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1 PROCEEDINGS 2 All right. Next we will move CHAIRMAN FAY: 3 into items for further discussion. We will begin 4 with Item No. 2. It looks like you are ready, Mr. 5 Rubin. Whenever you are ready, you can present the item. 6 7 Good morning, Commissioners. MR. RUBOTTOM: 8 My name is Jon Rubottom with Commission legal 9 staff. 10 Item No. 2 is staff's recommendation regarding 11 the proposal of Draft Rule 25-6.0131, Florida 12 Administrative Code, which pertains to the 13 regulatory assessment fee, or RAF, the Commission 14 is required by statute to collect from electric 15 utilities. 16 The RAF's collected by the Commission are the 17 agency's only source of revenue. And the governing 18 statutes require that the RAF revenues collected 19 from each utilities -- each utility -- excuse me, 20 from -- collected from the utilities in each 21 industry be sufficient to cover the Commission's 22 cost of regulating the companies in that industry. 23 As explained more fully in the recommendation, 24 staff calculates a projected shortfall in 25 Commission revenue from the electric industry for

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1 electric IOUs, and a projected surplus for 2 municipal utilities and rural cooperatives. Staff, 3 therefore, recommends that the Commission propose 4 the amendment of the rule to update the RAF rate 5 for both electric IOUs and the rate for municipal 6 utilities and rural cooperatives to more accurately 7 reflect the cost of regulation as required by 8 statute.

A representative of Florida Power & Light is
present and would like to address the Commission on
this item, and staff is available for questions.
CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Thank you Mr.
Rubin.

What we will do, then, Mr. Wright, we will go ahead and have you address the Commission with any comments you have, and then our Commission may have questions for either Mr. Rubottom or you at that

18 time.

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You are recognized.

20 MR. WRIGHT: Thank you. Good morning, 21 Chairman and Commissioners. I appreciate the 22 opportunity to speak with you today. Christopher 23 Wright on behalf of Florida Power & Light. 24 First, I just want to state that Florida Power 25 & Light takes no position on the proposed

1 amendments to the rule, or the proposed RAF amount. 2 Our primary comments here are we are asking -- a 3 question and the clarification regarding the effective date of the new RAF rule. 4 5 As set forth in the conclusion on Issue 2 of the staff's recommendation, it indicates that the 6 7 -- if the rule is adopted here today and approved, 8 that it would be filed around January 9th, and it would become effective on January 29th. 9 However, 10 in the conclusion on Issue 1 of staff's 11 recommendation, it indicates that the new RAF would 12 apply to the entire six-month period in which the 13 rule becomes effective, meaning January 1 through 14 June 30th. 15 This appears to suggest that the new RAF 16 amount would become applicable prior to the 17 effective date of the rule. We question whether 18 that's appropriate, and moreover, are concerned 19 whether that's a violation of Section 120.54 20 subsection (3)(d)6 of the Administrative Procedures 21 Act, which requires that new rules and amendments 22 to rules become effective 20 days after they are 23 filed. 24 We've discussed this concern with your General 25 Counsel, and it seems to us that perhaps a

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1 reasonable solution would be that the new RAF 2 amount become effective on the first billing cycle 3 in February, become effective February 1, or whichever -- or the later date of the effective 4 5 date of the new rule, and that the current RAF amount apply prior to that date, which would be 6 7 January, if it becomes January 29th. 8 Thank you. 9 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Commissioners, any 10 questions or comments first for Mr. Wright? 11 COMMISSIONER CLARK: For Mr. Wright, no. 12 Showing none, then we CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. 13 will take any questions or comments for Mr. 14 Rubottom at this time on Item No. 2. 15 Commissioner Clark, you are recognized. 16 COMMISSIONER CLARK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 17 I just want to make a couple of comments and 18 observations. 19 I know we have been working on this rule 20 amendment for some time, and this dates back for 21 the last couple of years as we've watched our, 22 basically our trust fund balances begin to erode, 23 having to -- the Commission, the Agency having to 24 take on some additional costs that have been 25 incurred over the last couple of years. And we see

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1 where this is taking us over the next several 2 years, into a position where at our current RAF 3 rates, and at our current distribution levels, we 4 won't have the ability to cover our actual cost. 5 And it's something that has worried me and 6 concerned me for a number of years, and I have had 7 this discussion with our executive team for 8 actually a couple of years now as we've worked through this, but --9

10 And I appreciate -- I want to say I appreciate 11 the staff's work on this proposed amendment. Ι have looked over -- I have been through all of the 12 13 scenarios and proposals under the new rates and the 14 new proposed rate structure in addition to looking 15 at what our future costs are, and I still have some 16 concerns, Mr. Chairman. There are some things that 17 I am still working through in my mind, and I think 18 that maybe we can solve Mr. Wright's issue as well 19 as alleviate a couple of my concerns.

