5 as well as this one the adjustment proposed by staff applied that adjustment to the power generating equipment account, which essentially is an emergency generator asset located at the master lift station, but

the master lift station is considered 100 percent used and useful by the staff recommendation. So I didn't --I don't understand the inconsistency in applying, excuse me, a rate adjustment, used and useful adjustment to the emergency generator account.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Mr. Friedman, other issues.

MR. FRIEDMAN: Well, I think on 13, and 13 deals with two different things, one, I&I, as Mr. Flynn mentioned, and the other is another small thing, but, you know, consistency is something I try to stress, and that is the bad debt expense. Staff used a three-year average. And there's one year that's got a gigantic negative number, so obviously it's an anomaly. And so usually when I've seen the staff use averages like they did -- I know they used to do for computer, computer repair work, if they saw an anomaly, they took it out and used, you know, used the next year down. So they had a three-year average but they took out the year that was an anomaly. And this year -- in this situation they just kept the anomaly in because it resulted in a lower bad debt expense. And I think the more appropriate thing to do, consistent with what's done in the past, is they should have used a full three-year average using a year -- all three years that were -- that didn't include

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anomalies in it.

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Again, Issue 13 includes I&I adjustments that we talked about that is just an oversight in getting that information, and we didn't discover that until we saw the huge amount of the excessive I&I, and we knew that there wasn't that kind of I&I because we had done work on the system to make sure there wasn't. And that was when we did that research, we discovered that we had not included, I think, 2,600 feet of a particular type of line, a whole line item of a particular type of line wasn't included. And it's there. It's there, everybody knows it's there. Nobody says it's not there. We ought to correct that error. It's just a simple mathematical error, and the staff said, I think, it results in a 11 percent excessive I&I.

The next issue is rate case expense that Jared is going to address.

MR. DEASON: I just wanted to address two small oversights on the part of staff. In the first data request that staff provided to us, in our response to that, they wanted some updates as far as invoices from our consultants who were preparing MFRs. I think there was some misunderstanding in the reading of the invoices and the subsequent time sheets that were submitted. Unfortunately it gave the impression that

certain work was performed after the MFRs were filed. I think there was a date of June 5th when the MFRs were filed June 3rd. The date that was provided, June 5th, was a week ending date, so it represented all the work that was done the week prior to June 5th, which fell in the time -- the few days before the MFRs were filed. So that -- all the work that was done on that invoice was not duplicative, as staff suggested. It was legitimate costs that we incurred.

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There was also another item related to travel expenses. In response to staff's third data request, they required -- they requested us to provide detail regarding our travel expenses which mainly came down to mileage, tolls, meals, hotel for us to attend a customer meeting in Englewood as well as this Agenda Conference here. That was provided in that data request, all the detail to that. I think it was just -- it was buried at the end of a very lengthy response, so I think it was just a simple oversight on staff's part.

The two items together come to exactly \$4,268, and we would request that those legitimate costs be added to and put back in with rate case expense.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Staff?

MR. BUYS: Dale Buys with Commission staff. Going back to the cost of capital, the weighted average

of short-term debt, Sandalhaven's cost of short-term debt is allocated down from the parent, and the parent's cost of -- the way they calculate their cost of short-term debt, which is per rule, is using the simple average methodology. The simple average methodology yields a -- using that methodology yields a short-term interest rate of 7.77 percent. We believe that it's more appropriate to use a 13-month average methodology and to determine a short-term debt cost rate of 2.23 percent.

Now the reason this occurs is that when you use the simple average, the company is paying interest expense on a balance -- a 13-month average balance of about 13 -- almost \$14 million over the year. When you use the simple average balance, which takes smaller monthly balances in December of 2013 and 2014, that total outstanding balance is only \$4 million. So when you use the simple math -- the simple average methodology, you're dividing the \$310,000 interest expense by the \$4 million, which yields the much higher short-term interest rate. And we just don't believe that that reflects the true cost of short-term debt that the parent company is paying and we don't believe that that should be allocated down to Sandalhaven.

And this was the same -- a similar decision

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the Commission made back in the Labrador rate case where the utility also used a simple average, and they -- the Commission compared that to the Sanlando case, which also used a 13-month average. And the reasoning there was that it just didn't reflect the true cost of debt for Labrador and that the two companies, Labrador and Sandalhaven and Sanlando, were all sister companies that get their debt allocated down from the parent. And we just believe that should be consistent across the board for all three utilities at this point and all Utilities, Inc. companies.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay.

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MR. BUYS: Going on to the salary expense, staff -- talking to the 3 percent decrease, the decrease was applied to approximately -- if I could look back at my -- let's see. It was applied to approximately eight -- \$21,000 of salary expense that we removed the 3 percent increase from. That increase was anticipated salaries in 2016, and we felt like that was outside of the test year and it shouldn't be included in the rate case in this situation. We did include a 3 percent increase for the operator salaries, which was about \$60,000. We have 1.2 operators allocated for Sandalhaven in this case, and we just believe that next year the operators are out in the field, they're doing

the work, and they're specialized employees, and we felt like that would probably be more appropriate to ensure that they have the appropriate salary.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. What about that rate case expense?

MR. BUYS: The rate case expense, we do agree with the utility. That was an oversight on the staff's part.

One note with the travel expense, this is a new expense that the utility is going to submit to -- in their future rate cases from our understanding, that they are going to collect or attempt to collect the mileage, the tolls, and meals for their Florida employees to attend the customer meetings and the Agenda Conferences, which staff does not object to that. That's an expense they will incur to attend the meetings. And that was not usually included in prior rate cases. So we don't have an objection to that expense that they did incur through the accounting fees and the travel expenses. It is not included in the rate case currently. It would be up to your discretion to include that as well.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Friedman, other issues. MR. BUYS: Oh, I'm sorry. I think there's the bad debt expense. I think I missed that one as well.

The bad debt expense, we had several discussions with Mr. Deason about the bad debt expense. We were trying to get a handle on what the appropriate amount would be. Using the amounts that were in the annual reports, we did have a negative anomaly. And, likewise, using the three-year average, that's what the math resulted in. We tried to get a better handle on just what the utility was going to pay. He provided a subsequent document. And the average for 2013, '14, and '15, I believe, would come out to be about \$1,833. Staff is recommending 1,800 -- approximately the same amount.

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The company calculated a little bit higher amount of \$4,768 using 2012, 2013, and 2014; however, we have another anomaly in 2012, or it appears to be an anomaly, that it's \$11,000 in 2012. So you can see it's -- the bad debt expense can fluctuate. It depends on what the company has in their records. So we believe that the amount that staff is recommending is still appropriate on a going-forward basis.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Utilities, Inc.

MR. HOY: Yes. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. John Hoy for the utility. Just two final issues.

Issue No. 17 whereby -- in the staff recommendation there's no consideration for any type of

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repression. We believe that -- I mean, it's hard to believe that there won't be any repression as a result of this, which does hurt the utility in the ability to actually collect the revenue that may be granted here today. I think the issue is that -- the staff has done an excellent job with the repression model they have on the water side. I think it's one that's actually nationally recognized as a best practice. We just ask for some consideration here for that type of adjustment or in future cases at least apply it to wastewater utilities and take that into account that there may be repression and the inability of the utility to get the revenue it's granted.

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The last issue is the issue related to the AFPI charge, Issue 23. The AFPI charge is -- in this case is being reset. So based on the new used and useful numbers, the AFPI charge would be reset to a new number today. And in normal circumstances that would, that would be the way it would work. The problem is that in order to -- with the closing of the plant and the new used and useful recommendation that's being done for the other plant, normally you get up to that higher used and useful by additional customers coming on and paying that AFPI. The problem is that the utility -- we haven't had any customers coming up paying the AFPI

along that time frame so that we haven't been able to collect the AFPI for the ten years that that plant has been unused and unuseful during that period. So we would request that the AFPI charges just stay at what they are today instead of being reset, and that's it.

MR. FRIEDMAN: That's all we have, although we would like to be able to respond to any comments that OPC may make. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: OPC.

MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, we do have three handouts to pass out. We can do them as we reach our issues or we can do them all at once.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Let's just do them all at once.

MR. SAYLER: All right. Give me a moment to give this to staff.

Mr. Chairman, with your indulgence, while they're passing out the handouts, I'm not going to refer to those handouts --

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure.

MR. SAYLER: -- during this introduction.

Good afternoon, Commissioners, Mr. Chairman, also Chairman-Elect Brown. How are you doing today?

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

MR. SAYLER: Ms. Vandiver and I are here on

behalf of the Office of Public Counsel for the customers of Sandalhaven. I've also asked Mr. Clark Gillaspie, who you heard from earlier today, to be able to chime in and respond to some of the issues related -- that we're going to be touching on today. So if it's possible, Jared, do you mind if Mr. Gillaspie sits there? Thank you.

We're really addressing three main issues today: Quality of service, Issue 1; used and useful, Issue 5; and salaries and wages, Issue 12. There are handouts for each of the three issues which set forth some of our positions and our recommendation.

And when it comes to responding to the company and their various issues, I'll try to intersperse that within our discussion and dialogue here today. I will lead the discussion on quality of service and used and useful, Ms. Vandiver on salaries, but she may add additional information as necessary.

First I'd like to thank Representative Roberson and Commissioner Truex who came here today to represent their customers. I'd also like to thank the more than 50 customers that drove, as you know, many hours to be here. They rose well before dawn to be here to see how this process works. And, Mr. Chairman, thank you for giving some latitude to the speakers to share

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their thoughts a little bit beyond the time frame.

