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## DUKE POWER RATE INCREASE

In March 2020, Duke Power will raise its rates for electricity, citing Hurricane Dorian and Tropical Storm Nestor. Apparently these storms provoked combined costs of \$171,400,000.

Most of the costs were racked up presuming the storms would create damage to the utility system. From what I read, it seems damage was done in the far northeastern part of our state. Justified costs should be billed to the electric utility in the storm-ravaged part of the state. Is this not correct?

If you had not allowed the merger or takeover of Duke from Progress Energy, would we still be responsible for over \$171,000,000 in alleged expenses.
