Dear Commissioners and staff of the Committees on Electricity, ERE, Critical Infrastructure, Gas and Rate Design:

Yesterday FERC issued a Final Rule in the Distributed Energy Resource Aggregations in RTOs/ISOs (Item E-1 below) based on a 2 to 1 vote, with Comm. Danly dissenting. Unfortunately, FERC did not include the opt out we requested, though it did provide an out in for small utilities. The opt out discussion begins with Paragraph 45 (page 36 of the PDF). Comm. Danly's dissent, which can be found at the end of the Order, argues that FERC should have provided the opt out we requested.

We are arranging with FERC to provide us with a briefing on the Final Rule. It is tentatively scheduled for **Sept. 29th at 3:30 pm Eastern** and I will send out an announcement once it has been finalized.