I have to say these customers have expressed to me tremendous concern over the fact the utility has requested over a 130 percent rate increase just three years after they received a 40 percent rate increase from Charlotte County. But they're also concerned -they've expressed concern to me that they're a little concerned that staff is recommending a 94 percent rate increase, which, if approved without modification, it will double their rates. For a customer using 2,000 gallons, their rates will go from \$42 a month to \$82 a month.

And at the customer meeting that was held in September, I met a woman who is a single mom with a son who was probably ten, 12 years old. She was one of the 11 Habitat for Humanity customers that are within the Sandalhaven service territory. She couldn't stay for the whole time to be able to testify there, but she broke down in tears afterwards when I spoke to her as I caught her going out the door. She was in tears, holding her bill, not knowing how she's going to pay for the doubling of her rates. And at that time, you may be well aware that the interim rates had gone out inadvertently doubling the rates. So she was just beside herself. And not only her, but the other 11

Habitat for Humanity customers, this increase in rates is going to be troubling for them. Very hard for them to make ends meet, if they can make ends meet. Not only her and her son, but the other customers on fixed incomes --

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Sayler.

MR. SAYLER: Yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Can I get you to start with the issue that you have a problem with?

MR. SAYLER: Certainly. The first issue is the quality of service issue. And ultimately under the quality of service issue is embedded this idea that this rate increase will reward this utility for poor planning for excessive growth that is yet to come. It makes current customers pay for that future growth. It's axiomatic, as Mr. Gillaspie shared earlier, that costs should follow the cost causer. The customers didn't require the utility to expand the capacity as greatly as they did. The utility did. It was their choice. And that's where the used and useful rule comes into play, which we'll get to later on. However, the recommended rate increase will require current customers to pay for those projected future growth which may occur many years into the future.

But referring to our handout, quality of

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service. A quality of service finding should be based upon past actions, actions that occurred during the test year, before the test year, and they should not be allowed to -- a utility should not be allowed to promise future improved quality of service in the future without being held accountable for its prior actions. And in this case, prior to the retirement of the wastewater treatment plant, the wastewater treatment plant was the lowest cost option for treating the flows for the wastewater treatment plant.

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According to the 2014 test year, the wastewater treatment plant treated about 72,000 gallons per day or about half of the 150,000 gallons that this utility was originally permitted for before it was derated several times. Now the flows from this retired plant are redirected to the Englewood, and those flows actually account for more flows than are coming from the new development which the Englewood line lift station and force main were built and sized to treat.

As the customers stated earlier, they believe and we believe that it's possible that this utility imprudently managed the wastewater treatment plant to the detriment of its customers. We believe that the utility failed to make prudent decisions to maintain the wastewater treatment capacity and also reuse disposal

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As noted in the 2007 Commission order, when the company knew that it was losing the Wildflower Golf Course for reuse capacity, gray water disposal, the company did not prudently explore other means to dispose of that reuse in order to maintain the permitted capacity.

From a conversation I had in talking with the customers here, there's a local golf course nearby, the Lemon Bay Golf Course, which was interested in taking all of the reuse, but that option wasn't explored. Other customers, Mr. Gillaspie and others can say that there is a utility easement that runs along the east side of Placida Road behind all the new development that could have provided reuse water to all those new developments and future developments. Each of them will say they would have taken this reuse water that was no longer available to the Wildflower Golf Course that went out of business. They would have taken that reuse water, which would have allowed the utility to keep the permitted capacity of 150,000 gallons per day for the wastewater treatment plant. Had they had that capacity and had they maintained the wastewater treatment plant properly, we believe that they would not have had to prematurely retire this wastewater treatment plant.

According to the customers, there's other indicia of imprudent mismanagement. Customers are complaining that there are smells emanating from the plant, that they didn't maintain percolation ponds, and that because of not managing it properly, wastewater seeped out of the plant. That is well documented. The utility agrees that they had issues with violating their DEP permit, and because of that violation they ended up having to close it down.

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Mr. Furman from Fiddler's Green in his September 24th comments at the customer meeting which you have before you which I don't believe are referenced in the staff's recommendation, he talked about how the utility failed to take action when the customers initially complained back in -- sometime in 2013. And they went around trying to find help. They went to the health department, and then the health department helped them get in contact with the DEP. In April of 2014, the customers filed a complaint with DEP. A month later the DEP said to the utility, you're in apparent -- out of -they sent the utility an out of compliance letter saying that there were problems, and then shortly thereafter the DEP derated that plant from 99,000 gallons per day to 45,000 gallons per day. And the flows that were going through that plant at that time exceeded that new

permit; thus, because they didn't maintain those ponds properly, they had to retire it per the consent order.

And we believe that these failures ultimately resulted in the early retirement of that plant, and for that reason we believe that this Commission should make a finding of unsatisfactory based upon the management of the wastewater treatment plant asset that they had to prematurely retire. In addition, for some of the customers -- the responses to the customers, we don't believe it was also satisfactory, and we also believe that the ROE should be reduced by a 100 basis point, which is about a \$7,000 adjustment.

But here -- and this gets into my next point, but I can stop now if there's any questions on quality of service at this time or I can move on to my next point.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Commissioner Brisé. COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: When -- if you can tell me when the jurisdiction was transferred again.

MR. SAYLER: Jurisdiction to Charlotte County was transferred in, I think, November of 2007, and it was transferred back to the Commission in November of 2012.

COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: So all of these issues occurred between 2013 and now or are we -- or are you

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

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asking the Commission to look back into 2011 and 2012 to address the unsatisfactory?

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MR. SAYLER: We are asking the Commission to look not only at the test year but also look at the past actions of this utility as it relates to its management of this plant that go all the way back to the 2007 rate case with -- that this Commission had. The utility didn't seek reuse options to find other means of disposing of the effluent. When the Wildflower Golf Course went bankrupt, they just went to the DEP and said we don't -- I pulled the permits the other day. They just went to the DEP and said, "We need to re-rate our plant because we don't have a reuse option." Yet the customers will tell you that all these new condominium associations would have taken that reuse.

COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: And one last question. So in that time, in the interim time are there things that should have been addressed through maybe other rate cases in the interim, and did they go before Charlotte County and attempt to have those issues addressed? I mean, if you can help me with that.

MR. SAYLER: Yes, sir. Back to your earlier question, yes, we're asking you to look back beyond the test year. But I participated in the Charlotte County rate case. These issues were not teed up because the

wastewater treatment plant was still online. It was the lowest cost option. And it was recognized in that order that half of the flows would go to the wastewater treatment plant, and there was no mention -- I could be wrong, there may have been mention that it might be retired at that time, but half the flows were going to go there and then half of the flows were going to go to the Englewood district. The Charlotte County Commission made the appropriate used and useful adjustment for both. They found the wastewater treatment plant 100 percent used and useful and it made a substantial used and useful adjustment. So these issues weren't necessarily teed up in that particular case, but we weren't in that situation where we're dealing with a prematurely retired wastewater treatment plant.

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COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: Okay. I just think that that's a huge degradation in that amount of time. And

MR. SAYLER: Yes. And the plant was re-rated to 99,000 gallons per day, I think, 2011, and that was a known factor in the Charlotte County rate case. It wasn't until May of 2014 that it was derated down to 45,000 gallons per day.

> COMMISSIONER BRISÉ: Okay. Thank you. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Brown.

000065 COMMISSIONER BROWN: In that Charlotte County rate case that you said that you participated in --MR. SAYLER: Yes, ma'am. COMMISSIONER BROWN: -- was there a quality of service element to the consideration of the rates? MR. SAYLER: There was a quality of service determination, and I believe it was satisfactory. Yes, I believe it was satisfactory. COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Your next issue. MR. SAYLER: All right. Sequeing into Issue 5, used and useful, but just a little background. The effect of the premature retirement of the wastewater treatment plant affected the rates of all the Sandalhaven customers, not only the customers served by the Englewood connection, but also the customers served by the wastewater treatment plant. It forced the utility to build a new connection to redirect all flows to Englewood, and the cost of that connection would be added to rate base and would increase customer rates. It also led to the early retirement of the undepreciated amount of the wastewater treatment plant, and it also increased the volume of flows going to Englewood from 64,000 to 136,000, which would generally lead to an automatic increase in the used and useful adjustment.

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And when it comes to looking at the utility's requested used and useful adjustment, their argument is that because we have another option, we should get 100 percent used and useful. Well, there are plenty of utilities around the state that have wastewater treatment plants that probably have some sort of used and useful adjustment and they're the only option. So that -- I'm not sure I buy that argument. But OPC also submits that staff's used and useful calculations are overstated. And the used and useful, by and far and large, is the largest cost driver in staff's recommended rate increase.

Regarding the utility's arguments about DEP, we agree with staff's analysis of it. The utility was not required by DEP to build a one million gallon per day force main, a half a million gallon lift station, or to buy 300,000 gallons of wastewater permit -- or wastewater treatment from Englewood.

Just a very, very brief history of the used and useful, the Commission's used and useful adjustment in this case. When you compare the key facts of the last two rate cases -- the 2007 Commission rate case, the Charlotte County case -- with the facts of this case, they are essentially the same with the exception of the retirement of the wastewater treatment plant and

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

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the redirection of all wastewater flows to Englewood.

