

 Answer to Staff's 4th Set of Interrogatories, Interrogatory No. 21 (Page 1 of 1); Answer to Staff's 4th Set of Interrogatories, Interrogatory No. 22 (Page 2 of 2); and Exhibit (MJH-1) attached to the testimony of Mark J. Hornick, Document No. 2 (Page 1 of 1). Tampa Electric is also filing ten copies of the above pages with the confidential information reducted from the page.
- 2. The highlighted portions of the exhibit are entitled to confidential classification and protection by public disclosure in that they constitute proprietary confidential business information under Section 366.093, Fla. Stat. Attached hereto as Exhibit "A" is a detailed justification for the confidential classification requested herein.
- Tampa Electric requests that the highlighted information be protected from public disclosure through November 30, 2000. Public disclosure of the information prior to that date could adversely affect the competitive interests of Tampa Electric's affiliate, Gatliff Coal

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Company, and thereby adversely affect the ability of Tampa Electric to contract for goods and services on favorable terms.

- 4. The information sought herein to be treated as confidential has been recognized by the Commission on numerous recent occasions to constitute proprietary confidential business information entitled to protection against public disclosure under Section 366.093, Fla. Stat.
- The material for which classification is sought is intended to be and is treated by Tampa Electric and its affiliate as confidential proprietary business information and has not been disclosed publicly.

WHEREFORE, Tampa Electric submits the foregoing in support of its Request for Confidential Classification of the highlighted information contained in the above-described pages.
