CHAIRMAN BROWN: I'll tell you what, it does feel kind of nice sitting in the middle of this group, and it's definitely a nice change, and I'm excited for the opportunity, as you all know. And I'd like to welcome you all and wish you all a Happy New Year. I hope everybody enjoyed their time with their family over the holidays, and we are going to have a great year over the next two years as well. But I would like to welcome everybody to the January 5th, 2016, Commission Conference Agenda.

If you would like at this time, please rise and join us for the invocation and Pledge of Allegiance led by Commissioner Jimmy Patronis.

COMMISSIONER PATRONIS: Thank you, Chairman.

(Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance
observed.)

CHAIRMAN BROWN: Thank you, Commissioner

Patronis, for that very wonderful New Year's speech,

particularly with your emphasis on the upcoming year.

I appreciate it.

As I said, good morning. Happy New Year to everyone here today. I would, Commissioners, like to take a moment of personal privilege to make some remarks and address some issues facing the Commission

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over the next two years, if you would be so kind.

Before I begin, though, I would like to recognize someone that is very -- who is very important to me, the most important person in my life, he's sitting right here, my husband -- actually straight ahead -- Hank Brown. He's here today in the audience. And he drove up at 4:00 a.m., and he coordinated the babysitters and all of that just to be here, and I absolutely would not be here today without you. You know that. And your encouragement and support to follow my goal of public service has meant the world to me, and I love you so much. Thank you for being here.

(Applause.)

Moving onward, I do want to express my thanks to my colleagues who are sitting here today for their trust and faith in electing me chairman. It is a true honor, as you all know, and many of you have served in that capacity as well. I appreciate the opportunity to serve with such accomplished leaders here, each of you in your own right; and collaboratively, though, we have such an effective synergy for the State of Florida.

Today, as I pick up this wonderful gavel entrusted to me, I pledge to remain consistent in my leadership and continue the work that we do with great pride and dedication to the very difficult task that we have at

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hand; always committed to serving the public.

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Today is also a day for reflection and making resolutions. 2015 was a year of change as we dealt with challenging environmental laws impacting the electric industry, we took public comments regarding solar development in Florida, we addressed securitization of nuclear assets for the purpose of reducing customer costs, we approved guidelines for evaluating future gas reserve projects, we revisited the benefits of fuel hedging, and we implemented rules regarding secondary water quality standards in the context of a rate case. We also arbitrated a number of issues in the negotiation of an interconnection agreement, and we had several Commissioners here testify before Congress on a variety of very important proposed regulations and rules affecting the industry. There are several other highlights of 2015, but I just wanted to kind of recap what a "slow" year looks like

And I do believe that the next two years will undoubtedly continue to be active in the energy arena. So what goals, initiatives, issues should we expect to see over the next two years?

here at the Commission.

Starting with the electric industry, the energy landscape is truly evolving, as we all know,

across the country as well as in Florida. As regulators, we will need to consider fuel diversity in our resource decision-making process, especially as we monitor fuel price variability, the changing cost of capital of generating units, and the expansion and integration of renewable energy resources as well as other technologies. We must also ensure that Florida's electric utilities have access to fuels that keep energy affordable and reliable for all as our utilities are forced to comply with a variety of very stringent environmental regulations. This could, in fact, be our greatest challenge over the next few years -- balancing compliance with the federal regulations and our state directive of maintaining safe, reliable service at a reasonable cost.

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Some of these new EPA rules cast a cloud of uncertainty for Florida. Under the Clean Power Plan, for example, Florida must cut carbon emissions by 25 percent by 2030, which is a different reduction from EPA's original target of 38 percent. To meet this target, Florida utilities may be able to choose from a variety of emissions-reducing options. However, how we will do that and how much it will cost consumers is still under careful review and scrutiny.

It's critical for the Commission to continue

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our collaboration with the Florida Department of 1 Environmental Protection, the Energy Office, our 2 legislators, and Governor Scott as our state plan is 3 being written and implemented. The Commission must be 4 an active participant in these discussions that 5 ultimately will help shape the future of Florida's 6 7 energy policy, especially since we sitting up here are the ones charged with ensuring safe, reliable, and 8 9 affordable retail electric service. And to that end, I will be designating a Commissioner to serve as the 10 Commission's liaison to DEP for the purpose of focusing 11 12 on the economic and reliability issues associated with 13 implementing the Clean Power Plan. And staff, of course, will continue monitoring and updating the 14 Commission on the various EPA regulations promulgated 15 and the importance and impact on the industry as well 16 17 as the customers. 18 There are other additional issues like grid

There are other additional issues like grid modernization, plug-in electric vehicles, distributed generation, net metering, energy efficiency, conservation, the deployment of renewables. All of these are absolutely going to be topics that come before the Commission over the next two years as technologies continue to be developed and enhanced. And I believe that the gamut of technological

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advancements will ultimately bring a convergence of change.