In the 2007 rate case, the Commission found used and useful for the Englewood connection to be 17 percent, the force main interconnection to be 5 percent, and the lift station to be 10 percent. In the Charlotte County 2012 rate case it was increased. The treatment capacity went to 31 percent, the interconnection force main went to 9 percent, and the lift station went to almost 19 percent. And if you look at Schedule F10 on the handout that I provided, it shows how -- since the utility's 2012 rate case with Charlotte County, the number of ERCs as calculated by wastewater flows has decreased substantially, maybe 10 percent year over year for this rate case. But -- and despite the same facts, some modest customer growths. There is a number of new customers that have been added, but the overall flows have decreased.

And the apparent negative growth in the ERCs, the staff is recommending 100 percent used and useful for everything except for the force main, which is they're recommending 75 percent. We do not believe that this is reasonable. We do not believe it is supported by the documentation which the utility filed in support of its rate increase. It -- the utility has the burden of proof always, and we don't believe the utility met

its burden of proof.

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And looking at the statute which I attached, I believe it's page 3 of my handout, the used and useful calculation, we believe -- or the statute -- staff's used and useful calculation doesn't follow the statutory formula. Section 367.081(2)(a)(2) states that property is used and useful in the public service if it is needed to serve current customers or it's needed to serve customers five years after the test year at an ERC growth rate of 5 percent per year. The statute does allow a third option to prove up used and useful, but that requires clear and convincing evidence which the utility has not provided in this case.

Second, when you look at the components of the staff's used and useful calculation, in addition to the flows redirected from the wastewater treatment plant and Englewood, they have added two more: guaranteed revenue flows and prepaid commitment flows.

Prepaid commitment flows and guaranteed revenue flows are not permitted by Section 366.081(2). The statutory used and useful formula only allows property be needed for current customers which would be evidenced by the wastewater treatment plant flows and the Englewood flows, and also customers five years after the end of the test year, which is that growth

allowance. Guaranteed revenues and prepaid commitments are not among the statutory criteria to calculate used and useful and, therefore, should be removed from the calculation.

Third, the growth allowance is overstated and results in approximately a 10 percent ERC growth for the purchase capacity and force main, and approximately 21 percent annual growth, ERC growth for the primary lift station. And Ms. Vandiver has more details on those numbers if you need it.

Staff's growth allowance calculation apparently mixes units using both customer count and equivalent residential connections or ERCs instead of using ERCs alone, which is how staff calculated the used and useful adjustment in the 2007 order. As a result of mixing ERCs and customers in this calculation, the growth allowance exceeds the 5 percent per year growth rate mandated by statute and should be corrected. And you can see our correction on the schedule that we provided. It's highlighted in blue.

The adjustment for excessive inflow -infiltration inflow we believe should be applied to the used and useful calculations, not just for the Englewood interconnection or purchase capacity but also for the force main and the lift station. In the 2012 Charlotte

County rate case I&I was applied to all three components of the used and useful calculation. And we believe that in order to conform with the plain language of Section 367.081(2) the calculation -- staff's used and useful calculation should be adjusted to match that of the used and useful calculation on page 2 of this handout. Ιf made, that would decrease the purchase water treatment capacity used and useful down to 44.8 percent used and useful. The interconnection force main would be decreased from 100 percent to 31 percent. The primary master lift station from -- excuse me. The interconnection force main, yeah, from 100 percent -sorry. The interconnection force main should be 31 percent and the primary master lift station should be 32 percent. If these adjustments are made, the revenue requirement increase will be decreased by approximately \$457,000. That's about two-thirds of staff's recommended rate increase. That would be a tremendous boon for these customers.

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And in closing on my two issues, current customers shouldn't pay for future growth. The statutory used and useful adjustment is designed to protect current customers from paying for future growth. In addition, the utility is protected by the Commission's allowance for funds prudently invested, or

AFPI, which is described in Issue 23. This allowance protects the customers for -- it allows the company to be made whole when future customers connect to the non-used and useful portion of the wastewater system. Therefore, when this Commission makes the appropriate used and useful adjustment, there should be a corresponding adjustment made to AFPI.

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I will stop there, Mr. Chairman. If there are any additional questions on used and useful --

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Staff, would you like to address OPC's comments on used and useful?

MR. BALLINGER: Yes, sir. First, let me state that what staff has done with used and useful for these components is a bit novel. Our used and useful rules apply to wastewater treatment plants. And as discussed in the recommendation, we're dealing now with a force main and interconnection, and it's really a carryover from the 2006 rate case where you had two plants in service. You had the wastewater treatment plant and the interconnection. And at that time used and useful percentages were applied to the interconnection because you had this dual service, if you will, to recognize that current customers should not pay for future growth.

But in 2006 the Commission recognized in its order that the interconnection was the most

cost-effective alternative for what was coming down the road, that was the retirement of the waste treatment plant and future growth going forward. And the concept at that time was to have a Phase I rate with the high used and useful adjustment to the interconnection and then a Phase II rate with predominantly most of that interconnection going into rate base when the wastewater treatment plant retired. That was the philosophy going forward and that's what the Commission approved in '06. Phase II rates were never implemented because they transferred to Charlotte County, so that structure never happened.

So when we got this back, we had to look at -recognizing this plant was going to be retired. Excuse me. Now the citizens are served only by the single interconnection. That's their only source of treatment. So an argument could be made for 100 percent of everything. It's their only source to get it there. But staff is also cognizant of looking for future growth, so we carried on with this used and useful percentages. And there's, again, two different ways we did it.

On the actual capacity charges, if you will, to Englewood, we used a traditional average daily flow analysis and looked at it from that standpoint. Staff

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also included the prepaids and the prior commitments because while they're not actually flows associated with those, those are monies that developers paid upfront to secure this capacity so that if they did show up today, the utility would have to serve them. So those funds have offset rate base, and we thought it was important to go ahead and include those flows in the used and useful calculation because the utility has to stand ready to serve those today, if required. Our growth allowance was done on a normal ERC basis for that component.

For the force main and the lift station we took a slightly different approach. Those are -- those facilities are for different purposes. They're typically not designed for average daily flow. They've got to handle peak flows. And staff looked at it from this standpoint, that if they're not on that standpoint, you could have severe ruptures and outages, things of this nature. So we did a used and useful based on peak flow data as opposed to average flow.

Again, this is an estimate because we're basing it on historic data, what the peak day was, using ratios to get to an approach. So it's a -- it is an estimate to try to look at the system as a whole and recognize what is the purpose of the system. With that

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again we included the prepaids and the guaranteed revenues as those are, in our mind, existing customers. They have paid their commitment to get in line and they should be ready to be served. I think that covers it.

MS. BROWNLESS: And if I can just address a legal issue as to whether 367.081(2)(a)(2) prohibits what the staff has done here, that's not our reading of that section. I would point out that if you actually look at the statutory language, it says unless a longer period is approved by the Commission and if a longer period more than five years after the end of the test year is approved, the company has to show -- present clear and convincing evidence to justify the inclusion of flows more than five years in the future. And for the reasons that Tom just explained, we believe that, in fact, the company has justified that, which is completely consistent with the language of 367.081(2).

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Friedman, would you like to address Issue No. 5, used and useful, other than what you've already said?

MR. FRIEDMAN: Do you not want us to address the quality of service issue at this time?

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: If you want to tear that Band-Aid, you can.

MR. FRIEDMAN: I just -- I want to make sure

FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

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we don't leave any stone unturned.

MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, before we get too far afield, there was an error in staff's calculation. We looked at their schedules that they provided to us that show how they miscalculated -- or incorrectly calculated the growth adjustment. We have a handout at the appropriate time to show where they conflated the ERCs with customers.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: That's on which one?

MR. SAYLER: Used and useful. Mr. Ballinger said that staff calculated the growth allowance using ERCs. But if you look at the schedule that was provided to OPC, it clearly shows a customer number or something approximating a customer number.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Mr. Friedman, did you have anything else to add on used and useful?

MR. FRIEDMAN: No. We made most of our argument other than to point out that the used and useful adjustment was made not just on that force main but on all of the force mains --

> CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. MR. FRIEDMAN: -- and other facilities.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Brown. I apologize.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

Mr. Sayler, you made some -- you said some numbers and you were talking a little softly and fast, and you were talking about Charlotte County's used and useful numbers in the case that you were involved in when you were discussing the used and useful issue and I&I. You went through a few different percentages, I believe.

MS. SAYLER: Yes, ma'am.

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COMMISSIONER BROWN: Can you repeat those? MR. SAYLER: Certainly. I even have a handout for the Charlotte County used and useful numbers.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: That would be even more helpful. If you just could pass that to the Commissioners and the parties.

MR. SAYLER: Certainly. But for the record, it's 31 percent for the Englewood capacity fees, master lift station about 19 percent, and the force main was 9.5 percent.

19 COMMISSIONER BROWN: You're doing it again with the whispering.

MR. SAYLER: Sorry. Capacity fees, 31.5 percent.

> COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you.

MR. SAYLER: Lift station, about 19 percent. The force main was 9.47 percent.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thanks.

Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

MR. SAYLER: I have a tendency to speak fast. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Ms. Vandiver, you have Issue 12?

MS. VANDIVER: Yes, Commissioners. I have just a few comments. One is that I'd like to talk just very briefly on Issue 5 on the infiltration. I would like to point out just what's been said previously, but the adjusted numbers that the company provided were provided on November 23rd, which is almost six months after the original filing and well after the recommendation was filed. And while the staff is certain that those are probably in the ground, I don't think they've had sufficient time to fully investigate the accuracy of the numbers, and this is just way too late to be changing those numbers.