Based on where we stand right now, I would like the Commission's indulgence to have a 30-day deferral of the item to give me just a little bit more time to do some digestion. I think we can figure out Mr. Wright's issue during that same -that pretty much solves his issue, right, to begin

with, because there is no way we can meet that
deadline. I think that would solve his problem as
well. If we could, just a general consensus, Mr.
Chairman, or something that we give this another 30
days.

6 There is nothing absolutely critical about it 7 having to go in place by January 30th, or January 8 31st, February. We've got a little bit more time. 9 And I think it would do us good to buy this time 10 out and make a -- make a good, conscientious 11 decision when it comes time to vote on the item, 12 Mr. Chairman.

13 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Yeah. And, 14 Commissioner Clark, I, of course, always support 15 when my colleagues need additional time. We want 16 to get these right if it's something that 17 additional time would help. I am happy to recognize and take up that deferral for approval. 18

19I do just want to make sure I give my20colleagues an opportunity to opine on anything that21you would like to do in addition to that deferral,22or related to that deferral, before we formally23take that motion up.

So, Commissioner La Rosa, you are recognized,
and then Commissioner Graham or Commissioner

Passidomo, if you have anything, I will make sure I
 go to you next.

3 COMMISSIONER LA ROSA: Thank you, Chairman. 4 And not necessarily anything to change, and I 5 do agree with what was just said by Commissioner I definitely do believe that more time is 6 Clark. 7 This new issue that is brought by Mr. needed. 8 Wright is obviously, you know, something also to 9 consider. This is certainly not an easy decision. 10 There is a few more moving parts internally. Ι 11 would also benefit from some additional time. 12 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. So we have 13 additional support for that. 14 Commissioner Passidomo, any questions or 15 comments? 16 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Sure. Thank vou, Mr. 17 Chairman. 18 I am generally supportive as well to 19 Commissioner Clark's proposal. I think it does us 20 I want to recognize, I think, with that, we qood. 21 continue if we can, you know, encourage our 22 legislative team to pursue the permanent legislative ratification exemptions. I think that 23 24 that, you know, giving that additional 30 days, we 25 are going to hit when legislative session starts,

and so that's going to be important to keep going forward with that. So I want to make sure that we are using this next 30 days really effectively.

4 I do also want to put just in the back of our 5 minds, as we think about in the next 30 days, that when I was talking to staff about this item, it 6 7 came to my attention that it takes about 18 months 8 for us to see the RAF, the effects go into effect 9 to get those -- that money -- those increased 10 So 30 days really isn't going to make much rates. 11 of a difference when we are looking at, I think 12 it's Table 1.2 about when we are going to start 13 seeing that dropoff. But, you know, just kind of 14 keep that in mind so that hopefully we all use this 15 next 30 days effectively, and make sure that we are 16 not -- we are all progressing to make sure that 17 something actually comes out of it. 18 CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. 19 COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: Thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN FAY: Yeah. Thank you. 21 Commissioner Graham, you are recognized. 22 COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 23 I have never had a problem at all by granting 24 somebody a deferral. I have been doing it for a 25 I -- just two things. long time.

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1 Number one, I want to hear any comments from the Executive Director on how this affects your 2 3 plan moving forward. And number two, if I can get 4 the rest of you to kind of opine on what it is you 5 are deferring for, because I know we can't talk outside of this venue, so I would like to hear so 6 7 all us can look at what it is the problem is and 8 see if we can make some determination. I think we can have 9 CHATRMAN FAY: Sure. 10 further discussion. 11 Mr. Baez, why don't we go to you first for 12 Commissioner Graham's guestion on the item, and 13 then we can take it up for further discussion. 14 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. MR. BAEZ: 15 Commissioner Graham, you asked about the 16 affect of the deferral going forward? I think one 17 of you -- one of your colleagues mentioned 30 days not running up against any crucial deadlines, and I 18 19 would agree. I also appreciate Commissioner 20 Passidomo's encouragement to continue our efforts 21 for -- to seek the permanent exemption.