In addition, given the growing dependence of natural gas for electricity generation in Florida, we must continue looking at responsible natural gas development practices to ensure its reliability and affordability as a fuel source.

As most of you are probably aware, many of our rate case decisions with stay out provisions will soon be expiring. As such, it can be expected that several of the companies can file new rate cases over the next few years. This will initiate a very extensive process that must, by law, be completed within eight months and include customer input. Each rate case involves a lot of long hours, for staff and the Commissioners as well, and each of us sitting up here, we are all dedicated to ensuring that the process is fair and that our decisions will always be in the public interest.

Moving on to the gas industry, safety, of course, will be -- continue to be paramount. We have approved a number of pipeline replacement programs that replace existing bare steel and cast iron pipe that is -- with piping that is most resistent and more resistent to corrosion and more reliable. And I

believe there's been great progress on those fronts, and we will continue to support those efforts.

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With regard to water, it is absolutely the most important resource, natural resource here in Florida. The issues surrounding the water and wastewater industry are the more complicated ones our state will face in the coming years. Water and wastewater systems are especially challenging to regulators across the country and definitely in They are capital intensive and lack economies of scale and the ability to attract capital like larger utilities possess. Water quality and service allocation and conservation are just a few issues that we grapple with up here. We will continue to balance the need for infrastructure improvements with the need to keep rates down, coordinating our efforts with state and federal agencies whose interests conjoin ours. We are very fortunate to have Commissioner Graham up here on the bench, who serves as co-vice chair of NARUC's water committee, who I believe is really at the forefront of a lot of these emerging issues.

Sorry. The best drink.

In the telecom industry, we will continue ensuring an infrastructure that promotes Florida's economy, enhances commerce, promotes Floridians' access

to all the benefits of competition. We will continue to promote the Lifeline Assistance program and oversee the administration of the Florida Relay Service Assistance program. We are lucky to have Commissioner Brisé on the Federal/State Joint Board to ensure Florida's interests are protected, he's been very active in this arena, and the state's Universal Service Funds are ultimately spent wisely. And we appreciate Commissioner Brisé's efforts on those fronts.

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I am a big believer that we can always do things better, we can always do things more efficiently, and we can always do them more responsibly. To that end, the services that the utilities provide is critically important to all Floridians. In fact, very few governmental agencies like the Public Service Commission have as much impact on people's lives, and we've said this before. To that end, consumer education and participation is very essential to our process. We will strive over the next two years to further educate customers to different platforms and forums that are available to become engaged, provide input to the Commission on various avenues. We will also explore additional tools and technologies that are available to expand consumer education across the state on the various issues that

come before the Commission, and I'm dedicated to that.

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As we begin the new year, I want to acknowledge how privileged we all are to be working for the great State of Florida with this talented, experienced, and diverse group of professionals here and in front of us. We have the past NARUC President and former Public Service Commission chair as our fellow Commissioner. We have two former legislators, one who is currently the President of SEARUC and a former PSC chair, and another who is also an accomplished Florida public -- Florida businessman, pardon me, who I believe is probably the most technologically savvy one up here on the bench. also have an engineer who is a two-time Public Service Commission chair over here right to my left and a former elected official, who is absolutely expedient and great at running meetings. And we have one of the most accomplished professional staffs of any in the country, and we've been very well recognized across the board with our talented folks in the audience, and it's led by my friend and my colleague, Mr. Braulio Baez.

I believe the industry will continue to evolve around us, and there will be unforeseen events that impose additional challenges upon us. However, we have incredible assets and resources here at the

Commission. We have a strong history of addressing challenges head on and finding solutions that benefit the public interest. I believe while the tasks before us are absolutely great and huge, we -- the decisions that we're going to make in the coming years should strive to ultimately keep energy affordable and available through a variety of sources.

Before I close, though, I do want to thank some folks that are close to me in addition to my husband in the audience, my dear children, Tripp and Emerson, as well as my husband for your understanding and allowing me to devote so much time to my professional life over these last five years on the Commission. As you know, the next two years will also be additional work, and I cannot thank you enough for your love, support, and encouragement. I also want to express my gratitude to my loyal-serving staff:

Katherine Fleming over here, who is my right-hand woman, and Joann Parsons. And they are just — they always have my back, and I'm extremely grateful and appreciative for their efforts.

Finally, I would like to reiterate my thanks to Governor Scott for allowing me to continue to serve as well as all of my colleagues, actually all of us up here. Thank you so much. This job is not always easy

and it's absolutely not fun, it's not, but it's rewarding, and knowing that we're helping to make our state a better place to live by ensuring safe, reliable, and affordable service for all Floridians and that's what is important. And thank you for your time here. I look forward to working with all of you over the next two years and appreciate your support. Thank you. (Applause.) (Opening comments concluded.)