I have another quick comment on Issue 13 on the bad debt expense. Similar issues in that some of the information that was provided yesterday is a little late, and I really think staff did a good job of trying to review all the different annual numbers that were provided, and there were a lot of anomalies. And to make an average, it is an estimate and it is an average, and I agree that staff's number is correct for bad debt

expense.

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I do want to spend just another few minutes on That issue has been discussed. But the staff salaries. recommendation is for 1.2 FTEs to be included for operator salaries. And as Mr. Atkins, one of the customers, has commented, we certainly agree that that is probably too much operator salaries for this utility The utility no longer treats wastewater. It sends now. all the flows to the water -- Englewood Water District. We believe the utility has not considered other cost options to maintain the collection system, whether it was to send -- to contract with the county or the water district or even other operators. We also believe not only should the operator salaries be adjusted, but that the test year management salaries should be adjusted. We believe that the test year management probably was fairly high with all the work that was being done and that there should be less management required in the future.

We believe that it would be reasonable to cut the allocated management salaries in half and reduce the operator -- operation salaries to one-half FTE. I was not able to completely reconcile the staff's estimated salary expense, but I would recommend possibly a \$39,000 reduction to the test year expense. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Staff, would you like to address OPC's position on Issue 12?

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MR. BUYS: If the utility doesn't need those operators going forward to operate the system, staff doesn't have any problem with reducing the salary expense. I believe the company would be the one more appropriate to address the number of employees they need and whether or not they're -- they need less management to manage the company.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I was just giving you the opportunity. It's okay to say no.

MR. BUYS: If that's what -- if that's the appropriate cost, staff doesn't have any problem with reducing those salaries further.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Friedman.

MR. FRIEDMAN: Commissioners, Marty Friedman. I'm going to address the management part and I'm going to let Mr. Flynn address the on-the-ground technical people.

It looks like what the staff wants to do is to take the allocations and only make it half for the corporate overhead allocations. Instead of a full one ERC, they want to make it a half. And, you know, as you know, the PSC has consistently allocated corporate overhead based upon ERCs and they haven't made

adjustments to make it half an ERC if it doesn't have a plant or two ERCs if it's got two plants. They've -- as a matter of fact, the utility used to make those kind of adjustments when -- before it went to the ERC. I don't remember if any of y'all were here, I'm sure that Commissioner Edgar was, that they had a different methodology. If it were water and sewer together, it was less than if it were water or sewer. And the Commission said that won't work, we want something consistent, and you went to what you consistently do, which is it's an ERC without regard to whether it treats its own water or wastewater. And obviously it has a repercussion because if this half comes away from them, it's got to go somewhere else. So if this comes out, where does it go? Who else is going to make up that revenue that's being lost by this arbitrarily saying we should only need half the overhead for this particular utility?

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And, in fact, Tierra Verde is a pass-through utility, has been, it's been before this Commission many times, and nobody has ever suggested that this adjustment be made. And so I would -- from the management part, that's certainly inconsistent with anything this Commission has ever done regarding allocations of corporate overhead.

And I'm going to let Patrick deal with the technical folks on the ground.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Flynn.

MR. FLYNN: Sir, the staff recommendation of 1.2 FTEs worth of salary wage expense is consistent with the response I provided, and staff did a request, No. 2.8. It identifies the fact that we reduced our staffing requirements from the existing to 1.2 reflecting having the ability to operate and maintain our collection system on a going-forward basis with appropriate individuals to do that, reallocating our manpower resources to do that efficiently, and to assure that we can respond after hours or during the normal workday as issues arise in order to maintain service to the customer and also provide any -- and to limit any risk of sanitary sewer overflows or other types of emergencies. So essentially the 1.2 FTEs is consistent with the utility's perspective on what would be adequate staffing going forward. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Thank you.

Okay. Commissioners, I guess I have the first question, and this would be to staff, maybe to legal. So why was it that we did the rate case in '06, '07 and then Charlotte County did it in 2012, and then now we're doing it again? How does that happen?

MS. BROWNLESS: Well, Charlotte County passes a resolution and cedes jurisdiction back to the PSC, and that's exactly what they did.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: So they chose that -- they decided that they were going to handle the rate case for this utility or for all utilities, water utilities?

MS. BROWNLESS: All utilities, any regulated water and wastewater utility in Charlotte County.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: And so now they decided after one rate case that they want to send it back?

MS. BROWNLESS: That's my understanding, yes, sir.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Is the county commissioner still here? Okay. I was going to ask him.

All right. I'm just trying to understand that because -- I should have asked him that question when he was at the podium.

All right. Let's start at the beginning with the quality of service issue, No. 1.

Commissioner Patronis.

COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Being the rookie of the Commission, just for my education and maybe some of the members of the audience, the transfer of jurisdiction back and forth between Charlotte County and the Public Service Commission, can we just go ahead and

get just a five-second explanation of how that works and what -- what -- I mean, almost like a -- not necessarily a timeline but what it means when you transfer jurisdiction.

MS. BROWNLESS: Sure. Under Chapter 367 -when Chapter 367 was initially enacted, which was when I started doing public utility work back in 1980, Charlotte County retained jurisdiction to regulate its own water and wastewater utilities, and subsequent to that time it transferred jurisdiction to the PSC and it stayed with the PSC for a good while. And then your local government, your county government has to pass a resolution that says we'd like to have jurisdiction back from the PSC because they had already passed a previous resolution saying they wanted to grant it to the PSC. So then they passed a resolution saying they wanted to take jurisdiction back, and they, in fact, did that. So that would have been a resolution prepared and passed by each county, by all the people sitting on the county commission at that time.

They can pass another resolution and give jurisdiction back to the PSC. And when they do that, the PSC is required to keep jurisdiction. We're required now to keep jurisdiction for a minimum period of ten years because the -- Charlotte County is not able

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to come back next year and say, okay, we want jurisdiction back.

And I can tell you that the reason that that happened was in the late '80s, early '90s you had a lot of ping-ponging and utilities became understandably upset about that as did customers because, you know, there was one body doing it today and then a different set of rules. Each county that maintains jurisdiction has the ability to adopt whatever method for setting rates that they deem appropriate. While we follow the NARUC system of accounts and established case law that's been developed since 1967 when the utilities were beginning to be regulated by the PSC, each county can adopt whatever method of regulation they deem appropriate. They don't have to follow NARUC or our previous rules or anything.

So what happened was there was a lot of -there was a lot of re-having to calculate, there was a lot of confusion that was created by different sets of rules being applied to the same utility, and that's why we have the provision in the statute now that says once a county gives jurisdiction back, it must stay with the Commission for ten years so you have some regulatory stability.

COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Follow-up?

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure.

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COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: So in circumstances where a local political subdivision or jurisdiction surrenders back to the Public Service Commission, what circumstances would encourage that type of surrendering of their jurisdiction?

MS. BROWNLESS: There is no requirement in the statute. It is purely discretionary with the county.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: They don't want to do a rate case.

COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Thank you. That's kind of what I was wanting to understand.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: That was my last opportunity to do that.

15 Okay. Quality of service. I don't 16 necessarily have a problem with the staff recommendation 17 on that one, so I open it up to the Commissioners. 18 Commissioners. Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: I heard from the customers, we've heard from the customers, we've seen them. There's a lot of letters, there's a lot of correspondence in the docket file. Under our statutes, though, it just doesn't meet the criteria for unsatisfactory. I got to tell you, I appreciate the concerns that were brought up today, but I think the

000086 staff recommendation is on the money. I think it -- the utility has done what it was asked to do of DEP, it has been diligent, according to the staff recommendation and the correspondence in the file, in decommissioning the wastewater treatment plant, which probably should have happened years and years ago. But then with the transfer of jurisdiction to Charlotte County then back to the Commission it got muddied up. But to -- under our statutory guidelines of what is deemed satisfactory and unsatisfactory, I don't think that burden for unsatisfactory has been met, and I agree with the Chairman on this. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Was that a motion? COMMISSIONER BROWN: I'd like to hear from the other Commissioners before I make anything. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I think they're satisfied. COMMISSIONER BROWN: Move staff recommendation on Issue 1. COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Second. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: It's been moved and seconded, staff recommendation on Issue No. 1. Any further discussion? Seeing none, all in favor, say aye. (Vote taken.)

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Any opposed? By your action, you've approved No. 1.

000087 Issue No. 2, I don't have a problem with the 1 staff recommendation on that issue. Commissioners. 2 3 Commissioner Edgar. COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, I can move 4 approval on Issues 2 and 3 of the staff recommendation. 5 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We've moved Issues 2 and 3, 6 7 staff recommendation. Any further discussion? It's been moved and seconded. All in favor, say aye. 8 9 (Vote taken.) Any opposed? By your action, you've approved 10 11 staff recommendation on Issue 2 and 3. 12 Okay. Issue 4. I don't have a problem with staff recommendation on Issue 4. 13 14 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Move approval on Issue 4. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: It's been moved and 15 seconded, staff recommendation on Issue 4. 16 17 Issue 5 may be the one. Commissioners, Issue 5. 18 19 MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, I do have the handout that I also provided to engineering staff to 20 21 take a look at as far as the calculation of the growth 22 allowance, if you would like it. 23 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Staff, walk me 24 through the 11.07 percent again. 25 MS. WATTS: Excuse me. I'm sorry. What did FLORIDA PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION

you ask?