I think, judging the two separately for a moment, that's a -- the permanent exemption, obviously, would function into the future for what you all are considering, or will consider today, or

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1 shortly after. I don't have any concern myself. Ι 2 know I speak for the rest of the staff working on 3 this that 30 days is going to affect it if we can 4 use it, as Commissioner Passidomo suggested, 5 effectively, to address whatever additional information, whatever additional perspective or 6 7 And I also am very concerns there may be. 8 confident that we can address Florida Power & 9 Light's timing concerns as well. That should not 10 be a problem. We have spoken to the company off-line as well 11 12 when they made their concerns known to us, and I 13 think we immediately engaged in some kind of --14 coming up with some kind of reasonable solution for all involved. 15 16 So I don't know if that answers your question, 17 but --18 Well, that's fine. COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: Ι 19 mean, once again, I --20 MR. BAEZ: We are ready to accommodate it. 21 COMMISSIONER GRAHAM: -- I have no problem at 22 all by giving 30 days, because that's an easy one. 23 I was just more curiosity than anything else, and 24 when I was asking you, I am not trying to dig for 25 I'm just, as we are processing all of any secrets.

1 this for the next 30 days, I want to be able to 2 think through some of the things that you are 3 thinking about. And I will address that 4 COMMISSIONER CLARK: 5 in just a brief manner. Any time you look at changing the RAF, I think 6 7 you have to look at how it affects customers, and 8 that's probably one of the things that I view more 9 intensely than anything else. 10 Anyway you look at it, in this cases, there 11 some customers going to win, some customers going 12 to lose. You have got -- actually, the proposal 13 showed that some of the costs went down for the 14 regulatory aspects of certain divisions of 15 customers and some went up. 16 And I have just always contended that the 17 worst time to do an increase is in your peak 18 months. You don't touch rates. You don't mess 19 with rates in January and June. Those are two bad 20 If you are going to make adjustments, do it times. 21 during the shoulder months. Look at April and 22 October. It's not as much of an effect on the 23 customer. 24 It's not a lot of money. I will -- let's look 25 at that right off the bat. You are talking a penny

1 I think it was 01 -- the different between or so. 2 01 or 02 cents per customer per month, and so it's 3 not a significant amount of money, but I think that 4 it's -- any time that you are looking at an 5 increase in cost to customers, I just would like a little bit more time. 6 7 I have reviewed it a lot. I have spent a lot 8 of time on this, and I am just not at 100 percent.

9 I am at about 90 percent on it right now, and I
10 think I can get a few of my other questions
11 answered just a little more digging. That's me
12 personally.

13CHAIRMAN FAY: Yeah, Commissioner La Rosa, you14are recognized.

COMMISSIONER LA ROSA: Thank you, Chairman.

16 And I want, obviously, the opportunity to also 17 address maybe where -- where, you know, my thoughts 18 in how we can use this time effective. When 19 introduced, you know, this kind of -- the cost of 20 regulation has to fall within the division, right, 21 of what's happening, and what we are doing here as 22 I would like to better understand the an agency. 23 cost of regulation. With that, I know that that's 24 not -- that's not consistent and across the board 25 all the time year after year.

With that said, I also want to emphasize the importance of the legislation that our team is working with the Legislature on. Those efforts need to continue, and those efforts are vastly important, and I think if there is anything we get out of the practice of reading this --

7 And, Commissioner Clark, I have also read this 8 numerous times, and every time I put it down, I say, man, I am confusing myself, because it does, 9 10 You know, the numbers don't lie. right? The 11 charts are accurate, and they are black and white. 12 There is a revenue shortfall. There is no 13 question, but understanding as that goes deeper is 14 important to me, and I think that lays emphasis on 15 why the future legislation that we are working on 16 is extremely important, because I know that this 17 will not be consistent long-term and, I know that there will be changes as laws change, as 18 19 environments change, as just the effects of 20 everyday life and usage changes, as far as what we 21 do here as an agency. 22 And I would also like to understand more, or 23 deeper of how the revenue forecast works, and what 24 we are -- what we are focusing on, and what we are 25 looking at. Staff did a phenomenal job in the

briefing me, so hats off. Congrats, staff, in explaining that to me. But I want to go a few steps further and now look at some of the tools in which we are using to make those forecasts.

5 So hopefully that's not too much in the weeds, but that's kind of what I am thinking over the next 6 7 That's where I would like to spend my 30 days. 8 time and my focus as we consider this, but I can't 9 say it enough, that I think that the efforts that 10 we are make downtown are extremely important, and I 11 think because of what we are doing here today, or 12 what we are looking at today, and possibly moving 13 on for 30 more days, it is important that we do --14 that we have the ability to do this long-term so we 15 keep these -- we keep RAFs in line with where they 16 need to be. 17 Great. CHAIRMAN FAY: Thank you. 18 Any other comments? 19 Yeah, Commissioner Passidomo. 20 I'm sorry, Mr. Chair. COMMISSIONER PASSIDOMO: 21 I just wanted to also personally address 22 Commissioner Graham's assessment. I think that's a

23 good point, is that we should all kind of be, like

when I said using this time effectively.

