Dear Commissioners,

I am writing as a Duke Energy Florida customer in Ocoee, to strongly urge the Commission *to deny* the proposed base rate increases filed under Docket No. 20240025-EI. Duke is seeking a base rate adjustment totaling approximately **\$593 million for 2025**, **\$98 million for 2026**, and **\$129 million for 2027** — a cumulative **\$820 million request** <u>floridapsc.com+14psc.state.fl.us+14psc.state.fl.us+14</u>.

I understand that part of this ask is intended to fund future solar farms as part of Duke's clean-energy transition. However, this shift must not disproportionately burden low-income households, seniors on fixed incomes, and vulnerable families who already struggle to pay for basic needs.

My concerns include:

- **Sharp rate increases:** These hikes represent steep jumps literally doubling electricity costs for many fixed-income households.
- Timing: The proposed increases take effect as early as January 1, 2025 <u>psc.state.fl.uspsc-fl.granicus.com</u> giving limited time for customers to prepare.

• **Economic hardship:** With inflation, housing, and healthcare costs already high, this rate hike could force people to choose between electricity and lifesaving medication or nutritious food.

What I respectfully request:

- 1. Deny Duke's request for this large base rate increase. Keep rates stable for now.
- 2. **Require Duke to seek alternative funding** such as low-cost loans, grants, federal tax incentives, or phased investments to develop solar infrastructure without sending the full cost to consumers.
- 3. **Ensure protections** are in place for vulnerable customers, such as seniors and low-income households, including deferring automation or minimum charge increases until a careful review is done.

Why this matters locally:

In Altamonte Springs, many households live on Social Security or fixed income. A base rate increase of this magnitude would significantly burden our seniors, disabled individuals, and families already struggling — making just staying warm or cool dangerously unaffordable.

Thank you for your careful consideration. I urge the Commission to safeguard Florida's most vulnerable and push Duke Energy to pursue cleaner energy responsibly — without causing harm through sudden, steep rate hikes.