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: On Issue 5, the used and useful.

MS. WATTS: Yes.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: The -- there was a correction that you said was going to make a difference of 11.07 percent.

MS. WATTS: If the Commission wants to recognize the additional feet of pipe that was provided by the utility, that would make the I&I go from 26.07 percent to 11.07 percent.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I remember. I wrote a note. I just wanted to remind myself what that was.

Have you guys seen the handout that Mr. Sayler has?

MR. BALLINGER: Yes, we have. What we have is a little problem with this case again. If you look strictly at historic -- this case has been a challenge all the way through.

The historic ERCs in this actually showed a flat or negative growth, but there is evidence that growth is picking up and that's where we came to. So from a Schedule F10 from the company's estimate, it came to 87 ERCs, which was what was used in our calculation. Mr. Sayler has a different take on that of looking at

actual ERCs.

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The growth number is a discretionary number. Quite frankly, if you wanted to pull it out entirely and consider the prepaids and all that as your growth, that's possible too. So it doesn't make a huge impact. We can go one way or the other, either with staff's or with OPC's estimate of growth.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Sayler, let's pass out your document. Walk us through it.

MR. SAYLER: And, Mr. Chairman, when you get that, I can walk you through our other handout and just kind of tie it all together, if that would be helpful. You would need to look at the F10 schedule in our handout on used and useful.

If you will look at on the newest handout line 6A, which shows average --

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Hold on a second. Staff, do you have both these handouts? Okay. I'm sorry. Go ahead, Mr. Sayler.

MR. SAYLER: Certainly. If you look at 6A, average 12-month period customers, for staff recommendation they used 873 customers. OPC used 1,482 ERCs. However, when Ms. Vandiver and I contacted staff a couple of days ago to ask them where they came up with this 873 number, they said it was a customer

count number and that it might could be 835 customers. But the problem is used and useful growth allowance historically has been always calculated with ERCs.

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Now if you look at line 6B for the staff, they came up with 87 customers per year growth rate. If you look at Schedule F10, at the top of the schedule under line 5 you see average growth through period, five-year period, 1,744. If you multiply 1,744 by 5 percent, the statutory growth rate, you get 87.

So while staff in this schedule used 1,744 ERCs to calculate the 87 customer growth rate, they used the 12-month average historical period customers -- of customers, not ERCs. So you have a units issue. And when you mix units, whether it's metric and standard or ERCs and customers, you're going to come up with an incorrect calculation.

So once you get that calculation correct, whether you go with the 1,744 number or our number, which is 1,482, which is the test year number of ERCs, which we believe is the more appropriate one and is the methodology which the Commission used, as I understand, from the 2007 rate case. They used ERCs in that case.

Now when it comes to this adjustment, whether you use -- if you use staff's corrected ERC number or our number, honestly it doesn't move the needle on used

and useful much for the Englewood plant or for the master lift station. It does lower the used and useful for the force main down into the mid 60s when you correct it. However, as we submit and as even Mr. Ballinger from staff stated, they're using a novel approach for this. There's no precedent for it. They did not cite to any prior orders in this case. They did not even cite to the 2007 order for this. We believe their novel precedent does not follow the statutory formula because the statutory formula requires real flows or real projected future flows.

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And we don't believe -- and staff even admitted there are no flows with the prepaid commitments, there are no flows with the guaranteed revenue because there are no customers burdening the system today. If those customers are, in fact, burdening the system or actually, say, two years from now growth comes to the Commission or comes to that area, the utility can come in for a rate case and ask for an adjustment to the used and useful allowance through a limited proceeding. But we believe that the right way for the customers is to follow the prescriptive statutory formula, not to follow a novel approach, and to take out the guaranteed revenue payments and the prepaid commitment, and that would

substantially benefit the customers. And, remember, the utility is still protected by the AF -- the allowance for funds prudently invested. So down the road when that customer growth comes, they can change the used and useful and also recoup some on their investment for that.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Friedman, any comments before I go back to staff?

MR. FRIEDMAN: It would be particularly -although I think the staff did it right, to deal with Mr. Sayler's comments about just ignoring the guaranteed revenue and prepaid commitments, if you ignore them, then it's a double penalty to the utility because the capacity has been paid for. So if you include that in the total capacity but you don't take it out because it's being used because it's paid for, then they're getting a double penalty. And this is one -- this is a way of doing it. I don't think it's terribly novel. I mean, staff thinks it's novel. But, you know, putting used and useful on any pipes is novel, on any generator is novel. You don't have a rule -- you don't have a statute that tells you how to calculate used and useful on force mains and pipes and pumps and lift stations. You just do it and you did it. You know, whether it's right or wrong, you know, we gave you our argument about

what we think the statute says, which is it's required by DEP, it's 100 percent. The staff has said it was prudent to build that size of a pipe. What more do you want? MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, if --

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We're done.

Staff, on Issue No. 5, would you guys want to change your recommendation, are you happy, or what?

MR. BALLINGER: I'll let Melinda talk to specifics. It only -- if you agree with our calculation but you use the OPC growth number, it really only changes the used and useful on the force main. And we're good either way. I think it goes from -- the force main would go from 74.9 to 68.1 percent.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Once again, what would you like to do?

MR. BALLINGER: We could go with OPC's growth rate.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Commissioners.

20 MR. SAYLER: Mr. Chairman, one last thing, and 21 it's super brief.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay.

MR. SAYLER: If you find that this should be used and useful for these prepaid commitments and guaranteed revenues and you have a flow rate, then you

should impute revenues for that and reduce the revenue requirement for those future growth rates. I mean, it's a yin and a yang here. If you're going to add one here, you need to add it here. We believe the proper thing is to make the used and useful adjustment. But if you're going to leave in guaranteed revenues and prepaid commitments, you need to impute revenues to the bottom line for those customers and reduce the current customers' rates so they're not paying for those future customers that are represented by guaranteed revenues and prepaid commitments. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Did you ever hear the logic where you're already getting the things that you want, don't add more?

Mr. Friedman.

MR. FRIEDMAN: Nothing. I just think what Mr. Sayler said is just wrong. It's not something that -- you know, they make that argument all the time in rate cases. And, you know, they want you to include the revenue. Well, then we've got expenses to go along with the revenue. How do we -- you know, how do you do that? It's not just pure revenue. It's expenses too. And they make that argument and so far the Commission has not accepted it. Today is no different.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioners, we're on

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Issue No. 5. Does someone want to move staff 1 2 recommendation? Does someone want to move --3 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Five minutes, Mr. Chairman. 4 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure. 5 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you. 6 7 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: We'll take a five-minute break. It's 3:35. We'll come back at 3:40. 8 9 (Recess taken.) Okay. We will reconvene. 10 11 Commissioner Edgar. 12 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and thank you for the break. It's a lot of numbers and 13 14 a lot of sheets and a lot of columns, and it was helpful to me to be able to take a moment and look at them a 15 little more closely. So if I may, I'd like to ask staff 16 17 a few questions to help me move through my thinking. CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure. 18 19 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you. On Issue 5. 20 First off, the issue with the pipes, I do not find that 21 compelling generally, unless somebody else does. I 22 think that information should have been submitted timely 23 and clearly. So -- but I do have -- would like staff to 24 help me understand a little more with the used and 25 useful calculation regarding the growth allowance and

what options there may be there justifiable to make some adjustments because I do think that that is a live issue that does allow some discretion to us as a Commission. And then also on the I&I, the infiltration.

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MR. BALLINGER: Okay. I thought you said you were okay with the pipes, so that one wouldn't be addressed, but --

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Okay. Well, let's go -let's start with the used and useful.

MR. BALLINGER: Okay. That's fine.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Thank you.

MR. BALLINGER: On the growth allowance, as I said earlier, this was a little bit of a novel approach. We've got doing it for a force main, plus we have prepaids and prior commitments to throw in there, and staff had a very lively discussion months ago about how to handle this and what to do about growth. And, quite frankly, an argument can be made to have no growth allowance added in addition to the prepaid and all that. That's a perfectly logical one to do. Staff was -- I don't want to say a bit conservative by adding growth into this because it is more traditional to add it. Quite frankly, I would be fine if you removed growth entirely. That would make it a little easier for you all with the debate going on with Public Counsel with

the concern with it. It's perfectly logical to staff as well. I think it's still an appropriate approach to this. If you did remove that entirely, the amount, the used and useful percentage for the force main would be the only one that would be affected by it. All the other ones, if you took it out, it still wouldn't do it.

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The used and useful would go from 74 percent to 61.2 percent, and it would have roughly a \$51,000 revenue requirement decrease. Roughly on a bill the current recommendation is \$81 for 2,000 gallon usage, go to \$78. So if that makes your job a little easier, staff would be fine with pulling that out entirely and it would be perfectly acceptable.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Okay. And what about the point -- thank you -- the point that OPC raised about an adjustment for excessive infiltration?

MR. BALLINGER: We think staff should stay with our calculation. It's -- again, it's consistent with the calculation that we did at the interim rates where the details were provided. The company did not provide any corrected date until a week before Thanksgiving I think we got it. So we would stay with our I&I of 26.07 percent.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I'm sorry. Could you saythat number again?

MR. BALLINGER: Yes. 26.07 percent, and that's carried out throughout the staff recommendation.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure.

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COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Sayler, can you speak to the conversation that I just had with Mr. Ballinger regarding the growth allowance from the perspective of the customers?

