ORDER GRANTING DUKE ENERGY FLORIDA, LLC'S SECOND
REQUEST FOR EXTENSION OF CONFIDENTIAL CLASSIFICATION
(DOCUMENT NO. 02867-2022 X-REF. 02531-2022 AND 02529-2022)

On January 7, 2026, pursuant to Section 366.093, Florida Statutes (F.S.), and Rule 25-22.006, Florida Administrative Code (F.A.C.), Duke Energy Florida, LLC (DEF) filed its Second Request for Extension of Confidential Classification (Request) of certain information provided pursuant to Audit Nos. 2022-003-1-4 and 2022-003-1-5 (Document Nos. 02867-2022, x-ref. 02531-2022 and 02529-2022). This material was originally granted confidentiality by Order No. PSC-2023-0015-CFO-EI, issued January 5, 2023. DEF's First Request for Extension of Confidential Classification was granted by Order No. PSC-2024-0232-CFO-EI, issued on July 10, 2024.

Request for Confidential Classification

DEF contends that the information provided pursuant to Audit Nos. 2022-003-1-4 and 2022-003-1-5 continues to contain information of a confidential nature, which is proprietary confidential business information within the meaning of Section 366.093(3), Florida Statutes.

DEF contends that the information is proprietary and confidential business information within the meaning of Section 366.093(3), F.S. This information is intended to be and is treated by DEF as private, and its confidentiality has been maintained. Pricing and other terms, payment records, and vendor and supplier rates, as well as information related to the purchase and sale of energy and capacity, natural gas, and natural gas storage are included in this information. DEF contends that the disclosure of this data would impair DEF's efforts to contract for energy and capacity-related goods and services on the most favorable terms and would impair the competitive interests of both DEF and its counterparties. Thus, DEF contends that this material is protected by Sections 366.093(d) and (e), F.S.

Ruling

Section 366.093(1), F.S., provides that records the Florida Public Service Commission (Commission) has found to contain proprietary business information shall be kept confidential and shall be exempt from Chapter 119, F.S. Section 366.093(3), F.S., defines proprietary confidential business information as information that is intended to be and is treated by the company as private, in that disclosure of the information would cause harm to the company's ratepayers or business operations, and has not been voluntarily disclosed to the public. Section 366.093(3), F.S., provides that proprietary confidential business information includes, but is not limited to:

(d) Information concerning bids or other contractual data, the disclosure of which would impair the efforts of the public utility or its affiliates to contract for goods or services on favorable terms.

(e) Information relating to competitive interests, the disclosure of which would impair the competitive business of the provider of the information.

Upon review, it appears the information and data provided in this request continues to satisfy the criteria set forth in Section 366.093(3), F.S., for classification as proprietary confidential business information. The information related to pricing terms and payment records appears to be “information concerning bids or other contractual data, the disclosure of which would impair the efforts of the public utility or its affiliates to contract for goods or services on favorable terms” and “information relating to competitive interests, the disclosure of which would impair the competitive business of the provider of the information.” Thus the information identified in Document No. 02867-2022, x-ref. 02531-2022 and 02529-2022, shall be granted confidential classification.

Pursuant to Section 366.093(4), F.S., the information for which confidential classification is granted herein shall remain protected from disclosure for a period of up to 18 months from the date of issuance of this Order unless good cause is shown that protection from disclosure shall be for a specified longer period. At the conclusion of the 18 month period, the confidential information will no longer be exempt from Section 119.07(1), F.S., unless DEF or another affected person shows, and the Commission finds, that the records continue to contain proprietary confidential business information.

Based on the foregoing, it is hereby

ORDERED by Gary F. Clark, Prehearing Officer, that Duke Energy Florida, LLC’s Second Request for Extension of Confidential Classification of Document Nos. 02867-2022, x-ref. 02531-2022 and 02529-2022, is granted. It is further

ORDERED that the information in Document Nos. 02867-2022, x-ref. 02531-2022 and 02529-2022 for which confidential classification has been granted, shall remain protected from disclosure for a period of up to 18 months from the date of issuance of this Order. It is further

ORDERED that this Order shall be the only notification by the Commission to the parties of the date of declassification of the materials discussed herein.

NOTICE OF FURTHER PROCEEDINGS OR JUDICIAL REVIEW

The Florida Public Service Commission is required by Section 120.569(1), Florida Statutes, to notify parties of any administrative hearing or judicial review of Commission orders that is available under Sections 120.57 or 120.68, Florida Statutes, as well as the procedures and time limits that apply. This notice should not be construed to mean all requests for an administrative hearing or judicial review will be granted or result in the relief sought.

Mediation may be available on a case-by-case basis. If mediation is conducted, it does not affect a substantially interested person's right to a hearing.

Any party adversely affected by this order, which is preliminary, procedural or intermediate in nature, may request: (1) reconsideration within 10 days pursuant to Rule 25-22.0376, Florida Administrative Code; or (2) judicial review by the Florida Supreme Court, in the case of an electric, gas or telephone utility, or the First District Court of Appeal, in the case of a water or wastewater utility. A motion for reconsideration shall be filed with the Office of Commission Clerk, in the form prescribed by Rule 25-22.0376, Florida Administrative Code. Judicial review of a preliminary, procedural or intermediate ruling or order is available if review of the final action will not provide an adequate remedy. Such review may be requested from the appropriate court, as described above, pursuant to Rule 9.100, Florida Rules of Appellate Procedure.