I kind of am bridging, but I have had the

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1 similar thoughts between both of my colleagues here 2 about what I am thinking about in the next 30 days, 3 what I want to do, again, as much as what 4 Commissioner La Rosa said, is pursuing that 5 legislative permanent exemption is really important for ratification, and so that's really where a lot 6 7 of focus should be. But when those meetings are 8 happening going in as quick as possible to show the Legislature we have -- we have looked at all 9 10 alternatives for cost cutting measures.

11 And so what I want as well -- so it's our 12 executive team, if they will indulge me, you know, 13 later on, is to we will sit down -- to sit down and 14 you can, you know, practice with me and tell me how 15 -- what we have done in those -- in the last years 16 to try to mitigate these costs, and then you will 17 hopefully create a stack of ammo that you can go 18 with to the Legislature and show them, look, this 19 is what we have done.

Because, like Commissioner Clark said, really, the -- I mean, I agree again. It's a small amount of money, but customers are the primary focus here, and they are the ones who will be paying these little -- these increases. We have to keep them in mind, so showing we have done and looked at all

1	alternatives, and then this is where this is
2	what we are left with. So that's kind of my
3	thoughts.
4	CHAIRMAN FAY: Great. Yeah.
5	And I would just add on my end that I think
6	the legislative process is, of course, one reason
7	to kind of watch what we would do with this, but
8	the other is I mean, I look at the legal mandate
9	for the correlation of cost to regulation, the
10	categories that we are in, and, you know, that's an
11	obligation that we have to fulfill.
12	But the part that, you know, almost is a
13	unique challenge is that we've seen the Legislature
14	come forward in the past few years with support for
15	public service, for state employees, that the folks
16	we recognized today that do this role, and for four
17	agencies that are trust funded I believe it's
18	four, you know, subject to check, whatever agencies
19	are trust funded, that those that support and
20	those raise for those employees then impacts our
21	budget in a way that doesn't impact pretty much
22	most of the state. I mean, we are so unique in
23	that nature.
24	So I hope we will continue seeing that. But,
25	for example, we see it again this session, I mean,

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1 these numbers just start to get more and more 2 challenging. And so I do want to make sure we are 3 able to be legally responsive, but also, you know, 4 financially responsive. So hopefully that time 5 will give us some additional information. I think, unlike all of us, that you can read 6 7 until your eyes fall out on this stuff, because 8 rulemaking is sometimes very complex, but I think 9 for, you know, what's being proposed in this 10 recommendation, the end goal is fairly 11 straightforward, to make sure that, you know, we 12 don't get hung up. And I don't know the timing of 13 budget -- budget stuff, and so how all that would 14 be intertwined. I assume if we approve this 15 hypothetically in 30 days, there is still time for 16 implementation and publication, and all of that 17 kind of stuff, so I know it wouldn't be quick. And 18 I would presume during that time we could still 19 follow the Legislature, who I believe concludes at 20 the end of -- or beginning of March, does that 21 sound right, Mr. Baez? 22 MR. BAEZ: Yeah. 23 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. So we would know kind of 24 at that point. So I am also supportive of the 25 deferral to see kind of where we can get and make

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1 sure everybody's questions are answered. But, you 2 know, I hope to see continued support for our State 3 employees, and I think we need to make sure if we 4 receive that support from the Legislature, we don't 5 fail to financially, you know, prepare for that, so I appreciate this being brought forward. 6 7 And, Commissioners, I will take any other 8 questions before we approve. 9 Legal, I wasn't going to do a -- do we need a 10 formal motion for deferral or -- we are happy to do 11 it either way. I think Commissioner Clark has 12 insinuated he is happy to do it, so --13 I think the record is clear. MS. HELTON: 14 Great. So then with the CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. 15 deferral, we will formally defer Item No. 2, 16 Commissioners, and so that will address that item. 17 And then, Mr. Baez, did you have anything else 18 I didn't want to cut you off. before we move on? 19 I just --20 Merely to thank you all for MR. BAEZ: No. 21 your thoughtfulness, and we look forward to working 22 with you all to answer whatever questions remain, 23 and to whatever -- to whatever level of detail we 24 will find -- will find you all comfortable with the 25 effort. And I do appreciate your supportive

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1 comments as well, and your encouragement on the 2 legislative side. 3 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Hopefully you didn't 4 have any holiday plans, Commissioner Baez, because 5 it sounds like you are going to be --MR. BAEZ: I have made it a practice not to 6 7 have holiday plans. Thank you. 8 CHAIRMAN FAY: Okay. Great. Thank you. 9 All right. Commissioners, with that, that 10 will conclude Item No. 2. 11 (Agenda item concluded.) 12 13 14 15 16 17 18 19 20 21 22 23 24 25