MR. SAYLER: I'm not quite sure. Are they removing line 6E, the growth allowance, from both the capacity, force main, and for the collection system, or is it just one?

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Ballinger?

MR. SAYLER: Or are you just -- I mean, are you eliminating the growth allowance elsewhere? Here is one of the other issues with the growth allowance. Part of this growth allowance also includes those prepaid commitment flows. Part of the prepaid commitment flows already includes people like Cape Haze Resort that added 200 and some odd ERCs or customers when they billed. So this prepaid commitment for those double counts, growth allowance, it also includes current customers. So that's why the prepaid commitments that staff has estimated is very, very faulty. So instead of trying to get into the weeds and explain why there's double counting between the growth allowance and the prepaid

commitment, I looked at the rule. And Mr. Friedman is right, there isn't a rule on this. So when there's no rule, you default to the statute, and the statute doesn't say prepaid commitments or guaranteed revenues. So in our recommended one we just pulled them both out.

So -- but getting back to your question, Commissioner, I'm not sure exactly what they're pulling out and how that affects the used and useful calculation because I think purchase capacity would actually have a used and useful adjustment if you take out the growth allowance.

MR. BALLINGER: And I have to agree with Mr. Sayler. We -- again, we're doing this on the thing here. We had done a previous one only on the force main because that's where the used and useful adjustment was done. We did not look at it back for the capacity as well, but it does affect that as well if you remove growth. That would take it down to 91 percent, 91.4 percent for the purchase capacity. And we're doing it now for the lift station as well. So that \$51,000 revenue decrease would get larger. The rate reduction would be greater. I'm just trying to tell you which direction it's --

> COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Right. Yeah. Thank you. MR. BALLINGER: I don't know the amount at

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COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Nor did I ask, simply because I would not want a detailed, specific calculation done right there. As long as we all know basically what we're talking about, I think we can work with that conceptually at least for now, Mr. Sayler.

MR. SAYLER: And then when it comes to the prepaid commitments, how much of those prepaid commitments are actually current customers? I don't know how to determine that because I know Mr. Gillaspie at Cape Haze, they prepaid 200,000. There's been a lot of prepaid commitment. Some of those customers have come online and some of those customers, from discussions with -- some of those future customers may come online much later, so I don't know. So to get an accurate prepaid commitment number is very dicey, and that's why I still would agree -- believe that reasonable growth with taking out --

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Sayler, I'm sorry, but it is very unclear to me the more you talk what it is you're asking for.

MR. SAYLER: What I'm asking for is what we recommended on our spreadsheet which we provided, that you keep the growth allowance, whether you calculate it the way we do or staff does, and remove guaranteed

revenue payments and prepaid commitments.

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COMMISSIONER EDGAR: But you just said that it's dicey to calculate the prepaid commitments.

MR. SAYLER: Yes. So calculate them as zero and then you don't have to -- it's no longer dicey. You take it out, it's zero, and it makes the equation go much smoother. Yes, I understand. This is -- makes my head explode, too.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: I yield.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Do we want to skip over Issue 5? I think we need to fix that before we continue on.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, we do want to fix Issue 5 in my opinion. I am just still unclear as to how to accomplish that. And I know everybody is trying to be helpful. It has been a long day here for most of us.

Mr. Ballinger.

MR. BALLINGER: If it'll help, we've got the used and useful calculations for all three components that are discussed in Issue 5. All of them would reduce the revenue requirements that staff has recommended originally.

The purchase capacity used and useful would go from over 100 percent originally calculated to

000102 91.4 percent. That's if you remove growth entirely. 1 For the force main the number would go from 74.9 percent 2 3 to 61.2 percent. That component alone is worth about \$51,000 in revenue requirement reduction. That one I 4 know. I know the number on that one. 5 For the master lift station, it would go from 6 7 again over 100 percent used and useful to 93 percent used and useful, again lowering the revenue 8 9 requirements. COMMISSIONER EDGAR: So from over 100 to 10 11 approximately --12 MR. BALLINGER: 93 percent. 13 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: And those percentages 14 that you've given, and an approximate is good enough, I 15 think, at this point, recognizing that you would have the authority to make the exact calculations at the 16 17 appropriate time, that would be addressing the purchase capacity, the force main, and the master lift by 18 19 removing the growth allowance completely. 20 MR. BALLINGER: Correct. 21 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: As a way to recalculate 22 the used and useful portion of the revenue requirement. 23 MR. BALLINGER: Correct. 24 **COMMISSIONER EDGAR:** Okay. All right. Thank 25 you.

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Mr. Friedman and team.

MR. HOY: Thank you. One point to consider is that the flow that's used for the used and useful calculations is current flow. And the occupancy there is very seasonal, so that we have to take into account and we have to have the capacity available in the event that the occupancy changes, if people decide to move full-time, if they decide to be there more often. So it's really part-time capacity that's being used for what could eventually be longer term usage. But we have to have it available, so it's being saved for whatever use is needed by existing customers.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sort of like peak capacity. COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Could I ask staff to speak to that?

MR. BALLINGER: I'm sorry. I was talking to the accountant when he said --

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: That's okay. MR. BALLINGER: What's the question? COMMISSIONER EDGAR: The question is about capacity -- capacity availability basically.

MR. HOY: Right. The capacity that's being used today for the existing customers is seasonal usage. So to the extent that current customers decide to occupy the units more often, we have an obligation to provide

that capacity. It's being held for them to be used whenever they need it.

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MR. BALLINGER: If I understand it, I've not made any adjustment to any of the prepaids or existing customers. All I've taken out is the growth factor of future customers coming. I recognize this does not get to fully 100 percent. I also recognize that this is the only source of treatment that the customers have. So it is -- we're trying to find that balance.

> **COMMISSIONER EDGAR:** Absolutely. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: And just to follow up, Mr. Ballinger, to that question, the utility is not precluded from coming in at a later date, though, asking for an increased used and useful percentage based on -right -- based on the growth rate?

> MR. BALLINGER: Correct. Correct. COMMISSIONER BROWN: So, Commissioners --

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Sure.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: -- I'm prepared to make a motion on Issue 5.

Okay. I would move to approve the used and useful percentage of the purchased wastewater treatment capacity to the level of 91.4 percent, the

000105 interconnection force main to the level of 61.2 percent, 1 to the primary master lift station to the level of 2 93 percent, and any corresponding amounts associated 3 therewith will be administered by staff. 4 COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Second. 5 6 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Mr. Buys. 7 MR. BUYS: Yes, Commissioner. There would also be changes ultimately to the rate base number and a 8 9 slight change to the rate of return because you're 10 changing the plant amount in the subsequent --11 COMMISSIONER BROWN: So any other issues that are affected by this decision will be administratively 12 13 handled accordingly by staff. 14 MR. Mr. Deason will address the salaries issue. 24 MR. DEASON: Yes. Just to briefly -- what I 25 said before, I think it's appropriate to allow all of

our employees to have our annual cost of living adjustment counted, not just for operators.

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COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Okay. Could you speak to the request by OPC to reduce the FTE allocation by 1.2 and also the 50 percent reduction for management?

MR. FRIEDMAN: I'll deal with the management part and let Mr. Flynn deal with the other. As I mentioned before, you know, that's an allocation calculation that this Commission has consistently done on a per ERC basis, and you've never treated an ERC differently just because it was a utility without a plant any more than you've done if the utility had two plants instead of one.

And then as I mentioned earlier, what you have is you've got a half an ERC that's unallocated to this utility. That half an ERC has got to be reallocated to everybody else. It's just -- you just don't lose it. It's got to be allocated. And there's just no precedence for doing this. And if you do this, I think you're just opening up Pandora's box. So I don't think any of the arbitrary allocations are appropriate. And Patrick can deal with the actual FTE.

MR. FLYNN: The issue of reducing the FTE count was addressed by staff in the staff data request. We responded to it. We agree with the 1.2 FTE level of

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staffing that was identified in the staff rec.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, I'm prepared to make a motion whenever the further discussion is at that point.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Personally I agree with staff with the 1.2, but I'm open to whatever the Commissioners want to do.

Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Thank you. And, Patrick, if you could follow up with us on what the duties and roles of that 1.2 is going to actually carry out. So the operator, what are his functions or her functions going to be?

MR. FLYNN: The individual is responsible for the collection systems, operation, maintenance, and repair. That's essentially a 1 FTE level of performance. The .2 reflects the use of one part-time individual one day a week to support that full-time individual for projects or tasks that are more than what one person can do individually.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: So that's the .2. And how many hours is that then?

MR. FLYNN: .2 is one day a week, eight hours. COMMISSIONER BROWN: Is it an 8-hour workday? MR. FLYNN: 8-hour workday.

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COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

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MR. FLYNN: Right. So for a given project that might require two people to work at a lift station on a project, there would be adequate resources available to accomplish that. The alternative would be to utilize outside contracting services to accomplish the same task.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Well, this utility seems to utilize a lot of outside contract services, so I was just trying to find out if the accounting functions are included in that 1.2 because -- no.

MR. FLYNN: No. The response I had specified the individuals who currently are utilized for the plant operation and collection system operation and what would be the case and the condition after the plant was decommissioned, and that was documentation that supported the 1.2 FTE count.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Flynn.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: I will entertain a motion. Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, I move approval of the staff recommendation as is on Issue 12. COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Second.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: It's been moved and

fees.

