ORDER GRANTING FLORIDA POWER & LIGHT COMPANY'S REQUEST FOR CONFIDENTIAL CLASSIFICATION (DOCUMENT NO. 05340-16, X-REF DOCUMENT NO. 04405-16)

On July 19, 2016, pursuant to Section 366.093, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and Rule 25-22.006, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), Florida Power & Light Company (FPL) filed a Request for Confidential Classification (Request) of certain information provided pursuant to Audit Control No. 16-028-4-1 (audit workpapers) (Document No. 05340-16, x-ref Document No. 04405-16). This Request was filed in Docket No. 160007-EI.

Request for Confidential Classification

FPL contends that he audit workpapers, as more specifically identified in Exhibit A to its Request, constitute proprietary confidential business information entitled to protection under Section 366.093, F.S. and Rule 25-22.006, F.A.C. FPL contends that the audit workpapers contain information concerning internal auditing controls and reports of internal auditors. DEF asserts that this information is intended to be and is treated by FPL as private and has not been publicly disclosed.

DEF asserts that the audit workpapers contain confidential information concerning internal auditing controls, reports or notes of internal auditors, or information relating to the internal auditing report issued in 2015. FPL contends that disclosure of such information would be harmful to FPL and its customers because it may affect the effectiveness of the Internal Auditing department itself. FPL argues that the audit workpapers should be protected pursuant to Section 366.093(3)(b), F.S.

Ruling

Section 366.093(1), F.S., provides that records the Florida Public Service Commission (Commission) has found to contain proprietary business information shall be kept confidential and shall be exempt from Chapter 119, F.S. Section 366.093(3), F.S., defines proprietary confidential business information as information that is intended to be and is treated by the company as private, in that disclosure of the information would cause harm to the company's ratepayers or business operations, and has not been voluntarily disclosed to the public. Section 366.093(3), F.S., provides that proprietary confidential business information includes, but is not limited to:

(b) Internal auditing controls and reports of internal auditors.

Upon review, it appears that the information described above satisfies the criteria set forth in Section 366.093(3), F.S., for classification as proprietary confidential business information. The information described above and in Exhibit A attached to FPL's Request, appears to contain information related to internal auditing control and reports of internal auditors; thus, the information identified in Document No. 05340-16, x-ref Document No. 04405-16, shall be granted confidential classification.

Pursuant to Section 366.093(4), F.S., the information for which confidential classification is granted herein shall remain protected from disclosure for a period of up to 18 months from the date of issuance of this Order. At the conclusion of the 18-month period, the confidential information will no longer be exempt from Section 119.07(1), F.S., unless FPL or another affected person shows, and the Commission finds, that the records continue to contain proprietary confidential business information.

Based on the foregoing, it is hereby

ORDERED by Commissioner Art Graham, as Prehearing Officer, that Florida Power & Light Company's Request for Confidential Classification of Document No. 05340-16, x-ref Document No. 04405-16, is granted. It is further

ORDERED that the information in Document No. 05340-16, x-ref Document No. 04405-16, for which confidential classification has been granted, shall remain protected from disclosure for a period of up to 18 months from the date of the issuance of this Order. It is further

ORDERED that this Order will be the only notification by the Commission to the parties concerning the expiration of the confidentiality time period.

NOTICE OF FURTHER PROCEEDINGS OR JUDICIAL REVIEW

The Florida Public Service Commission is required by Section 120.569(1), Florida Statutes, to notify parties of any administrative hearing or judicial review of Commission orders that is available under Sections 120.57 or 120.68, Florida Statutes, as well as the procedures and time limits that apply. This notice should not be construed to mean all requests for an administrative hearing or judicial review will be granted or result in the relief sought.

Mediation may be available on a case-by-case basis. If mediation is conducted, it does not affect a substantially interested person's right to a hearing.

Any party adversely affected by this order, which is preliminary, procedural or intermediate in nature, may request: (1) reconsideration within 10 days pursuant to Rule 25-22.0376, Florida Administrative Code; or (2) judicial review by the Florida Supreme Court, in the case of an electric, gas or telephone utility, or the First District Court of Appeal, in the case of a water or wastewater utility. A motion for reconsideration shall be filed with the Office of Commission Clerk, in the form prescribed by Rule 25-22.0376, Florida Administrative Code. Judicial review of a preliminary, procedural or intermediate ruling or order is available if review of the final action will not provide an adequate remedy. Such review may be requested from the appropriate court, as described above, pursuant to Rule 9.100, Florida Rules of Appellate Procedure.