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2 CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Turn your mike on or --3 MR. BUYS: The accounting fees --CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Yes. 4 5 MR. BUYS: -- and the travel expenses. Yes. In the information the utility provided to staff to 6 7 support the accounting fees, there was an entry in one of the documents that indicated that there were 8 9 16.5 hours that were billed or occurred on June 5th. 10 Since the MFRs are filed on June 3rd, staff assumed that 11 work probably did not occur. It was described as being 12 reviewing MFRs. The company clarified that that entry 13 was for the whole work week, which would have included 14 hours. It could have been work prior to the filing of the MFRs with the Commission. So staff would acquiesce 15 16 and say, yes, that would probably have occurred. 17 The in-house travel that they submitted --18 typically the company adds about \$1,000 in their MFRs 19 for in-house travel with the rate case expense. In the past this has been associated with -- or staff has 20 21 understood this to be associated with employees from 22 Northbrook would travel down, and we routinely just 23 remove that from the rate case expense. In this case, 24 the company had submitted a one-page document listing 25

all of the tolls and the meals and the mileage for the

Florida employees to travel to the interim agenda back in July and also the customer meeting, and it came up to about \$968. And we -- like Mr. Deason said, it was included in the back of a stack of a large number of other documents and we did not review that. We do not have an issue with them including that rate case -those expenses in the rate case expense as they have been incurred by the employees to conduct the rate case.

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CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: So these are all legitimate expenses, and specifically, I guess, more the accounting one was just a misunderstanding by the staff?

MR. BUYS: Yes. It was -- in the review we did not include them.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Okay. Commissioners. Commissioner Brown.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: Just a follow-up to one of the questions that we talked about during my briefing on this. The accounting consulting fees, we're seeing the utility and subsidiaries continue to utilize the accounting consulting even greater than they have in the past and it seems to be increased across the board. Is there -- can you elaborate on the reason why they're utilizing for rate case?

MR. BUYS: In our opinion, the utility is -they've relied more heavily on the accounting fees or

the accountant, accounting consultants. They no longer include the WSCBs or WSC salaries in the rate case expense, who a lot of those employees used to work on the rate cases. So I guess you could say some of that cost has been transferred over to the accounting consultants who are performing those tasks in place of the WSC employees that would have done that in the past.

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COMMISSIONER BROWN: And \$77,000 seems quite high for the -- what was the last rate case amount for that category? Actually 73,000 if you disallowed the 3,000, including WSC -- if they were utilizing the in-house folks.

MR. BUYS: In the utility's prior rate case before the Commission back in '07, those accounting consultant fees were \$10,000, and the WSC in-house fees were \$34,000, and the -- I guess other, they have office temp fees were \$2,200, for a total of \$46,711.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: So why the increase, the \$30,000 plus increase on that category? Is there something that's triggering that excessively high category for this rate case?

MR. BUYS: Other than the fact that they have to -- for this particular rate case the company went all the way back to 2005 to provide all of the different annual balances since 2005, and that usually is more

than what they would do. Usually it's a three- or four-year, maybe a two-year historical filing, let's say, where they include all the past annual balances. So they had to go all the way back to 2005, so there would have been more work associated with preparing these MFRs. The MFRs basically require the same amount of work to prepare whether they're a B class or an A class.

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COMMISSIONER BROWN: I get it. I mean, \$46,000 -- OPC, do you have any comments on it? You didn't raise it in your issues, so.

MS. VANDIVER: Yes. We had reviewed it pretty carefully, and we had compared it to the prior cases and had noticed the same contrast that Mr. Buys did, that if you total up the amount that they paid in 2005 and in the county application, they don't have the WSC employees and so it's not dramatically more than what they had in the prior cases.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: You just said \$46,000 roughly difference if you add them up.

MS. VANDIVER: Well, in the prior case I see -- let me see here. I see \$60,000 for WSC and the accounting consultant. We may be looking at different numbers. I don't know.

COMMISSIONER BROWN: The question is do you

think -- you didn't argue it.

MS. VANDIVER: I think it's certainly high, but there wasn't any WSC staff included, and because of the magnitude of the case as a whole we looked at other issues instead.

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COMMISSIONER BROWN: Okay.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: So rate case expense. I think -- I heard a light go on over there.

MR. HOY: I'm sorry. I was going to add to that that in the last case we used a different mix of consultants, so our engineering consultant also did some accounting work for us. We had in-house staff that we don't have today. So in total, the total rate case expense in this case is actually less than it was in the 2006 case.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: Commissioner Edgar.

COMMISSIONER EDGAR: If I may to staff in light of the discussion, the further discussion that we've had today on rate case expense, are there any further adjustments in addition to those that are in the written recommendation that you would recommend at this point?

MR. BUYS: No, Commissioner.

24 COMMISSIONER EDGAR: Mr. Chairman, I move
25 staff rec.

CHAIRMAN GRAHAM: It's been moved and seconded, staff recommendation on Item No. 14. All in favor, say aye.

Intervenor Speakers/Leroy's talking points

Presented 12/3/15 Agenda Conference, Item 19.

The rate payers didn't create the problem. It wasn't a bad business or poor management decision by the rate payers that created the problem. It was poor management and bad business decisions made by the utility that created the problem when they expanded too fast and the mismanagement of the facility.

IT DIDN'T HAVE TO SHUT DOWN. However, they knowingly and willingly violated their license and their permit. Sandalhaven operated in violation of its permit by processing 10's of thousands gallons per day over permitted capacity and this caused major leakage and seepage in and around the facility including the grounds of Fiddler's Green Condo II. Mike Wilson, an employee of Utilities, Inc. and the plant operator's immediate supervisor, he told me it was sheet flow. He denied it was coming from the plant, which was proven by the DEP to be incorrect. After extensive research by the DEP <u>AND THE FAILURE TO CORRECT</u> DEFICIENCIES the utility was eventually ordered to be off line by Oct 1, 2015 by the DEP in a consent order issued October 9, 2014.

Very often the noxious odors coming from the facility were unbearable causing many owners in Fiddler's Green Condo II to close their windows and doors to get relief.

All these people are here to see how they are being represented by the PSC.

There was no attempt by the utility to work with the rate payers to solve any problems.

Parties Staff Handout Internal Affairs/Agenda on 12/3/15 Item No. 19

Look around this room. These people traveled more than 6 hours to attend this meeting and be able to have a voice as rate payers who

are being asked to reward a business for making bad management and poor business decisions. When bad management and poor business decisions are made businesses fail? But because of a special statue that private franchised utilities operate under they cannot fail. What is wrong with this picture?

They offer investors a **fair rate of return in excess of 10%**. Incidentally, **who are the investors?**

When a business make bad management and/or poor business decisions and it fails, the investors lose. Why do the rate payers, who have no say in the operation of the (private) utility, have to guarantee any return to the investors? This should be the responsibility of the utility. However by using these exorbitant rates and under the special staute the utility will not be held accountable for making poor management and business decisions?

Most of the people being served by this utility are on fixed or subsidized incomes. Even collectively, they cannot afford to hire lawyers to meet with the PSC staff on a fairly regular basis to present their view such as the utility, with seemingly unlimited finances is able to do.

The whole issue of asking for this outrageous rate increase is without a doubt an effort by Utilities, Inc. of Sandalhaven to get the ratepayers to pay for their bad management decisions and subsequent actions which includes the dismantling of the plant.

Fiddler's Green Condominium Association II is the closest in proximity to this plant and as a result has to bear the brunt of the noxious odors coming from the plant and the heavy truck traffic in and out of the facility. Damage to the roads has been an ongoing problem. It is like pulling teeth to get the utility to do the repairs. Fiddler's Green II has had to absorb the cost or pay a significant portion of them. The concrete on the access road has broken under the weight of trucks and needs to be replaced already. It has been addressed with the facility with no repairs made.

The straw that broke the "camel's back" is when water accumulated around our building 30, in 2013. When it was reported to the utility, Mike Wilson, who is the supervisor over the plant operator told us it was the result of "sheet flow", which is water running over the surface of the ground. He insisted that because he had the credentials he was qualified to make that statement. We disputed his statement.

It was apparent we were getting nowhere in reaching a solution to get rid of the water accumulating in the area adjacent to building 30, the dumpster enclosure and the swale along the berm which separates our property from the utilities. We contacted several county departments to see if they contributed in any manner to the problem. Representatives of the departments visited the

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area and reviewed their operations. Any responsibility bourn by their departments was eliminated.

The county health department then contacted the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and asked that they become involved, which they did.

After FDEP did considerable research, including a review of plant records, test boring for soil samples, water samples as well as borings on the berm which surrounds a settling pond used by the facility. The result was the water that was accumulating in the area as well as that coming through the berms and up through the blacktop was not from "sheet Flow". It was due to saturation of the soil because of excess percolation. It was obvious that something was seriously wrong. The permit allowing percolating was authorized by FDEP for 45,000 gallons per day (GPD). Records showed they were percolating 79,000 GPD which is a violation of their permit.


The result of the investigation performed by the FDEP was a consent order issued to Utilities, Inc. requiring the plant to be off line by October 1, 2015.

We have a complete file in our office covering the whole incident from the time one of our owners in building 30 reported he could not get to the dumpster near his building to take out his rubbish because of all the water that was on the ground surrounding the dumpster.

NOW TO THE July 23, 2015 PETITION

The basis of the request is to be able to support "operations on a going forward basis and an opportunity to earn a fair rate of return on the Utility's investment in used and useful property for the public use". Maybe they should have thought of that when service and conditions were ignored.

That taken in account, why should the ratepayers be required to pay anything to a firm for making bad business decisions, which is what this is all about. Many



of the ratepayers in this area are on fixed incomes. They do not get a fair rate of return, do they? When is the last time many of them got a rate of return of 10.2%? When ratepayers make bad decisions they suffer the consequences. Why has the utility incurred substantial additional operating costs and investment?

Page two of the request does not answer the poor management question.

How many customers cannot pay these preposterous rates? Do they care or are they more interested in the "fair rate of return" for their investors?

THE JULY 22, 2015 LETTER TO SANDALHAVEN CUSTOMERS

Par II (By way of background-)

Given the violation of the percolation GPD permits written by FDEP how can it be written that "The plant consistently met its permit limits for effluent water quality then, and continues to do so now"? Doesn't the percolation violation of, and the water coming onto the grounds at Fiddler's Green II, along with the stench it creates, have an impact on the "quality of effluent" being produced at the plant? The fact that they lost their sole reclaimed water customer is not the fault of the ratepayers. It again shows bad management and poor business decisions.

Par III (There was a significant cost-)

Decisions to build on "anticipated growth" was another decision made for money purposes that have been impacted by bad management and poor decisions. If that wasn't the reason then why is it necessary to ask for the increase to operate a plant that will not exist? The only equipment left will be the collection lines under the ground and several pumping stations. The main plant will have been dismantled. Service? Par IV (In a 2011 rate filing-)

It appears that they are saying the County is responsible for their overbuilding the lines and facility. Utilities Inc., knew that when they signed onto it. Bad business decision.

Par V (In 2014 it became clear-)

The Utility and FDEP reached an agreement, only after a number of complaints had gone unresolved and required the intervention of the FDEP. It was not the utility that made the decision to close the plant. It was a consent order (OGC FILE NO. 14-0536-08-DW) issued by the FDEP. The total costs for this project should be on the shoulders of the Utility and their investors who expect a 10.2 % rate of return.

To conclude:

-Percolation violations (above the permitted 45,000 GPD, actually percolated estimated 79,000 GPD)

-Treated effluent coming through the berms and up through the grounds and the blacktop, making living conditions in the area very difficult and unhealthy.

-What is the utility paying the Englewood Water District to take the effluent produced by their collection lines? Why does it take such an enormous rate increase to maintain only the collection lines and pump stations?

-There is no plant to maintain. There is no cost associated with trucking. The lines and the pumping stations are the only items that require maintenance and at what cost?

-The maintenance of Fiddler's Green Boulevard to and including the access road by Townhouse 4 is a continuing problem.

-The odor from the plant is a problem that continues to be an obnoxious nuisance.

-It is evident that Utilities, Inc. is determined to have the rate payers pay for dismantling and decommissioning the plant. It is also evident that the rates are expected to provide a "fair rate of return" to Utilities, Inc., when the ratepayers had absolutely nothing to do with the operation of the Sandalhaven facility.

-The reason that a "fair rate of return" is not realized is due to bad management and poor business decisions by the ownership and management of the facility.

- Because Utilities Inc. is a regulated facility they should not be able to use this provision as a shelter for mismanagement and poor business decisions

-The ratepayers should be the primary concern in this hearing.

Conclusions and Recommendations

The WWTF was far more cost efficient than the new configuration.

The closing of the WWTF resulted solely from Sandalhaven's mismanagement. Therefore, any increased cost should be borne by Sandalhaven entirely, and not by the rate-payers.

The proposed rate increase should be decreased by \$375,000.

ISSUE 1 QUALITY OF SERVICE Pages 5 – 9

OPC submits that the quality of service is unsatisfactory.

- The utility <u>failed</u> to make prudent business decisions to maintain the wastewater treatment plant reuse disposal options. The utility <u>failed</u> to seek alternate reuse or disposal sites for its treated effluent which resulted in the derating of its wastewater treatment plant capacity from 150,000 gpd to 99,000 gpd.
- The utility <u>failed</u> take action when customers complained about water leaching from the retention pond in 2013. The utility responded to correct the problem, months later, <u>only after</u> the customers complained to DEP in 2014.
- These <u>failures</u> ultimately resulted in the premature retirement of its wastewater treatment plant, which was the lowest cost treatment option.
- When the utility determined that an inadvertent error occurred in the interim rate billing (nearly doubling customer rates), the utility <u>failed</u> take immediate action to notify customers.

A quality of service finding should be based upon <u>past actions</u> and the utility should not be allowed to promise to improve quality of service in the future without being held accountable for its prior actions.

OPC submits that the utility should be penalized one percent on equity (or 100 basis points) for its unsatisfactory quality of service. This would result in an approximately \$7,000 reduction in the revenue requirement.

ISSUE 5 USED AND USEFUL PAGES 18 – 21

OPC submits that staff's used and useful calculations are overstated.

- The used and useful calculation does not follow the statutory formula. Section 367.081(2)(a)2, F.S., states that property is <u>used and useful</u> in the public service, <u>*IF*</u> it is:
 - a. needed to serve current customers, or
 - b. needed to serve customers five years after the test year at an ERC growth rate up to 5 percent per year.
- The flows related to the *guaranteed revenues* and the *prepaid commitments* are not permitted by Section 367.081(2)(a)2, F.S. The statutory used and useful formula only allows property needed to serve current customers or customers 5 years after the end of the test year. The guaranteed revenues and the prepaid commitments should be removed from the used and useful calculation.
- The growth allowance is overstated and results in approximately 10% annual ERC growth for the purchased capacity and force main, and approximately 21% annual ERC growth for the primary lift station. As a result, the growth allowance exceeds the 5 percent per year ERC growth rate mandated by statute and should be corrected.
- The adjustment for excessive infiltration should be applied to the used and useful calculation for the interconnection force main and primary lift station.

To conform to the statute, staff's used and useful calculation should be adjusted as shown on OPC's attached used and useful calculation.

If the correct adjustments are applied, OPC believes that the revenue requirement will be reduced by approximately \$457,000.

With an R⁴2 of only 14%, the regression analysis is not a valid indicator of future growth. In addition, the substantial reduction in total gallons sold, even though 5FR galions are relatively stable, is more an indication of instability in MFD (included in General Service) occupancy than of growth patterns. When occupancy increases, so will total gallons sold and thus total ERCs. Compare the pattern of change in total ERCs between 2010 and 2014 to that between 2007 and 2010.

Used and Useful Statutory Formula

Excerpt from Section 367.081, Florida Statutes

367.081 Rates; procedure for fixing and changing.-

(1) Except as provided in subsection (4) or subsection (6), a utility may only charge rates and charges that have been approved by the commission.

(2)(a)1. The commission shall, either upon request or upon its own motion, fix rates which are just, reasonable, compensatory, and not unfairly discriminatory. In every such proceeding, the commission shall consider the value and quality of the service and the cost of providing the service, which shall include, but not be limited to, debt interest; the requirements of the utility for working capital; maintenance, depreciation, tax, and operating expenses incurred in the operation of all property used and useful in the public service; and a fair return on the investment of the utility in property used and useful in the public service; and a fair return on the inclusion of contributions-in-aid-of-construction in the rate base of any utility during a rate proceeding, nor shall the commission impute prospective future contributions-in-aid-of-construction against the utility's investment in property used and useful in the public service; and accumulated depreciation on such contributions-in-aid-of-construction shall not be used to reduce the rate base, nor shall depreciation on such contributed assets be considered a cost of providing utility service.

2. For purposes of such proceedings, <u>the commission shall consider utility property</u>, including land acquired or facilities constructed or to be constructed within a reasonable time in the future, not to exceed 24 months after the end of the historic base year used to set final rates unless a longer period is approved by the commission, <u>to be used</u> and useful in the public service, if:

a. Such property is needed to serve current customers;

<u>b. Such property is needed to serve customers 5 years after the end of the test year</u> used in the commission's final order on a rate request as provided in subsection (6) at a growth rate for equivalent residential connections not to exceed 5 percent per year; or

c. Such property is needed to serve customers more than 5 full years after the end of the test year used in the commission's final order on a rate request as provided in subsection (6) only to the extent that the utility presents clear and convincing evidence to justify such consideration.

Notwithstanding the provisions of this paragraph, the commission shall approve rates for service which allow a utility to recover from customers the full amount of environmental compliance costs. Such rates may not include charges for allowances for funds prudently invested or similar charges. For purposes of this requirement, the term "environmental compliance costs" includes all reasonable expenses and fair return on any prudent investment incurred by a utility in complying with the requirements or conditions contained in any permitting, enforcement, or similar decisions of the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the Department of Environmental Protection, a water management district, or any other governmental entity with similar regulatory jurisdiction.

(b) In establishing initial rates for a utility, the commission may project the financial and operational data as set out in paragraph (a) to a point in time when the utility is expected to be operating at a reasonable level of capacity.

ISSUE 12 SALARIES AND WAGES Pages 31 – 32

OPC submits that the 1.2 FTE allocation for operator salaries plus the allocated management salaries is too high.

- The utility no longer treats wastewater, sends all flows to EWD
- The utility appears to have not considered lower cost options to maintain the collection system (i.e., EWD, Charlotte County, other contract operators)
- The management salaries allocated to Sandalhaven should decrease as there will be less management required for a pass-through system
- OPC recommends cutting the allocated management salaries in half and reducing the operations salaries to .5 FTE, resulting in an estimated decrease to Salaries & Wages – Employees of \$39,000

OPC submits that the Salaries & Wages - Employees expense be reduced by \$39,000
